MISSION BANDS

We are happy to report that the missionary giving at NBC this year has exceeded any former year. The total amount handled was \$2,599.47 with disbursements of \$2,248.25.

Most of the bands received money for various projects. Some were: India, \$100 for a public address system; Islands of the Sea, \$100 for building fund; Alaska, \$200 for airplane repairs; Homeland, \$50 fare for Jeanne Finch to Kentucky; Oriental, \$500 building fund for native Japanese church; Africa, \$200 building fund for church in Belgian Congo. Also many individual missionary speakers received different amounts from the missionary fund.

We pray that God may use each of the dollars given to the fullest extent for the building of His kingdom.

Editorial

"I was SO MAD, I just couldn't help it. I simply blew my top." The words brought the memory of a lively discussion.

"Meekness," said Brother Jones, "is the ability to govern yourself under strong provocation." We were sitting at the dinner table, and someone had rebelled against the idea of meekness being becoming to a Christian. The picture of a Mr. Milquetoast, afraid of the sound of his own voice, appealed to no one.

This word meekness, so often associated with the idea of being subdued, hesitant and colorless, is, rather, a positive result of the activity of the Spirit of God. It is one of His fruits. It is a form of *expression*, not a negative quality. Moses, called the meekest of all men by God Himself, was not indifferent to the charges of Miriam, the complaints of the Israelites, the rebellion of those who should have been wholeheartedly with him. He certainly had strong provocation.

Vincent in his Word Studies contrasts man's idea of meekness with that of the Christian. The self-control of the Christian does not stem from the natural disposition. It is not condescension, but an outgrowth of a spiritual relation to God. The meekness of the Christian, he says, springs not from a sense of inferiority to man, but a sense of the inferiority of the sinful creature to the Holy God. "He considers opposition, insult and provocation as God's permitted chastening demanded by the corruption and infirmity of sin."

Meekness is ACTION, not inaction. It closes a mouth in time of temper; it forgives an insult; it restores the erring; it exercises patience in opposition.

It is much more interesting to act than to be passive. The Spirit works in you; fruit comes from His working. You work together with Him and the activity produces growth.

Moses substituted self-action for meekness once. He fell where he was strongest. He struck the rock in anger, instead of speaking to it. He got the same result we do when we choose our own way. He lost his spiritual blessing.

Provocation demands action. "I have to do SOMETHING! I can't take that lying down." Alright, if it's action you need, "Bless them that persecute you and despitefully use you." That's action of the highest order. That form of meekness is far from passive, and you will feel you have been exercised, too. "The meek will He teach His way." His way was that when He was reviled, He reviled not again, but blessed.

The new counter recently installed, contains the vertical file for keeping magazines, pamphlets, maps, visual aid material etc. and this counter was made by Rev. C. E. Oster of the Avondale church in Gig Harbor. Bro. Oster donated all the labor involved in making the counter.

The radio room, still in use by Calvary Temple, will be turned into the library office next year. The office will contain a lingaphone and language records for use by language students.

Another new addition to our library is a new set of American encyclopedias.

The largest and most important addition to the new library is that of the new tables and chairs which were presented to the library by the student body.

NEW CATALOGS OFF THE PRESS



According to the Selective Service Act of 1948 provision is made for the classification of ministerial students as class IV-D for exemption from military service while pursuing a full-time course of logical instruction in preparation for the ministry or while pursuing a full-time course of instruction leading to entrance into a Theological school. From a recent quarterly letter issued from the executives offices of the General Council of the Assemblies of God we take the following excerpt:

"The student in Bible school and the student who notifies a Bible school that he intends to attend that school (or in other words that he is a pre-enrolled as a student) is entitled to deferment, but



it will not be surprising if some students will have difficulty to establish their status under the law with local draft boards. This word is passed on to the pastors of our churches as a friendly warning."




