



Years ago I wrote the following article. A number responded at the time, thinking it touched a need. Recently a comment was made that brought it back to my mind. I said, "I'll run it again." So, here it is:

The "Birth" Of A Preacher

The other day it came into clearer focus for me than ever before--I believe more preachers are "born" at the altars of the local church than anywhere else!

It's not the college where they are sent to be trained, or the youth camp where spiritual fires burn high and desires are stirred, or even the youth rally where commitments so often are made. These all have their place! They are a vital part of the process!

It's back where the idea first takes shape that it all begins. Back where the young man sees his own pastor at work week after week, where the claims of Christ and the message of His gospel first make their way into his awareness, where the seed of the idea is first planted by the Spirit using a faithful minister and teacher and reaching the heart of the young man.

If young men are "going into the ministry," they started back at the altars of their local church! If young men are heading for the mission fields they started back where they first heard the message! There is the exception...true! But it's the many that set the pattern.

It follows then, if young men are not going into the ministry, if a church is threatened with a shortage in its pulpits, it must look to the source. The simple questions any pastor should ask are: "How many young men have started for the ministry under my influence?" And again, "Have I been used of the Spirit to challenge young men to listen first to the claims of Christ as they set their life's course?"

Let's keep the altars of consecration alive in the home church. Let our young men see pastors who thrill at the call of God, who love the ministry and would do nothing else, who enjoy the challenge and opportunities of full time Christian service, and who recognize the high priviledge of having been given a ministry by Christ. As the Apostle Paul said, "I thank Christ Jesus...for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry." (I Tim. 1:12)

"There have been numerous souls saved through the efforts of student ministers already this year," reports Professor Larry Malcolm, Student Ministries sponsor. He adds, "There is on-going discipleship ministry to the

new converts." He also notes that students are involved in the churches of the area.

Among the special ministry activities of the students are: Teams at area shopping malls; in the University district and in the inner city among the street people; a weekly service at the Monroe State Prison; children's services in many churches and at Children's Hospital; services in rest homes and at a youth detention center; ministry on junior high and high school campuses, and ministry in National Guard units.

Scores of students are involved in ministerial internships as well as serving as associates, youth ministers,

music ministers, C.E. ministers, etc. This is under the guidance of pastors and associate pastors as well as professors.

Ministry while you learn in the classroom is N.C.'s *total* curriculum. Students are finding this is the way to *grow* into ministry and they are doing it right now at N.C.



STUDENTS MINISTER IN A VARIETY OF WAYS

Jesus commanded His followers to "go and make disciples of all nations." At Northwest College we are preparing men and women for this task. However, preparation for Christian ministry is much like that of preparing a medical doctor. The classroom learning is absolutely essential, but not complete in itself. There must be hands-on experience before the practitioner is competent. One of our goals here at Northwest is to provide this training through field experience in our Student Ministry program. A second purpose for this program is to fulfill the Great Commission here and now. We want to win our world to Christ!

Our students are involved in area churches in many capacities. In addi-

tion, we have ministry teams that: 1) minister in singing, drama and preaching in the churches in our region, 2) have weekly prison services at Monroe, 3) do street evangelism among the youth at the malls, in the university district, and in inner city Seattle, 4) minister in our rest homes and hospitals. 5) are workers in the Junior and Senior High School Youth for Christ and Campus Life programs, 6) conduct Kids Crusades and children's ministry in area churches, and 7) provide a ministry to servicemen. This has born fruit in evangelism and discipleship training.



Randy Barton Elected to Kirkland City Council

Northwest College continues in its strong tradition of being involved in city life. After serving on the Kirkland City Council for twelve years (four of those years as Mayor) President Hurst chose not to run for a fourth term. Randy Barton announced his plan to run for the vacancy and was elected in November.

Dr. Barton had served two years of a four-year term on the Houghton Community Council (one of those years as its chairman). On January 1, 1988, he steps up to the City Council.

Through the years the college personnel have served the community. H.W. Crowder served on the Planning Commission and as President of the Chamber of Commerce. Dean Waymon, "Tex" Rutledge served on the Community Council a full term.

Commenting on this record of service by college personnel and Randy Barton's election President Hurst said, "I am pleased that Randy Barton will follow me on Council. He will represent us all most capably. I am also pleased to see the college continue its involvement in city life this way. As Christians we cannot 'pass by on the other side.' We must be responsible citizens and be involved."
