CAMPUS NEEDS

Does Northwest Bible College need a campus? There is a great need for adequate buildings in which to conduct school. The present building has been out grown since the transition to a Bible College.

The student-teacher ratio at present is about one teacher to twenty students. Many more classrooms are needed as more courses are being added each year and departmental classrooms are not available for the many different courses of instruction.

A college campus needs dormitories in which to house all of the students. The two dormitories are not large enough to accommodate more than thirty students. Other students (Continued on Page 3, Col. 2)

A campus for the Northwest Bible College would greatly increase the solidarity of the student body and the faculty. As it now stands the student body and faculty scatter all over the city of Seattle immediately ater 12:30 p.m. The students many times do not hear the announcements and do not know what is going on in the schools.

If the college had a campus on which all the students would be living it is though that the student body would grow spiritually and draw together in one spirit, and more for God would be done as the student body would be in one spirit and mind.

It is believed the Northwest would be benefitted in having a larger campus. If the college had a campus the district could hold conventions, camp meetings, youth camps, and daily vacation Bible Schools on the same grounds.

FAITH PLUS GOD—CAMPUS

January 3, 1952, may prove to have been an eventful day in the history of Northwest Bible College if, in the providence of God, the school should at some future time acquire a campus, upon which to continue the ministry which God gave it when it was founded over seventeen years ago.

It was on this day that the faculty met together with the Board of Directors and Brother R. M. Riggs, secretary of the Educational Department of the Assemblies of God, for the purpose of getting acquainted. An informal discussion led by Brother Riggs included a brief resume of the school's recent experience and standing with the Accrediting Association of Bible Institutes and Bible Colleges and a brief review of the Association's suggestions to the school for improvement.

In his comments, Brother Riggs stated that the report of the examiners to the executive committee of the A.A.B.I.B.C. paid the school high commendation for its spiritual and academic standards. It was also pointed out that student response in the school would be greatly benefitted if the school were situated on a campus where the student body lived in closer proximity with the activities of the school.

This discussion led to the subject of the school's need for a campus at which time it was suggested that a token offering be taken within the group present. An offering was taken which totaled \$107.41 and since that time another \$5.00 has been added, which makes a total of \$112.41 which has started what is known as the NBC Campus Fund. This fund has been deposited in a separate account in the Green Lake Branch of the Seattle Trust and Sav-

FIRST THINGS FIRST

A very appropriate thought for the beginning of the New Year is found in the words of Jesus, "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all of these things will be added unto you." There is, in this verse, a command and a promise.

The command indicates the object of seeking, "the Kingdom of God and His righteousness." There is nothing better to seek first. What we consider the best, and of the most value, we will seek first. Heaven is the end, and righteousness is the way. The righteousness which Jesus refers to is the inward righteousness. The order of seeking is "first." Too many people are making it a secondary consideration in life. If it is of secondary importance it is not worth seeking, at all. "In the beginning God," and everything else is subordinate. First in seeking, in the life, in the year, in the month, in the week, and in the day. Some said to Jesus, "I will follow Thee, but let me first," and, to them, other things were more important. First in giving. The Old Testament teaching of the firstfruits belonging to God, as a principle, is not done away. The first and best belongs to God. In scripture it says, "Thou shalt not offer to God anything that is crushed, or broken, or bruised or cut." "Out of all of thy gifts thou shalt offer the best."

The promise "all of these things will be added to you" means all necessary things, both material and spiritual. "Delight thyself in the Lord, and He shall give thee the desires of thy heart." There once lived, in the city of Philadelphia, an infidel millionaire, who had in his employ a certain young Christian. The rich man ordered his employees to return the next day, which was Sunday, to unload a ship. The young man refused, as he wanted to give that day to church attendance, as had always been his custom. He was discharged because of his stand. He was seeking first the Kingdom of God, and God was faithful to His promise. A better position opened to him, with more pay. Saturday afternoons free and he did not have to work on the Lord's day. Another commentary on this verse is in the life of Solomon in the beginning of his reign. He desired only wisdom to lead God's people. God gave him that which he asked, and much more. Let this verse, which Jesus gave to us, be the guiding principle of this New Year and of the whole life. —E. V. Bronson. My Pentecostal Experience

New dormitories would provide space for the married students and their families. A main cafeteria could also be used to serve the entire student body.

The college at present does not have a developed physical training program because athletic fields are needed for practice and for sports events. At present it is necessary to rent other facilities for the physical education program.

Athletic Funds Raised

The student council has authorized funds for athletic equipment which will include tee shirts with NBC letters on them, balls, whistles, and scoreboards.

The council has also allotted money for the purchasing of 5,000 gospel tracts for the students to distribute when they go out on assignments.

CAMPUS WOULD IMPROVE COLLEGE

A new campus would greatly improve the school spiritually. It would provide a chapel used only for religious services, and not as a classroom. This would enable the students to enter into the spirit of wor-
