1989 Baccalaureate and Commencement

The academic year came to a close on May 5th and 6th with the activities of the fifty-third commencement at Northwest College. With 115 graduates, the total graduated from the College now stands at 4,119. This year's graduates represented 16 states, and 8 graduates were international students, having come to Northwest College from the following countries: Canada, Greece, Japan, Taiwan, West Germany, and Zambia.

The Baccalaureate Service, held on Friday evening, featured student speaker, Andreas Timm, from West Germany; a communion service for the graduates; and guest speaker, Rev. Paul Goodman, Superintendent of the Montana District. Timm challenged his classmates to fulfill God's purpose for their lives by serving their generation as leaders of God's people, and as witnesses to the lost (see accompanying article). "As leaders...we need to be concerned that all men would worship God and that his presence would pervade our lives," Timm said. Goodman encouraged the students to give God their best, because the world expects it, God's word requires it, love demands it, and God deserves it. Goodman asserted that, "I believe we have evidence here that there are those who are giving their best to God."

On Saturday afternoon hundreds of relatives, friends, and students joined with the graduates in the Northwest Pavilion for the Commencement ceremonies. It was an impressive sight with the Board of Directors, Administration, and Faculty all seated together on the new, expanded stage. Highlights of the ceremonies included music from the combined traveling choirs, Northwest Sounds and King's Choralons, the presentation of special awards and honors, the commencement address by Dr. J. Robert Ashcroft, and, of course, the conferral of degrees. Dr. Ashcroft is President Emeritus of Berean College and resides in Springfield, Missouri.

During the ceremonies numerous other awards and honors were given to graduates, alumni, former board members, and to one former administrator (see pages 3 and 6).

In his commencement address, Ashcroft admonished this year's graduates to allow the spark which has been ignited in their lives at NC to grow into a flame which will "get a great fire going." He stated, "When we know Jesus Christ, there is an illumination and discrimination between right and wrong, ugly and

beautiful, and better and best." We are thankful for this year's graduates, and we pray God's best for them as they live out the call of God on their lives in the future and share in the Decade of Harvest just ahead.

Student Speaker Shines

"Witness...witness...witness," said student baccalaureate speaker, Andreas Timm as he represented and greatly typified his fellow graduates. He, like they, had been called and led. He, like they, had responded to the growth opportunity at Northwest College.

Andreas was born to West German A/G missionaries in India. He was brought up there until age I6, attending boarding school with his three sisters. Andreas committed his life to Christ many times as a young child but, "I really began to live life as an overcomer after the age of I2," he says.

"At age I6 I was baptized in water in the swimming pool of the school! I had the choice of being baptized at home or at school and chose school because I wanted to witness to my school mates," he says, and continues, "It was a great experience!"

As Andreas began to consider full time ministry, he decided to attend an English-speaking Bible college and chose Northwest College on the recommendation of alumnus missionary, Ron Tuttle.

Andreas came to Northwest College three years ago and found everyone so friendly. When asked about his classes he replied, "The teaching is balanced...thorough and excellent. The professors have made me think. It has not just been spoon feeding but thinking...coming to my own conclusions. This is basically what has formed me." Andreas majored in Biblical Literature and minored in Pastoral Ministries.

Andreas left May 26 to return to Germany. He is looking forward to youth ministry and foreign missions with the German A/G MAPS program they're just starting. He is interested in teaching in Germany or overseas.

Andreas opened his remarks to his classmates saying, "Three years ago I flew in from Germany to study at Northwest College and the first day here I wanted to fly back home. Today, three years later, I don't want to leave. I'm going to miss this college...these have been some of the most formative years of our lives." Earlier Andreas had concluded his interview saying, "I'll send as many Germans back to NC as I can...as long as they don't stay in America." He had come to Northwest College with a sense of call and mission; he left with that same sense of mission...and prepared.

1989 Commencement... A Time to Honor and Remember.

During this year's commencement over 35% of the graduates received academic honors. Many also were honored for leadership, for distinct contributions to their school and class and for many other reasons.

Many others were honored, too. Not only the graduates are on "exhibit" at commencement but the college, itself, and all who have made it what it is are, in effect, on "display," as well. Board members, former administrators and alumni were placed in "evidence" as examples of commitment and excellent service.

Former Dean Waymon "Tex" Rutledge received the faculty Delta Tau award, the faculty Order of Honor. "Tex" had served the college for over eleven years as Dean of Students. Joining him as a fellow recipient of the Delta Tau award at the vote of the faculty was Rev. Erwin Rohde, former Montana District Superintendent, who served on the college Board of Directors 18 years. He was the "candy man" for the Board, always bringing snacks to its meeting.

Also honored at the commencement was former Superintendent Frank Mc-Allister for his long and distinguished ministry. Upon the vote of the Board of Directors he received the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity. In the citation read, he was commended for his long pastoral career serving churches in Alaska, Idaho and Washington; for district leadership first as Assistant and then District Superintendent; for his service to the college as Board member and Chairman; and for his service to our church nationally shown in so many ways. The citation identified his "sterling Christian spirit," a fact to which all who know him will attest.



For The Students \$150,000 Campaign Will Refurbish SUB And Athletic Field

At the May meeting the College Board of Directors announced the 1989-90 fund raising campaign for \$150,000. Gifts and contributions will renovate the Student Union Building and construct a multi-purpose athletic field for intramurals, soccer practice, softball and baseball.

It was announced that the \$150,000 campaign will begin on June 1, 1989, and that construction of the projects would begin immediately.

The College Bookstore located in the SUB will also get a "face-lift" this summer to better serve the needs of students.

Renovation of the Student Union Building is scheduled to be completed by the time students return to attend classes this fall. The athletic field will be completed and available for student use the following season.

The Student Union Building is the only remaining original building from the navy war housing days, and was previously renovated in 1960 through contributions from NC students when the campus moved from Calvary Temple in Seattle to Kirkland. The new construction will include a complete exterior renovation, placement of energy-efficient windows, development of a campus clock tower, construction of a plaza and porch entrance way, improvement of handicap access, and bookstore improvements.

President D. V. Hurst stated, "I am thrilled with the action of the Board of Directors in approving the renovation of the Student Union Building and the construction of the new athletic field. With the completion of the beautiful boulevard entrance way into the campus, the Student Union Building will now be at the very heart of the campus." The NC Snack Shack, Bookstore, KCNC Radio Station, Student Activity Room, yearbook office, and Student Body Offices are all located in the SUB.


