ALUMNUS TO RETURN AS PRESIDENT

The Rev. Denny Davis has received an unanimous call from the Board of Directors of Northwest College to become its fourth President. The Chairman of the Board of Directors, the Rev. Eugene Born, announced this news to the faculty and administration on Thursday, May 3 and at Baccalaureate on Friday, May 4. The Rev. Davis will follow Dr. D.V. Hurst, who is retiring after twenty-four and one-half years of service as the College's President.

Rev. Davis is an alumnus of Northwest College, having graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Theology in 1956. He has had close ties with his Alma Mater through the years serving as its Alumni President for five years and serving on the Board of Directors since 1982. He has also been honored by Northwest College as alumnus of the year in 1975, and by his selection to the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society in 1976.

Since 1987, Rev. Davis has served as Superintendent of the Oregon District of the Assemblies of God which is comprised of over 200 churches across that state. Prior to his election to the superintendency, he served for twenty years as pastor of the People's Church in Salem, Oregon. He also pastored in Pacific Grove, California and Rainier, Oregon, as well as serving as an evangelist and crusade speaker for four years.

While pastor at the People's Church in Salem, Rev. Davis saw the church increase 700 percent in attendance. For three consecutive years it was recognized as the fastest growing congregation in the Oregon District of

the Assemblies of God. During these years the church relocated to a multi-million dollar facility on a thirteen acre campus in Salem.

Rev. Davis has served on numerous boards and committees, including: the Assemblies of God General Presbytery since 1985, the Oregon District Presbytery, 1976 to 1981 and 1985 to 1990, the Assemblies of God National Home Missions Board, and on the Board of Directors for two other Assemblies of God Colleges. He was also a member of the Salem Ministerial Association for twenty-

three years serving as its President from 1971 to 1973. He served also as President of the East Salem Rotary Club in 1979; he has been a member there since 1971.

Rev. Davis has conducted over 200 evangelistic crusades, and spoken in many seminars, camps, camp meeting, and conventions. His travels have taken him to Malaysia, Singapore, Germany, Austria, Portugal, Brazil, Colombia, Nicaragua, Peru,

Panama, El Salvador, and Canada, as well as throughout the western United States.

At the Baccalaureate service on Friday, May 4, at which he was the speaker, Rev. Davis expressed his eagerness to return to his alma mater and said he looked forward to "fellowship with his new family."

Rev. Davis and his wife, Nancy, have one son, Jeff, who serves on the pastoral staff of Puyallup Assembly of God in Puyallup, Washington. Denny and Nancy will be moving to Kirkland during the summer and he will assume the duties of College President on August 1, 1990.

1990 BACCALAUREATE AND COMMENCEMENT

The academic year came to a close on May 4th and 5th with the activities of the fifty-fourth commencement at Northwest College. With 136 graduates, the total graduated from the College now stands at 4,255. This year's graduates represented 19 states, and 2 graduates were international students, having come to Northwest from Finland and Kenya.

The Baccalaureate Service, held on Friday evening, featured student speaker, Jay Anderson; music by the King's Choralons; a communion service for the graduates; and guest

speaker, Rev. Denny Davis ('56), Superintendent of the Oregon District. Drawing upon scriptures in Isaiah, Exodus, and the Psalms, Davis encouraged the graduates with the fact that God has promised to go before them and guide them with His presence. Davis said, "With the blood of the cross, the presence of the living Jesus, and the power of the Holy Ghost, you're better than enough" to go forth with power into the world.

On Saturday afternoon hundreds of friends and relatives joined with the graduates in the Northwest Pavilion for the Commencement ceremonies. Highlights of the afternoon included music from the Festival Chorale and Band; the presentation of special awards and honors(see page 6); the commencement address by the Honorable John Ashcroft, Governor of Missouri; and, of course, the conferral of degrees.

In his commencement address, Ashcroft reminded this year's graduates that God gives us the ability to make choices, and that those choices count. He urged the students to make choices which are consequential. Ashcroft stated that "The most satisfying awareness you can have is found in joining forces with the Creator of the universe in achieving His purpose." He went on to conclude that "Having been made in God's image, we are invited to be pleasing in His sight."

Dr. Hurst, the third President of the College in its fifty-five year history, has served the college since 1966. During his tenure the college campus has grown from its original 35 acres to its present sixty acres. He has directed the development of the campus through fourteen major projects, nearly completing the campus master plan.

Dr. Hurst led the college to academic accreditation and has been instrumental in encouraging and enabling significant faculty development to serve a strong, growing academic program. He cited this as one of his most significant accomplishments.

As noted by members of the board of directors, President Hurst's leadership has been balanced, and spiritual. Henry Portin, Rev. Frank Cole, and Rev. Eugene Born all cited Dr. Hurst's capable, efficient, fiscally sound management of the college as one of his greatest contributions to Northwest College.


