

## BROTHER BEATTY,, DEAN EMERITUS, PASSES

Students and friends were saddened by the sudden death January 9 of Brother Beatty, beloved dean emeritus of Northwest Bible College.

Charles Clifford Beatty was born in Knox, Indiana, July 8, 1870. At the age of sixteen he began to learn telegraphy and after a year became the assistant to the station master. The following years were spent in railroad work. In 1898 he was called into the ministry and three years later was ordained in the Baptist denomination.

After five years of pastoral work in Indiana he and Mrs. Beatty were led into evangelistic work. In 1918 they moved to Duluth, Minnesota, to superintend the Bethel Mission. After several years there Brother Beatty became the Field Superintendent for the North Central District Council of the Assemblies of God. Later he held the office of Assistant District Superintendent.

Together with Reverend F. J. Lindquist and other ministers, Reverend Beatty was instrumental in the establishing of the North Central Bible Institute in Minneapolis. He served as dean of this school for five years.

In 1934 he accepted a call to assist in the founding of Northwest Bible College. This same year he became dean of the school and served in this capacity until 1949 when he retired and was named dean emeritus.

His education included training at Northwest Bible and Training School, and A.G. University, Greensboro, North Carolina.

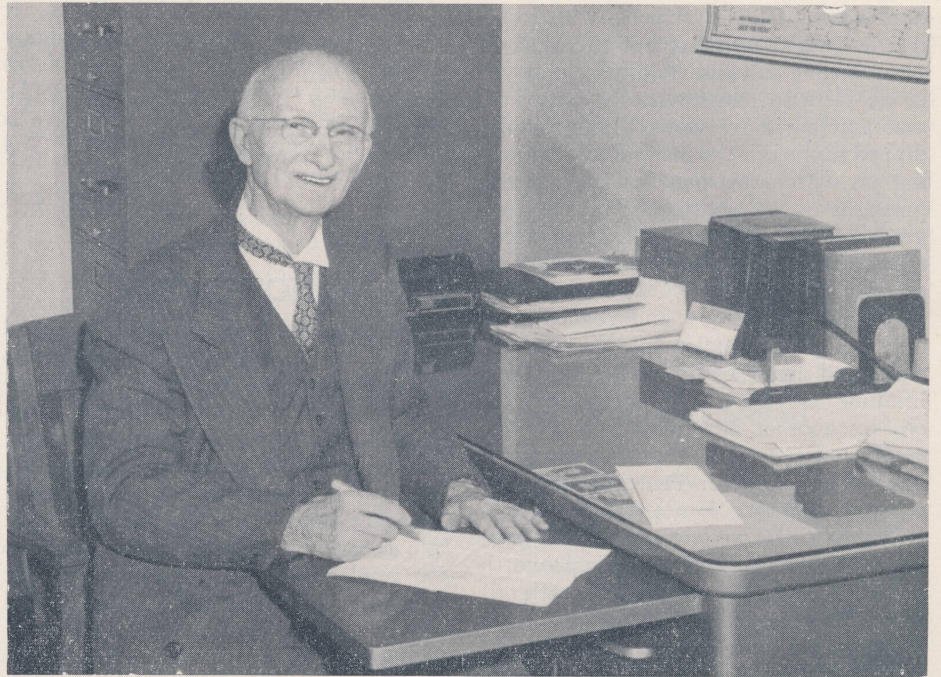

Though not active in school affairs the past two years, due to his health, he never failed to wear that smile characteristic of him at all times.

Brother Beatty's life, his enthusiasm and zeal has been, and will continue to be an inspiration to both students and faculty.

Surviving are his wife, Hattie, and a daughter, Genevieve, 802 E. 72d Street.

## MISSIONARY PROGRAM PROGRESSING

With a fine spirit of cooperation and support from the student body, the missionary program of our school is continuing to gather momentum.

The Alaska band is sending one hundred dollars to the church in Petersburg, Alaska, to help pay for a piano. Until recently the church did not have one, but through the combined efforts of God's people, plus the financial help from the school, they are now able to own a piano.

The India band has undertaken the very worthwhile project of securing a complete public address system for Paul Schoonmaker and his work in Chapra, Bihar, India. This project, though large, met with the full approval of the missionary council, and along with other help, the India band is well on its way to realizing the completion of this project.

A brief financial report given by the secretary-treasurer of the missionary council, January 12, showed a total of approximately \$1050 received this past school year, with disbursements totaling \$471.

The January 12, offering was a record with \$134 received.

It is only through the combined efforts of the entire student body, with God's blessing, that the school can make these practical contributions to help the missionaries on the field.

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## AN APOSTLE OF JOY

In a dark, dingy, and damp Roman prison an aged man was spending his time writing on a parchment. His prison quarters were anything but the kind of environment to cause rejoicing, and yet if we were to know what he wrote on that parchment we would think that he dipped his pen in the ink-well of abounding joy. From his pen flowed such expressions as, "I do therein rejoice and, yea, and will rejoice," "holding forth the word of life; that I may rejoice in the day of Christ." . . . "For this same cause also do ye joy and rejoice with me . . ." "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, rejoice." In our life-time we have had opportunity to observe another man who truly was an apostle of joy. We are referring to our Beloved Brother Beatty, who made a joyful entrance into the land that is fairer than day on January 9. We have heard of the late Smith Wigglesworth being referred to as the "Apostle of Faith," but we feel that we can refer to Brother Beatty with equal appropriateness as "the Apostle of Joy."

Someone has said that here is a distinction between joy and happiness. Joy is an inward quality, while happiness is dependent upon "what happens" from without. Those who knew Brother Beatty knew something of the pain he suffered in his body, and yet the dominant note in his life was joy. We are certain that Brother Beatty's cheerfulness had its source in more than human circumstances or in what happened—it had its source in God. Though he was not imprisoned in a Roman prison like the Apostle Paul, yet he was imprisoned in a human tabernacle of suffering from which he is now set free. Surely the same supernatural joy which possessed the Apostle in the Roman prison and caused him to write, "REJOICE IN THE LORD ALWAY: AND AGAIN I SAY REJOICE." is the same supernatural joy which caused our Brother Beatty to so often sing,

"Singing I go along Life's way,  
Praising the Lord, Praising the Lord,  
Singing I go along Life's way  
For Jesus has lifted my load."

We are certain that Brother Beatty is still singing and praising the Lord up in the glory world, and we do expect that before very long we all will join him to sing God's praises with him. "When we've been there ten thousand years, bright shining as the sun, we've no less days to sing God's praise than when we first begun."

In the meantime we need the presence of those in our midst who know how

to "rejoice in the Lord alway." We need more apostles of Joy. This is not brought about in ourselves; it is the life of Christ lived in and through us. It comes about by giving ourselves wholly to God, and when we do this, God makes us a blessing to one another so that like the Apostle we say, "For me to live is CHRIST, and to die is gain." May God give us many more apostles of joy.
