Oregon Pastor To Be Campus Speaker

The Reverend Murray McLees, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church of Eugene, Oregon will be the Spring Quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week speaker at the College, April 8-12, College President D. V. Hurst

announced recently. The Reverend Mr. McLees, who pastors one of the Oregon District's largest Assemblies of God churches, originated in Rawlins, Wyoming and pursued medical training at the University of Wyoming before enrolling in Central Bible College to train for

the ministry. After his theological training in Springfield, Mo., he returned to his home town of Rawlins to pioneer the Assemblies of God Church there. During his Wyoming pastorate he served as District Youth president of the Wyoming District and as Prison Chaplain of the Wyoming State Penitentiary

In connection with his present pastorate in Eugene, he puts on a weekly telecast called "The Pastor's Study" over the facilities of ABC affiliate station KEZI-TV, which covers a listening area of 300,000 persons, it was said.

The Reverend McLees will speak twice daily to the College student-body—once during the morning chapel hour at 9:40 a.m. and each evening at 7:30 p.m. The services are open to the general public.

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Andrew Nelli to Address Lay Council

Mr. Andrew E. Nelli, vice president and treasurer of the General Milk Company, the Internation Division of the Carnation Company based in Los Angeles, will be one of the two speakers who will address the Northwest College Lay Council at its fourth annual meeting on the campus, April 12-13. Preceding Mr. Nelli as a Council speaker will be the Reverend Murray McLees, well-known pastor of the Eugene, Oregon First Assembly of God Church, who will be on campus as the College's Spring Quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week speaker. The Lay Council will join the student body at the concluding service of the Emphasis Week which will also be the initial event on the Council's two-day schedule at the campus.

Coming as the featured speaker for the Lay Council, Mr. Nelli's business insight and experience stem from his work in the financial affairs of the company he serves, including its operating subsidaries and affiliated companies around the world. His business responsibilities require him to travel extensively abroad, and he annually visits countries in which the company has operations.

Mr. Nelli is a member of the National Foreign Trade Council, the Western International Trade Group and is chairman of the Regional Expansion Council in Los Angeles. In his global travels he visits many countries to determine investment climate and business possibilities and works in close contact with financial institutions and U.S. Government officials. A Certified Public Accountant, he was trained at Fordham University, (B.S.); Columbia University (M.A.) and Harvard University (A.M.A.).

In the field of church and missionary work Mr. Nelli serves as a chairman of the Board of Directors of the Far East Broadcasting Company, an interdenominational missionary broadcasting enterprise, which blankets the Orient with Christian Gospel broadcasting. He is also active in the work of the Assemblies of God denomination. The Reverend Dr. Thomas F. Zimmerman, General Superintendent of the General Council of the Church acclaimed his church work as service "with distinction in many key roles in the work of the Assemblies of God," including his present post as chairman of the General Council Finance Committee and as a member of the denomination's special committee on evangelism known as "Advance." In a written statement, Dr. Zimmerman also paid him high commendation for exemplary personal Christian character and spiritual leadership.

Giving leadership to the 175-member Lay Council of business and professional men from throughout the Pacific Northwest and Alaska is Yakima business man, Mr. Donald Skidmore. College President D. V. Hurst indicated that the Council's work and recommendations have been of invaluable assistance to the College Board of Directors and

C.A. DIRECTOR TO SPEAK ON PRESSURES ON YOUTH

The Reverend Ward Tanneberg, Northwest District Youth Director, will address high school seniors and campus visitors on a contemporary youth theme, "World—Get off my Back" at the Campus Day at the College April 5, it was announced recently. In his message the Reverend Mr. Tanneberg will deal with the pressures young people are facing today in making the major decisions of their lives. He will also touch on the means of grace available to Christian young people.

Directing the Campus Day activities at the college will be Jack V. Rozell, Dean of Students. He reports that campus guests will register in the lounge of Beatty Hall and will then be conducted by student guides on tours of the campus. An opportunity to visit some classes will be given. High point in the day's events will be a special chapel service featuring the College Music Department and the message by Reverend Tanneberg.

An Informatorium directed by the College's Dean of Education, Frank B. Rice, will be designed to present information about available programs at the college and other academic matters. Special presentations by the Associated Student Body will be made, which will include the traditional evening Singspiration service in the college chapel. The schedule will again be designed for early afternoon departure for those needing to drive distances to get back to their homes, it was noted.

\$102,000 Approved In Student Aid

Northwest College Business Manager, Owen S. Hodges, recently announced that preliminary approval has been given to the college's application for government student-aid funds totaling \$102,000 for the coming school year. The monies will be used to fund three current student aid programs in which the college participates and which are administered by the college under provisions of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the Office of Economic Opportunity. About one-third of the expected allocation will provide low-interest, long-term student loans through the National Defense Student Loan Program, and about one-half of the allocation will fund what is known as the Workstudy Program, to provide educationallyoriented on-campus employment for students attending the College from low-income families. The remaining part of the allocation will fund Economic Opportunity Grants to needy students with recognized ability to succeed, it was said.

The business office indicated that the college also participates in the United Student Air Program, a private loan fund, jointly sponsored by the college and participating banks. This program provides loans for educational purposes and is administered through local banks through the country.

Serving as instructor in the department is Miss Esther Dine of Wheatridge, Colorado. Hailing from a family of one brother and four sisters, Miss Dine received her education up through high school in Colorado and then enrolled in Evangel College in Springfield, Mo., in 1959, where she majored in Business Education. While in college she was given several honors, including the Student National Education Association Phi Beta Lambda Club Scholarship award in 1961-62, and the Wall Street Journal Award in 1963. She also served as Associated Student Body Treasurer at the College in 1962-63. She graduated from Evangel with her Bachelor of Business Administration degree in 1963.

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Dr. C. E. Butterfield Speaks to ASB

Dr. C. E. Butterfield, President Emeritus of Northwest College addressed the student body at the College on February 8 and left the same day for Europe to fulfill a sixweeks' schedule of speaking engagements in Scandinavia. This was the second time for Dr. Butterfield to address the students since he retired from the presidency of the college in June of 1966.

Dr. Butterfield recounted briefly his activities since then-mostly in fulfillment of two trips abroad - one which took him and Mrs. Butterfield around the world, and the other which took him to Europe and the Middle East last fall. He stated that these trips have taken him to several "iron curtain" countries and twice to Israel, where he conferred with some of the Israeli leaders. He explained that his conference with Israeli officials was in the interests of clarifying his own thinking on biblical prophetic themes. Dr. Butterfield also indicated that he had received a very warm welcome from Christians whom he had met in the Communist countries. and that he has sought to encourage them amidst the difficult political circumstances in which they live. He added that he hopes to visit all of the Communist countries, including Russia, while there is still opportunity to do so.
