What a night it was! The banquet hall at the Red Lion was packed with 982 paid guests. A number were not able to secure tickets. For that we were indeed sorry.






Intramural Football



lost soon by the participants.



The fans were very enthusiastic and supportive, which the volleyball team appreciated. The fans' cheers led the team to a second place standing in the league. A highlight of the season was being the only



With almost everyone returning next year, they will be even better because they will have had one year together as a TEAM!












Women's Basketball


Drama Club








AWS Officers
