





NORTHWEST COLLEGE MOVES FORWARD!

Many good things are happening at Northwest College right now. This is a year of action, a year of progress and I'm excited about it and praising God for it.

When hearing some of the story, a friend of N.C. said, "It looks like N.C. is taking quantum leaps forward." I liked that. Something inside of me "leaped" as he said it.

I had talked with him about:

- The reorganization of the administrative team.
- Rich Wilkerson's joining N.C. as Vice President at Large.
- The Seahawks' selection of N.C.'s campus as its permanent training site and the approximate \$5 million development that will result, as well as all the other benefits that would flow to N.C.

- The new Behavioral Science program.
- The Elementary Education program.
- The One Year Certificate of Christian Studies.
- The Christian Formation Department and the new core courses designed to develop and nurture the disciplines of the Christian life in a very practical way.
- The conversion to the semester program and the total review of curriculum.
- The Funding and Endowment Board and the significant gifts which have already come.
- And more!

In talking of all this I used the collegians word, "awesome." And he agreed.

But then I talked of the needs of N.C. right now!

To help meet the needs, the College has launched Operation Help for 1985-1986 with a goal of \$200,000 in extra general fund contributions. And all friends of the College have received special information about it already. The purposes of this funding drive are:

- 1) To balance the 1985-1986 budget. We need between \$35,000 and \$50,000 to do that. This is the first goal.
- 2) To grant a salary increase for faculty and staff this year. Due to "tight" finances as we started the year we were not able to do that. All salaries and wages were kept at the '84-'85 levels. This increase is our second goal.

- 3) To provide additional student aid. How this is needed! To keep students in school.
- 4) To secure computer equipment for accounting, the student aid office and instruction.
- 5) To do a few small campus development projects, some as our part in relation to what the Seahawks are doing.

We have 672 fine students this year. This all adds up to a subsidy share of \$298.06 per student.

We have prayed about this. We believe God will lay this need on the hearts of our friends in our churches, of alumni, of regular contributors to N.C., of pastors. We believe God will raise up new friends and supporters.

I am asking you to pray . . . to give . . . to lead your church to give. N.C. is God's work . . . and we are "labourers together" with Him. I believe He has ordained that we should support His work . . . right here.

Missionaries, pastors, evangelists, associate ministers, Christian teachers and counselors... and many others are being trained at N.C. right now.

Friend of N.C. will you help us... help God do His work at N.C.? Will you write me and let me know you will give one student share of \$298.06 by June 30, 1986? Two shares? More?

I'm praying and looking forward to hearing from you.

1986 FLYING SEMINAR NEARS TAKEOFF

Among other things, archaeologists found the gate system through which Jesus and the common people of Israel would have entered

the temple. Also found were many kmikvahs or ritual bathing cavities in which some scholars believe the first converts to the Christian Church were baptized on the Day of Pentecost. In this vicinity the palaces of the Hebrew kings were located. On the wall was found the "place of trumpeting" to signal special events in the religious calendar of Israel. The hill in the background is the Mount of Olives from whence Jesus the Messiah was taken up into heaven and to which place He will return in great power and glory. SEMESTER SYSTEM STARTS IN 1986



Dr. J. Melvyn Ming, Vice President for Academic Affairs, announces that Northwest College will be on the semester system starting in the fall of 1986.

Dr. J. Melvyn Ming For the past year and a half the faculty and administration have been working on a comprehensive semester conversion process. All full time faculty have been part of one of four working semester task forces. These task forces were chaired by: Dr. Gerald Mercer, Dr. Robert Parlotz, Dr. Daniel Pecota, and Dr. Robert Swaffield.

The results of this process are now going to press for the 1986-1988 NC catalog.

The fall semester will begin in early September and end in mid December. The spring semester will start in early January and end around the first of May. The summer session will take place in May and finish by the first few days in June. This pattern is made possible by the use of 60 minute periods instead of the traditional 50 minute periods. This will allow many students to have a full four months work in the summer.

CORE CURRICULUM IN CHRISTIAN FORMATION!

In a bold move, the faculty of Northwest College has voted to be the first Assemblies of God College to form a core curriculum of Christian Formation!

Every student attending NC will have courses in Christian Formation as part of their academic program. The first semester on campus each student will take C.F. 101 "Foundations of the Christian

Life." This course is an experientially oriented course designed to develop and nurture the disciplines of the spiritual life.





The second semester each student is enrolled in C.F. 102 "Evangelism in the Christian Life." This course is an exami-

nation and application of the scriptural mandate to take the Gospel to our world.

During other semesters while at NC, students may enroll in C.F. 201 "Prayer and Worship." This is an experientially based course on these aspects of the Christian life. We will not just talk about intercessory prayer, we will pray! This course seeks to integrate theory and practice.

We also have a course in Christian Formation on "Women in Ministry." From our earliest beginnings we embraced and support the role of women in ministry. This course actualizes our commitments.

BIBLE CURRICULUM FOR THE 1990's AND 21ST CENTURY

As part of the semester conversion process the Bible faculty task force has produced a new Biblical curriculum design.

All new students will be enrolled in "Survey of the Bible." Don't let the title fool you. This is much more than your traditional Bible survey course. The Bible faculty under the

leadership of Dr. Francis Thee have identified a specific list of cognitive Bible competencies that we expect every student to know before they enroll in any other Bible course. These competencies may be challenged and this course waived. This will assure a common cognitive background and avoid the duplication that was sometimes necessary in the past.

During the sophomore year students will be enrolled in broad Old and New Testament courses (i.e. Pentateuch and Synoptic Gospels).

In the junior year the student will take Biblical background courses like Bible Geography and Archaeology.

The senior year will involve seminars in selected books and/or topics. These highly focused courses will promote indepth analysis and synthesis opportunities not possible with the previous curriculum design.

BRINGING PRACTITIONERS ONTO THE CAMPUS

2nd Annual Pastoral Ministries Lecture Series

November 13-15, 1985

Guest Lecturer: Dr. Warren Bullock

A single phrase can sum up Dr. Warren Bullock's ministry during the second annual Pastoral Ministries Lecture Series recently conducted at Northwest College: "A man sent from God." This was the unanimous expression of the students who attended the series.



Dr. Bullock is a Northwest College alumnus having received a B.A. in 1964 and Th. B. in 1965. After serving as P.R. Director for N.C. he earned his Masters Degree from Seattle Pacific and just recently received his Doctorate from California Graduate School of Theology. Pastor Bullock is the new pastor of Calvary Temple in Seattle. The last eleven years he pastored Spanaway Assembly of God and also has served as Presbyter for the Tacoma Section. It was inspiring to have "one of our own" return for this series.

During the morning chapels, Pastor Bullock addressed the theme of Pentecos-

tal worship. One highlight of these services was his sound Biblical teaching on the utterance gifts of I Corinthians 12 and 14. It was refreshing to hear balanced teaching on when to use these gifts in the service and how to know God wants to use you in these gifts. A second highlight of these services was the sermon on "Providing the Opportunity for Healing." After the sermon all those who were in need of healing were asked to come forward for prayer. Student leaders then laid hands on them and prayed for healing. Many testified to receiving healing in that service.

In afternoon sessions Pastor Bullock spoke on the following topics.

- How to Feed the Flock: Pastoral Preaching
- How to Serve your Staff: Pastoral Administration
- How to Cope with Criticism: Pastoral Responses
- How to Maintain Right Motives: Pastoral Attitudes
- How to Discipline the Disobedient: Pastoral Correction



Especially helpful and practical was his teaching on "How to Discipline the Disobedient: Pastoral Correction." In fact many students commented that this topic was one they had never heard dealt with in such a compassionate and practical way.

Even though Pastor Bullock's thorough and organized presentation received a resounding "Amen," the students were equally as impressed by Pastor Bullock, the man. They heard, saw, and they felt the heartbeat of one of Christ's undershepherds.

I personally feel they received a miniseries in Biblical-pastoral theology from a "man sent from God."

HE TOLD US HOW — THEN SHOWED US THE WAY

FALL SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS SPEAKER: TOM HINTON



Rev. Tom Hinton, Pastor of Boston Worship Center, is a man with a heart for reaching the lost. He was the guest speaker for the Fall Quarter Spiritual Emphasis week. His message, his methods, and himself, challenged the NC students into evangelism. He showed us the way by his life.

Prior to pioneering in Boston, where the church is one year old, Rev. Hinton worked at the international headquarters of the Assemblies of God, Springfield, Missouri. As Ambassadors in Mission (AIM) Field Representative, Hinton coordinated major international and stateside evangelism thrusts. AIM is the youth missionary ministry of the Assemblies of God, the fastest growing denomination in America. In the summer of 1983 more than 1,000 youth and single adults ministered in the country of Jamaica. Annually, more than 10,000 young people are involved in the AIM ministry.

Prior to his AIM assignment, Rev. Hinton was the Assemblies of God Youth and Christian Education Director for the state of Arizona. A graduate of Central Bible College, Springfield, Missouri, Rev. Hinton's first assignment was in Tucson, Arizona, Eastside Assembly of God, as an Associate Pastor.

"The world is a vineyard waiting to be harvested," expressed Pastor Hinton. "In these last days of time we need to do everything we can to bring in the harvest. Missions is the heart beat of our Lord. We must long for the lost to heart the proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

"God is up to something," said Pastor Hinton. "He is raising up an army of dedicated soldiers to do creative evangelism. Without question, the single adult and collegiate ranks are ushering in a second



volunteer movement such as begun in 1886 under the direction of D. L. Moody. The hour is urgent. We must pray like never before that our hearts will be in tune with what the Holy Spirit is wanting to do. That every person would at last make themselves available to God for great missionary exploits is my prayer."

The highlight of the week was Thursday evening as nearly two-hundred stu-

dents, after a time of instruction, went to the streets of downtown Seattle, the University District, and on the Washington State Ferry to Bremerton to witness and



share the good news. They returned to the chapel at 11:00 p.m. to tell of their victories. The spirit of excitement of what God had done will carry into eternity. As students, many who had never witnessed one on one, shared of the miracle working of God's Spirit, you could see that these young people would never be the same. They had caught the vision of reaching the lost by telling the wonderful story of Jesus and His love to those in darkness.

The land will be held in the fund for investment purposes and ultimately sold with the proceeds adding to the growing fund. Dr. DeBock was recently chosen to serve on the new Funding and Endowment Board of the College and the gift expresses his commitment to N.C. with not only his heart and his time but with the resources God has blessed him with.
