For the first time in the history of the Northwest Bible College the school will have a building exclusively for the purpose of carrying out the objectives of the college in training young men and women for the ministry.

For seventeen years the school has used the facilities of the Calvary Temple building for school use. The auditorium and Sunday school rooms, pianos, song books and all of the equipment has been at the disposal of the school to carry out its various functions.

Four years ago a lease was executed by the Northwest District Council for the use of Calvary Temple as a school building which lease was to go into effect at the time when Calvary Temple would complete their new church building. On April 1 Calvary Temple dedicated their beautiful new edifice just across the street from the present location and the old Calvary Temple building was turned over to the Northwest Bible College to be used exclusively as a school.

We wish to extend our thanks to the Calvary Temple pastor and congregation for the many kindnesses and courtesies extended to the Northwest Bible College through the years. We trust that the same goodwill and spirit of fellowship will continue to exist between these two organizations and we extend our best wishes to the pastor and congregation for successful years of service in the Lord's harvest field.

When the congregation of Calvary Temple moved into their new building they removed from the old church building all the equipment and furnishings and it has been necessary for the school to re-furnish the building and buy equipment suitable to carry on the work of the school. God has very graciously answered prayer in the supplying of some of these needs and we are continuing to trust Him for the many items of furniture and equipment that are so greatly needed at this time. This month we have received news from all parts of the country, and even from beyond the continental United States. Word of the activities of our alumni has come from as far east as Kentucky; as far south as Los Angeles; as far west as Guam; and as far north as Petersburg, Alaska.

Raymond and Edna Ross, Class of '49, write us from Irvine, Ky. Brother Ross has been teaching in a little country school during the past two winters and this is proving to be a great help in opening doors for gospel work. A little daughter came to gladden the Ross home last December 16.

From Los Angeles we hear from Evelyn A. Harrison, Class of '38. Sis. Harrison is working on the staff of "Herald of Hope," a gospel paper going to all parts of the world.

Frank Purcell is stationed on the island of Guam as a Lieutenant with an Air-Sea Rescue Squadron of the U.S. Air Force. He writes us that the natives of this island are 98 per cent Catholic. There are, however, a few Baptist missions, but so far he has not found any Pentecostal believers. Brother Purcell gave us a very interesting account of the sea rescue of thirty-two men from a sunken freighter about 600 miles from Guam. It took four and a half days of searching and about \$60,000 was spent for materials and gasoline in this one operation. This was a challenge to him as he thought of how many souls could be reached for Christ if this amount of toil and money could be put forth.

From Petersburg, Alaska, we received a short note from Bill Whitfield, Class of '49. May God bless Bill, Oleta and their family as they labor for the Lord up there.

THE FIRST JAPANESE PRAYER MEETING

In January, 1872, during the week of prayer, all the missionaries in Yokohama met together to pray for God's blessing on Japan. Some of the Japanese who had been studying English with the missionaries came, too, partly out of curiosity, but as they listened to the reading of God's Word and heard the earnest prayers of the missionaries they became interested themselves.

"One day a wonderful thing happened," related an eye-witness, "some of the Japanese began to pray in the meeting! On their knees, with tears streaming down their faces, they pleaded with God to pour out His Spirit on Japan as He had done on the early church. This has been called 'the first Japanese prayer meeting,' and a wonderful meeting it was. Every heart was touched as these young men poured out their souls to God." As a result of these prayer meetings, the first Protestant church in Japan was organized on March 10, 1872.

Once again God has opened Japan to the Gospel. Not only is the land open as never before, but the hearts of the people are open also. General MacArthur has issued a call for a thousand missionaries. The Catholics have already sent more than their quota. What are we going to do? Since the end of the war many Christian leaders have stated that Japan is the greatest mission field in the world today. The Lord is saying to us, "Behold I have set before thee an OPEN DOOR, and no man can shut it." (Rev. 3:8) May God help us to enter it, in time!

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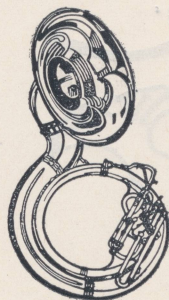
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Pink and Blue Column

CHAPEL NOTATIONS

A reminder of Christ's exhortation to "bear one another's burdens" was brought to the student body by Lloyd Portin in a timely message on February 13. Using for his text James 5:16 he stressed the great need for intercessory prayer.

On February 14, using as his text Philippians 4:19 Brother Butterfield encouraged the students to go to God for all their needs regardless of what they were.

Hubert Rhymes spoke on February 15 on the need for "a closer walk with the Lord" using Revelation 3:16 for his text.

Former U.S. Army Chaplain, Howard Rusthoi, spoke to the students on February 16. "Put on the whole armour of God and be your best for God; be faithful regardless of results," was the theme of his message.

On March 7, Brother Dupleisse, Secretary of the World Pentecostal Movement, gave a report of the progress of world missions.

A very profitable message on the merits of fasting was given by Stanley Telecky on March 8.

Vivian Barron was the student speaker on March 13 and chose as her subject "The Love of God" based on Ephesians 3:17.

"Worship, an avenue of contact" was the leading thought of Brother Butterfield's message on March 14. Reading from Revelation 19:10 he pointed out the three ways in which worship can be activated; through the body, the soul and the spirit.

On March 20, quoting from Christ's well known words, "Suffer the little children to come unto me . . ." Lester Byrd emphasized the great need for attracting boys and girls to Christ by means of the Sunday school.

"Be still and know that I am God . . ." (Psalm 46:10) was Marvin Cole's text on March 22, when he spoke of stillness being a prerequisite to the knowledge of God.

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EARLY APPLICATIONS URGED FOR FALL ENTRY

We are encouraging those who expect to enter Bible College next fall to make their applications for admission now. On the basis on which the school is presently operating our facilities will not accommodate a large student body such as was formerly accommodated when the school was operating on the Bible Institute basis. Although it is not known exactly how many students will be entering the school next fall, we anticipate an increased enrollment. For this reason we urge those looking forward to entering Bible school to make application without delay.

Another reason for suggesting immediate application concerns our young men who feel the call of God upon their lives for Christian service. According to the Selective Service Act of 1948 provision is made for the classification of ministerial students as class IV-D for exemption from military service while pursuing a full-time course of logical instruction in preparation for the ministry or while pursuing a full-time course of instruction leading to entrance into a Theological school. From a recent quarterly letter issued from the executives offices of the General Council of the Assemblies of God we take the following excerpt:

"The student in Bible school and the student who notifies a Bible school that he intends to attend that school (or in other words that he is a pre-enrolled as

a student) is entitled to deferment, but it will not be surprising if some students will have difficulty to establish their status under the law with local draft boards. This word is passed on to the pastors of our churches as a friendly warning."

It is evident that the element of time in this matter may be an important one in many cases which will be coming up in the future. We have already had experience to this effect during the past year, and in view of this experience and in view of what we anticipate for the future, we wish to encourage our young men in this category to establish their connection with the school through application for admission *without further delay*.

Because of the great need for trained and consecrated Christian leadership we are sending out this call to all who will hear and respond to the opportunity afforded to train for some phase of the Lord's work while "it is yet day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

ter into actual training before that date will forfeit their privilege to take training under the VA program. This means that veterans, whether they have used any of their time previously or not, must actually be in school up through the Spring semester or quarter of the present school year or must be in school during a summer session which begins on or before July 25th. A summer session is not offered at Northwest Bible College. However, we are passing this information to any veterans who may have eligibility time coming and who wish to take advantage of it at some school where a summer session is offered.

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
