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What Does it Take to Make a Special College? ...One Such as Northwest College?

The College seal tells the story of the history, character, and purpose of Northwest College. It contains many elements:

Its legal name shows its time of founding and its living tie to the church which brought it into being, the Assemblies of God.

So often we just assume the answer to that question. The college <u>is</u> in existence. It seems it always has been and always will be. It's unthinkable that at one time it did not exist . . . that it could possibly cease to be.

But supposing one were to start a college like N.C. One has to think carefully because *N.C. is not just another college*. How would he answer that question? The answer? By asking more questions, like ...Why?...With what?...For whom? ... How? ... And more!

First It Takes...PURPOSE

It takes a <u>purpose</u>...a <u>mission</u>...a <u>reason for being</u> to make a college. This answers the question "why?" Often the answer is characterized by a "burden" deeply felt by the founders...by a "call" by a response to a need.

This is right where N.C. is. Its founders <u>saw</u> the need, <u>felt</u> it, <u>stated</u> (preached) it and <u>acted</u> to meet it.

N.C. exists for Christ and His church. It exists to fulfill His command: "Go ye...make disciples!" And to do so within the mission of the church as conceived by the Assemblies of God...with its pentecostal distinctives.

Second It Takes...FACULTY

It takes a <u>faculty</u> that is trained and prepared — expert in their fields. Hence, it takes more than a degree, just <u>any</u> degree in <u>any</u> field, to make a college teacher. The faculty member must have at least a Master's degree in the field in which he/she teaches. And in each field of study (major) there should be — even in a small college — at least one who has a doctorate. Why? The college must accurately and deeply inform the student and provide a most challenging learning atmosphere.

More than that, for a college such as N.C., the faculty must be committed to Christ, to His church and to the Assemblies of God. They must sense God has led them to minister as they are. They must be experienced.

Northwest College has such a faculty.

N.C.'s Faculty Has What It Takes...

All full time teachers (with one exception) have at least a Master's degree. (In the case of one exception he is well into his program.) Some have two M.A.'s. Over forty-eight percent of the full time teaching faculty have their doctorates or are well into doctoral programs. (One will graduate shortly with his second doctorate.) The average number of years of formal posthigh school study for the faculty is eight years.

Almost sixty percent of the administrators have their doctorates, and the administrators possess an average of over seven and one half years of college studies, themselves.



Faculty members not only have an average of eight years of formal post-high school education but also have many years of experience in their field.

N.C. has a rich academic atmosphere!

But more than that, N.C.'s faculty is <u>committed</u> to Christ, <u>called</u> to serve the church, <u>experienced</u>, and <u>involved</u> in the church. <u>All full time faculty are Assemblies of God</u>. Many of them are ministers; the others have deep roots in the Assemblies of God. When it comes to faculty, N.C. has what it takes to make a college designed for Assemblies of God purposes.

Key questions to ask about the faculty of a college like N.C. are these:

- Do they feel a sense of divine call and placement?
- Are they concerned about spiritual things?
- Do they have experience in the life and culture of the Assemblies of God, in the ministry, and in their teaching beliefs?
- Are they orthodox in their beliefs?
- Are they involved currently in the work of the church?
- How well are they prepared academically to provide a rich and stimulating learning situation?
- Are they deeply committed to Christ, His church and the principles and distinctives of the Assemblies of God?
- Are they disciplers. . . reproducers?

It is the belief of the Administration of Northwest College that a resounding "yes!" can be given to each of these questions when it comes to the faculty of N.C.

A college needs an excellent curriculum, a program of instruction. It takes courses, majors and minors. It takes requirements and electives.

In the case of N.C. this program must be especially designed in such a way as to provide the necessary and right learning and growth opportunities so that students will have opportunity to grow, develop and become what God has called them to be: preachers, missionaries, evangelists, pastors, youth workers, Christian educators, teachers and more.

The curriculum must be rich; and it must be redesigned from time to time to be current. The N.C. faculty and Board of Directors with outside consultation from a practical point of view regularly review and redesign the curriculum.

"I Like All Of It," Said One Student

After his first semester as an N.C. freshman this year, Steve Hoskins, who lives near campus, walked into the living room of his home and quietly announced: "I like all of it" and headed for his room.

His father said, "What do you mean?"

He repeated, "I like all of it . . .the social life, the spiritual life, the academic life. . .all of it!"

With satisfaction his father, an alumnus of N.C. and a member of the Board of Directors who long has demonstrated his concern for N.C. through his personal support, let it be with no further inquiry.

Years before, Steve's father and mother had decided they wanted the influence of N.C. for their children. They purchased a lot, less than one block from campus, and built their residence. Now the father and son . . . and daughter, too . . . pray together in the college chapel at six in the morning. The father was first to do this. The President recalls when the father first asked if the chapel could be open at that time.

The experience of this family shows what it takes to draw full advantage of the opportunity available at N.C. It takes student commitment and involvement in what the college offers. "Invest your support and yourself and you can expect to reap," is the message.




Fifth It Takes...

FACILITIES and RESOURCES

The open Bible on the College seal denotes the source of truth and the foundation on which the total curriculum of N.C. is built.

The small cross and crown have always been in the seal and denote the temporal response required of all believers and the eternal reward awaiting them.

The efficient functioning of a college requires a <u>campus</u>...<u>facilities</u>...<u>equipment</u>...<u>library resources</u>. And N.C. has a fifty-five acre campus strategically located in the beautiful Pacific Northwest. Some say it's one of the nicest campuses for a college its size anywhere. Those who know its history recognize it is the provision of God. If any could be called a "miracle" campus, it could.

Sixth It Takes...ALUMNI

Alumni give evidence of what the college is all about! They are the products. Their lives and ministries say it better than words...better than stories. They are a continuing, growing part of the "whole" of the college.

Alumni really write the record of the college!

N.C. has them. Around the world. The sun never sets on their ministry. They are fulfilling the Alma Mater: "Let light shine out . . ." And in ever increasing numbers, over a hundred are being added per year.

Some have laid down their lives in the cause of Christ and served as shining examples of divine call and grace in ministry. They serve as church leaders, pastors, missionaries, teachers, evangelists, and Christian laymen, working in the church and professions.

Seventh It Takes...FRIENDS

A college, particularly a private college, needs friends. And N.C. has these, more and more churches and individuals who regularly and sacrificially support N.C. with their gifts.

They urge young people to attend. They pray for its ongoing work. They remember it in their wills. They draft trusts and help to build the endowment.

Some are "Centurions" giving at least \$1,000 per year. Others are in the Living Endowment Fellowship making a small but regular contribution. Others serve on the Funding and Endowment Board and seek to build the financial base of N.C. Still others, such as churches, contribute a percentage of their budget monthly. (Two percent in some cases.)

And support like this is what it takes to keep a college such as N.C. alive and well...fulfilling its mission under the blessing of God.
