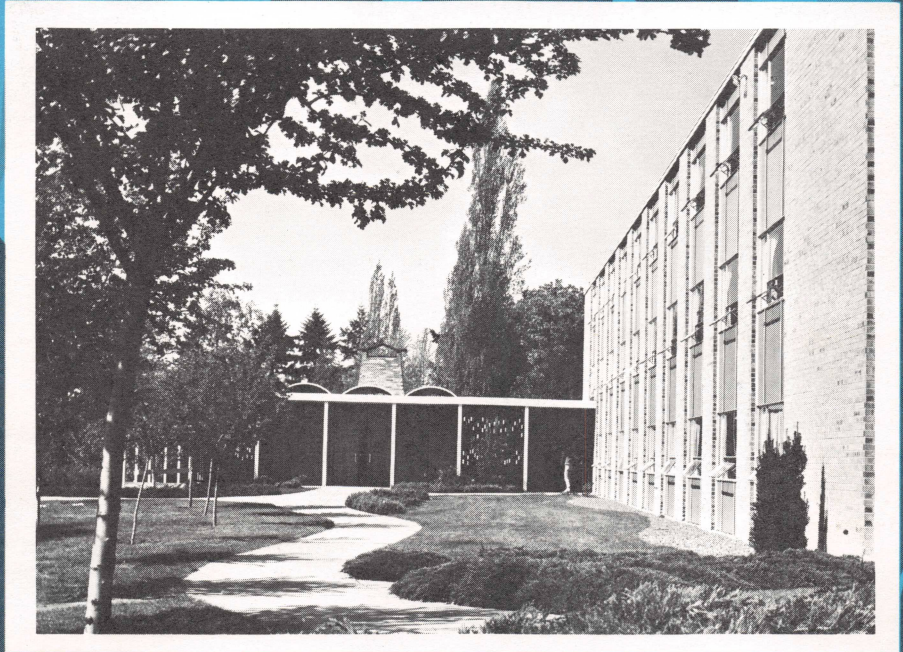
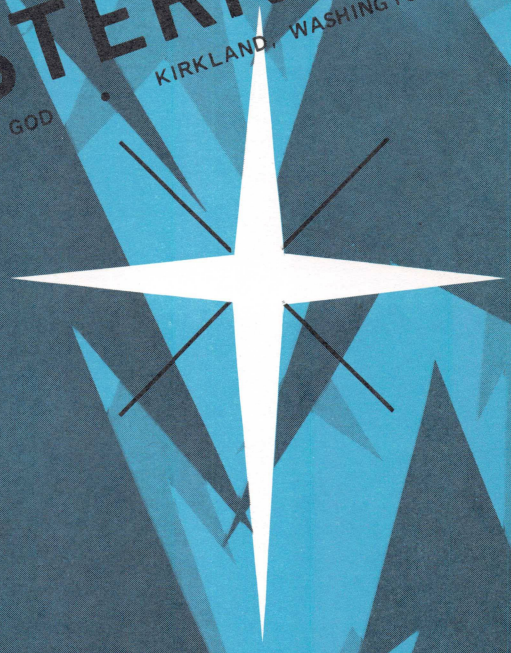

Speaking the Truth . . . in Love

Some years ago I yielded to sales pressure and purchased a fine set of 40 volumes, **The Great Ideas**. In perusing the syntopican, the two introductory volumes, I was intrigued by the article on truth. The writer had quoted Josiah Royce's definition of one who told an untruth as "one who misplaced his ontological predicates" or simply as one who thinks one thing and says another.

This simple line drawn between telling the truth and telling an untruth has remained with me. But the problem is really more difficult than that. How can one be sure he speaks the truth?

Learned men **thought** they did when they said the world was flat. Later they found it was not. They **thought** they spoke the truth when they said the sun went around the earth and the earth was the center of the universe! Again they **thought** they spoke the truth when they said matter could not be destroyed. But new findings have changed men's thoughts. So, how can man be sure now? And when he deals with even more primary things like his own nature and his eternal destiny? And when he stands before God and gives answers?

Pilate's questions, "What is truth?" remains in doubt until one accepts the answer he received. Jesus Christ is truth! And not until one knows Him does one know truth.

But, how can one know Him now and be sure? He is gone!

Jesus, Himself, said it would be the work of the Holy Spirit to make Him known. "When He, the Spirit of Truth, is come, He shall guide you into all truth . . . he shall receive of mine and shall shew . . . he shall glorify me." (John 14) Earlier Jesus said, "At that day ye shall know . . ." According to Jesus' own teaching there is a positiveness and an absoluteness associated with the Holy Spirit revelation of Him.

It is the witness of the Spirit in the heart to the truth of God's word, the truth of one's

Lay Council to Hear Special Speakers

Northwest College Lay Council officers have announced that guest speakers at the Council's Lay Council meet April 12-14, will be a well-known Oregon pastor, the Reverend Murray McLees of Eugene, and a well-known international business executive, Mr. Andrew Nelli of Los Angeles.

The Reverend McLees will be on campus as the college's spring quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week speaker and will address the Council at a combined meeting with the student body Friday evening, April 12. Mr. Andrew E. Nelli will address the Council at its Saturday morning meeting and at its annual banquet on April 13. Mr. Nelli is vice-president and treasurer of the General Milk Co., based in Los Angeles, Calif. He is a world traveler and international business expert and serves on several trade councils, and on several denominational and interdenominational church and missionary boards.

The Council will convene on the college campus in Kirkland to pursue a two-day schedule of study, plenary sessions, fellowship, and spiritual quest, Council Secretary H. W. Crowder indicated. The week-end schedule for the meet was hailed a success when it was employed for the first time at the third annual meeting last year, it was said.

Climaxing the Council's meeting will be its annual banquet to be held in the newly enlarged College Dining Facility on Saturday, April 13.

Campus Day Set For April 5th

Northwest College will throw open its doors on April 5 to several hundred high school seniors, other high schoolers, parents, and pastors at its ninth annual campus visitation day, College President D. V. Hurst announced recently. Featured speaker at the chapel service being planned for the day will be the Reverend Ward Tanneberg of Kirkland, Washington, Youth Director for the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God. An alumnus of the college, the Reverend Mr. Tanneberg has devoted considerable effort to college youth in the denomination, it was noted.

Heading the faculty committee at the college which is planning for the day is Dean of Students, Jack V. Rozell. Dean Rozell explained that the purpose of the event is to acquaint young people with the educational opportunities available to them at

Northwest College. He indicated that the program will provide for campus tours, class visitation in the morning hours, a special chapel service and an academic workshop. The academic workshop will be led by the college's Dean of Education, Frank B. Rice.

While the college will be hosting the young people at lunch, pastors and college representatives will be hosted at the President's Luncheon, it was indicated. In the evening, the Associated Student Body will sponsor an inspirational and musical program for the guests remaining on campus. Dean Rozell pointed out that the program is scheduled in such a way as to permit an early afternoon departure for those having to travel distances to get back to their homes.

The annual event has become a tradition on the campus and has shown a steady increase in visitors since the college moved to its new location in 1959. The Campus Day Committee anticipates the number of guests this year will be equal to or more than the record of 650 guests on the visitor roster last year.

Everett Crusade Acclaimed

District and College Youth Action Crusade leaders have heralded the Everett Youth Action Crusade held January 27-28 as an eminent success. Citing some statistics of accomplishment, Mr. George Johnson, Northwest College student who serves as corp director for the Crusades, pointed to the enthusiastic teamwork of the 68 Northwest College students and the 15 youth from Bethany Temple who joined in a door-

to-door witnessing crusade and a Saturday night youth rally to see 14 "definite decisions for Christ." Mr. Johnson reported that the young people gave out 4,200 tickets of invitation to high school and junior high school youth to the rally held in Normanna Hall in Everett and made calls at 2,500 Everett homes to give a direct witness for Christ and to leave Gospel literature.

Highlighting and concluding the week-end of activities was the "commissioning" service in Bethany Temple Sunday evening,

when the visiting team from the College stood behind the youth and other members of the Everett congregation in an impressive act of dedication and prayer connoting their commissioning for the task of continuing what was begun.

As a result of a recent crusade on Queen Anne Hill, Seattle, fifteen families were added to the congregation of the Queen Anne Assembly of God Church. Crusades are now being planned for Tacoma, on February 17-18; Lake Stevens, April 27-28 and Spokane on dates yet to be announced.

NEW LONG PLAY RECORD PRODUCED

Northwest College Music director, Dorothy Amundsen, announced recently the release of a new long-play record album featuring choral music by the College's concert choir, The Nor'Westones, a smaller choral group, and The Ambassadors, a men's trio. Entitled "The Lord is My Light," the record features a "Sermon in Song" by the concert choir centering around the gospel account of blind Bartimaeus. A special dimension of realism was experienced by the choir and by soloist Gary Bunning, who sang the part of Bartimaeus, when Mr. Bunning experienced a remarkable healing in his left eye while singing the same words uttered by Bartimaeus when healed by Christ, "Thou Son of David, have mercy on me."

Missionary Emphasis Said Practical

Northwest College students received some practical instruction and orientation to the world of missions at the College January 15-19 from veteran missionary Everett L. Phillips of the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God. The missionary emphasis theme was accompanied by the color and atmosphere of a missionary convention as the student missionary society decorated the chapel foyer with colorful displays.

In his messages to the students, the Reverend Mr. Phillips undertook to disillusion prospective missionaries as to the "glamour and glow of overseas tourism," so often associated with missionary work. Expressed in graphic language, College President D. V. Hurst said, "He walked down the main street of missionary service and pushed open every door as he went, examining the merchandise inside." Assessing the personal values behind the speaker's message, the president noted that a "rich and exemplary life of a veteran missionary" was evidenced in each message.

As to student responses, President Hurst said, "It is my opinion that missionaries were born in this emphasis week."

Students Meet Superintendents

Northwest College students were brought into contact with the District Superintendents of the districts of the Assemblies of God making up the Pacific Northwest regional councils of the denomination in the second annual Superintendents' Week observed on the campus January 22-30. Guest speakers from among the visiting superintendents occupied the chapel pulpit during the week, and ministerial students were afforded an opportunity to confer with the district men. The superintendents also were able to have lunch with students from their respective district in the college cafeteria, it was indicated.

College President D. V. Hurst viewed the week as an "effective bridge affording students opportunity to integrate into the ministry" — something the president regards as a "needy area in church life." He also viewed the week as a "strong means of communication between the college and the various districts it serves."

Participating in the week were representatives from the Northwest, Montana, Southern Idaho, Oregon and Alaska Districts of the Assemblies of God.

Featuring the Faculty

Professor Francis Thee has served on the faculty of Northwest College in the field of Bible and biblical languages since the

autumn of 1963. Originating from Lexington, Missouri, he attended Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri, where he received his B. A. degree in 1957, his M. A. in 1959. He is a member of the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society.

Upon graduating from Bible College, he served as assistant pastor at the Woodmere Gardens Tabernacle in Grand Rapids, Michigan from 1959 to 1961. In the summer of 1961 he entered the graduate school of Theology at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Illinois, and was graduated Magna Cum Laude with his M. A. degree in the field of New Testament Studies in January, 1963. While at Wheaton he also served as a graduate assistant.

Professor Thee's academic pursuits took him to still a third school, the University of Chicago, where he embarked upon graduate studies in the department of New Testament and Early Christian Literature in 1962-63. These studies were interrupted by his response to a call to join the faculty of Northwest College in the fall of 1963. It is Professor Thee's plan to take a leave of absence from his teaching duties at the college during the coming academic year in order to return to the University of Chicago to complete his residence work for his Ph. D.

Mrs. Thee is the former Mary Ellen Bartlett of Grand Rapids, Michigan whom Mr. Thee met during his student days at Central Bible College. Professor and Mrs. Thee have one son, Paul, age seven.

The Northwest College Eagles basketball squad brought back two more victories in conference play in Portland recently to rack up a season tally of seven wins and one loss to date. The team won over Multnomah School of the Bible in a 81-77 score and over Concordia College with a 92-67 score. The one loss was given up to Columbia Christian College in Portland in the earlier part of the season, the record shows. The Eagles share first-place standing with Columbia Christian College.

Assistant Eagles' coach, LeRoy Johnson, applauded the team-work of the squad and the scoring record of Dennis LaMance for the Eagles' week-end success. LaMance piled up 25 points in the game with Concordia and 27 points in the game with Multnomah, Coach Johnson reported.

Remaining conference play for the Eagles will be on home court. The public is invited to attend.

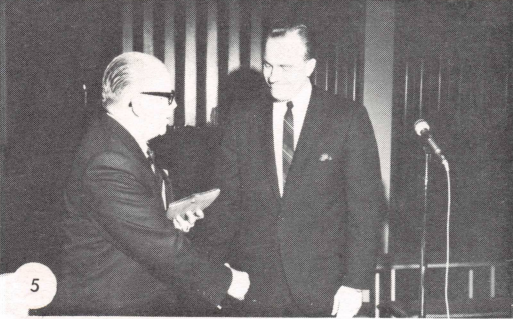
