INAUGURAL CHARGE TO THE PRESIDENT

GIVEN BY REV. FRANK E. COLE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD, NORTHWEST COLLEGE

4:1-7

Christianity is committed to education, but it is a mark of our time that education is not committed to Christianity. America supports higher education generously, but some areas of higher education do not support America in its moral and spiritual needs.

task can be one of the most rewarding in life. To be involved in the ministry of NORTHWEST COLLEGE of the ASSEMBLIES OF GOD is both challenging and rewarding.

There are five phases of life and work of a Christian college:

- 1. A Christian college is one where the education enterprise is carried out in a spirit of reverence. It begins with God. It does not seek to prove Him; it presupposes Him--His existence, His anointing provision, His lordship.
- 2. A Christian college is one which seeks to transmit to its students the rich cultural heritage of the Church.
- 3. A Christian college is a "community in Christ." Even Augustine, prince of thinkers, was not converted by philosophical arguments alone, but by the living witness of friends.
- 4. A Christian college does not cultivate learning for its own sake, or for its value to the student, but as an instrument of service to others.

5. Finally, a Christian college has one of its explicit goals to bring the student to stand face to face with God.

Christian education must seek to produce the excellent student. The faculty must assist him in his ability to think, to analyze problems, to receive the thoughts, and to appreciate significant intellectual and artistic achievements. Beyond the cultivation of disciplined ability and awareness there lies the necessity of encouraging the student to develop a personal philosophy of life and a sense of values based on commitment to the authority of God's Word, the Lordship of Christ, and the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

I believe education, next to the Gospel, is the finest treasure we can give our young people. Our Church has a vital role to fill in training young people. And I know Northwest College has something distinctive to offer in the field of education.

I also believe in the importance of education. God has dealt with people throughout all time in an educative manner. It would appear that our Church does not share this conviction to the fullest extent, for such a small percentage of its dollar is earmarked for education. But an increasing number of people, both in the ministry and in the laity, are beginning to feel this burden.

President Davis, your fulfillment will be found as the cardinal graces of the Lord, faith, hope, and love, possess your life and flow out in your ministry. May God bless you.

Inaugural Prayer by Rev. Paul Goodman (excerpted)

"Our Father in heaven, there's a sense of humility in our hearts this morning. We recognize that as we sought Your face for this most important decision regarding the presidency of Northwest College, You gave us favor.

The "Galloping Gourmet" Gives Testimony

Graham Kerr, known as the "Galloping Gourmet," walked to the chapel rostrum, tore up his prepared notes and stated that President Davis had requested his life story. For 25 minutes the student body was galvanized by the message of God's grace in the life of this king of cuisine.

Growing up in Europe, in the hotel business, his concept of success was unlimited material possessions and respect from other people. It all came together on international television where he did 195 shows a year with Treena, his wife, as Producer. Then it began to come apart. A tragic auto accident in 1971 prevented them from

working so they bought a yacht. Their marriage began to flounder on the shoals of self interest. "I knew that my self-ish pursuit of pleasure had finally destroyed the one person who I loved more than

my own life. It was our family doctor that broke the news; 'Your wife needs to go to a mental institution for an indeterminate period of time.'"

Treena found new life through a young black maid, who, seeing the

shipwreck of her life, asked a simple question, "Why don't you give your problems to God?" Treena responded, "Alright God, you do it; I can't do it anymore."

The doctor confirmed her overnight healing; "I'm a Roman Catholic, I believe in miracles, but I've never seen one." Then his eyes filled with tears as he added softly..."but I have now; your wife is completely well."

Graham began to watch her, saw the completeness of her change and experienced God's love and grace through his transformed wife. "I asked God if I too might receive a miracle. Thirty days later, at the end of a very long day in the studios, hundreds of miles from my home and family, I found myself on my knees in the middle of my hotel room. I blurted out, 'I want a personal relationship with you (God) just like Treena has.' Nothing happened. Then I shouted, 'What do I have to say to get to know vou like Treena does?' Immediately. on my next breath and without forming the words in my mind I said, 'Jesus, I love you' and immediately my life changed. I felt loved--truly loved and the pleasure of that moment literally wiped out my past pursuits of hedonism. Four days later, I was home and for the first time in our thirty years of knowing each other...we prayed together."

End of story? No, it was only the beginning.

Spiritual Emphasis Week With Linfield Crowder

"Saddam Hussein is not in charge. President Bush is not in charge. God is in charge."

The speaker was Linfield Crowder. He was addressing the students during the spiritual emphasis week of early October. Since graduation with the class of '53, Crowder has ministered in 57 nations and in all of our 50 states.

Well versed on Middle-Eastern Countries and culture he stated, "Iraq is Babylon, Babylon is Iraq. It could be countdown. There is no way you can be a Biblical literalist without


