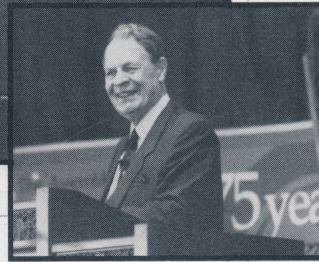

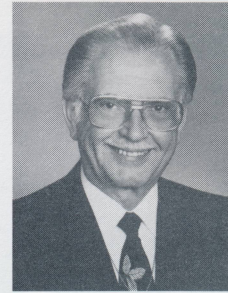

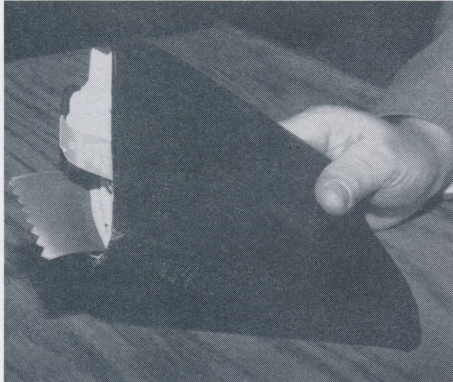

With God's help we will!

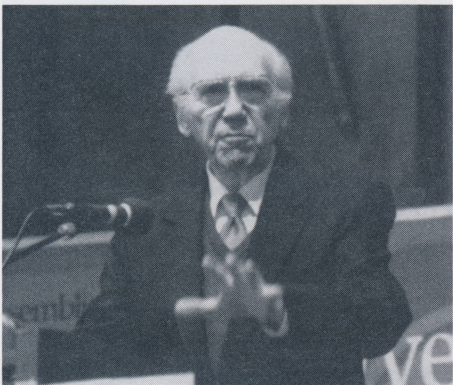


"Daddy" Hanson's Bible

N.C. students enlist as "Decade of Harvest" prayer partners

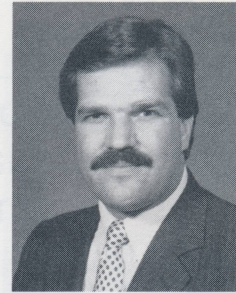
"Where Are They Now ...?"

Andreas Timm of Velbert, West Germany, has been selected by the faculty and graduating class for this significant honor. Andreas brings to this assignment the perspective of a world Christian. He is the son of West German missionaries to India and has attended school in India, West Germany and the United States. Andreas holds the Teacher's Training Certificate from Universitat Essen, West Germany and will receive his Bachelor of Arts (Biblical Literature/Pastoral Ministries) from N.C. This promising scholar and minister is investigating further study at seminary in the United States or pastoral ministry in West Germany.

Rev. Paul Goodman, newly elected District Superintendent of Montana, will be addressing the 1989 graduates of N.C. at the May 5th Baccalaureate service. Rev. Goodman, an alumnus of N.C. (1965 B.A. and Th.B.) and

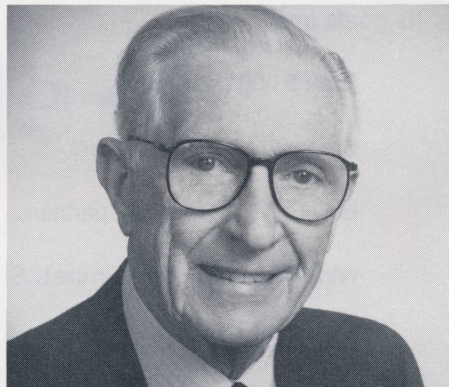


Rev. Paul Goodman

presently serves on the college's Board of Directors. His pastoral ministry in Superior, Great Falls, Lewistown, and most recently, Helena, Montana, insure that this member of the General Presbytery of the Assemblies of God will offer a message of encouragement and challenge to the graduates.

As a special part of the 7:00 p.m., Friday Baccalaureate service, the Class of 1989 will be served communion by the faculty. President Hurst will officiate this meaningful service in the Butterfield Chapel.

Dr. J. Robert Ashcroft, President Emeritus of Berean College of the Assemblies of God, will be featured as the Commencement speaker. Dr. Ashcroft, longtime member of the educational community, has made sig-

nificant contributions to the field of Christian education and is listed in Who's Who in American Education. For sixteen years he served as president of Evangel College, during five of which he was also president of Central Bible College.

In September, 1982, Ashcroft was named president of Valley Forge Christian College of the Assemblies of God, Phoenixville, PA. From 1985 through 1988, he was president of Berean College of the Assemblies of God, a non-traditional distance education college in Springfield, MO. As President Emeritus of Berean College, he actively represents the college in external affairs.

Three books and numerous magazine articles have been authored

by Ashcroft. He is also widely known as a speaker for conferences, retreats, and seminars.

Dr. & Mrs. Ashcroft have three sons: John, Missouri's governor; Robert, a Kansas City financial consultant; and Wesley, a businessman in Springfield.

115 graduates will be honored at the 1989 Graduation exercises. The services will feature sacred music presented by the King's Choralons and the combined choirs of the Northwest Sounds and the King's Choralons.

Music Major Mark Brown will direct the Brass Ensemble during the Commencement service. Mark hails from San Bernardino, California. Dr. Dwaine Braddy will be studying at the Institute of Holy Land Studies in Jerusalem.

Larry Malcolm will be spending two weeks

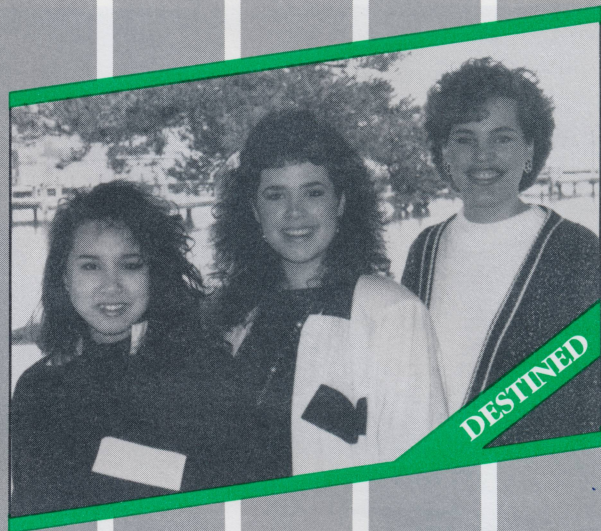

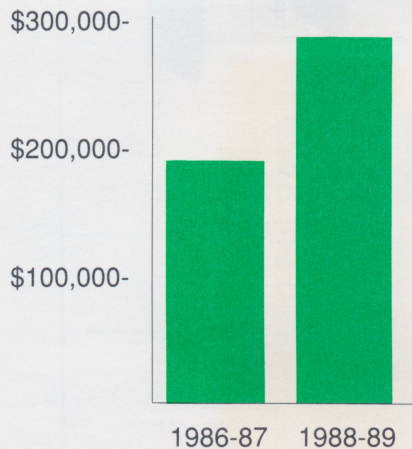

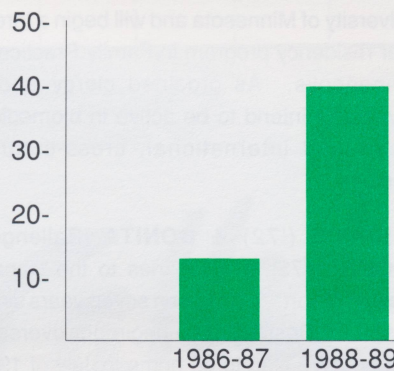
AVAILABLE SCHOLARSHIPS SHOW DRAMATIC INCREASE

Scholarship funding plays a vital role in making college a reality for many students. In the last two years, scholarships provided by N.C. have increased \$100,000, from \$180,000 to \$280,000. During this same period, private donor scholarships (many of which are endowed) increased over 300% with 40 scholarships having recently been awarded for next year.

ALUMNI HOPE TO MORE THAN DOUBLE SCHOLARSHIPS
