The Apostle Paul saw a truth and charged Timothy, his son in the faith, to commit the things he had received to "faithful men who will be able to teach others also." As Paul saw it, the training of youth for the ministry of preaching and teaching was central to the Father's plan.

Since its foundation Northwest College of the Assemblies of God has continued in its purpose to instruct youth and to send them forth in fulfillment of the divine purpose.

Over two hundred and fifty graduates have been appointed to missionary service.

Scores more are involved as pastors, evangelists, and teachers.

Many are fulfilling a responsible role as laymen in the local church, augmenting and supporting its ministry.

For years Northwest College struggled with a minimum of facilities and equipment as it sought to fulfill its purpose. Now, in the providence of God, for ten years it has occupied a choice 35-acre campus—a miracle story! Thirteen lovely buildings, including a beautiful chapel and the first two units of the new learning center, have been built. Another residence hall will soon be in construction. Each unit was built and located according to original planning.

The thirty-five acre campus has begun to fill up. Now it is time to assess the future and to plan for it. It is time to study the full potential of the present campus site and to plan for its most efficient and maximum use. A master plan for the campus is being developed. The target date for completion of this campus plan is January of 1970. Included in the planning will be:

A library building
An administration building
A student activities building
Married student housing
Single student residence halls
Classroom and music education facilities
Additional physical education facilities

Parking and recreation areas.

The Master Plan must be a living and growing thing, adaptable to future needs. The goal of the plan will be to develop unity and character for the campus, utilizing the natural beauty of the rolling terrain and tall fir trees to best advantage and giving esthetic delight. It can best be described by the planners term, "environment design."

The guiding principle for planning will be to group the buildings in clusters of

interest and activity—Learning, Living, Recreation, and Activities and Worship.

Above all, the unique purpose of the college will be symbolized throughout the campus and in the buildings as they are designed to serve their functions. Thus the entire campus will speak continually of its place in *the* Master Plan.

A Master Plan is only a plan—a vision—until partners join and make it a reality. Just as the Heavenly Father enlisted those whom He needed to join with Him in His eternal plan, Northwest College—a part of the divine plan—must have partners to enable it to complete its campus and to expand in its role to the fulfillment of its purpose.

To schedule the development of the plan effectively, and to meet the facility needs as they will occur, from \$35,000 to \$50,000 will be needed annually in capital investment. This money cannot come from tuitions and fees but must be contributed by

interested churches, foundations and friends of the college.

Many friends have contributed generously to the college through the years—in its original campus funding, in providing the pews for the new chapel, in the Chapel Share Plan (120 shareholders at \$1,000 per share payable in four years), and in the Living Endowment Fellowship. Each of these funding drives have helped the college greatly, making it what it is today.

Now a Master Plan Partnership has been devised whereby many who have shared in the past as well as many more who believe in Northwest College and its future ministry can join together and make the total master plan a reality.

It will be a continuing partnership with each member contributing according to his ability and as God lays it on his heart. Each may contribute for a year or two

years or as long as he is able.

Membership in the Master Plan Partners for Northwest College is:

President's Club-a gift of \$1,000 or more per year

Master Builders-a gift of \$250 or more per year

Associate Builders-a Gift of \$100 or more per year

Craftsman—a gift of \$10 or more per year.

All contributions from Craftsmen will comprise a "Living Endowment" and will go into the general operational funds of the college assisting in meeting faculty salaries and providing scholarships and other student aids. This will be the continuation of the present Living Endowment Fellowship which has meant so much to the college. It is felt that all friends of the college will want to continue in this Fellowship as Craftsmen, assisting in the college as it seeks to build the lives and future ministries of its students.

Participants in the Master Plan Partners of Northwest College—whether President's Club members, Master Builders or Associate Builders—will be contributing to the de-

velopment of the campus and the additional buildings.

The Master Campus Plan will be unveiled in April 1970 at the annual Northwest College Lay Council Banquet. The goals then are to have:

10 President's Club members

40 Master Builders

40 Associate Builders

1,000 Craftsmen

College Singers Present Christ While On Tour


The Northwest College traveling choral groups came back to the campus following spring tours with reports of accomplishment and warm reception by their audiences. The Choralons, singing under the direction of Miss Dorothy Amundsen, instructor in music, toured western Oregon via chartered bus, appearing in the major communities from Portland to Grants Pass. They reported forty-five decisions for Christ with twelve experiencing the infilling of the Holy Spirit following their nightly presentations.

NORTHWEST'S FLYING SEMINAR TO KEEP TEMPLE SITE IN FOCUS

"The most valuable 20 acres on earth" is the site whereon once stood the Hebrew Temple in Jerusalem. Sacred to the world's three "monotheistic" religions — Christianity, Judaism, and Islam, the Moselm Dome of the Rock now occupies the area commonly believed to have been the location of the Jewish altar of burnt offering. Located within this beautiful edifice, sometimes called the "Jewel Box" Mosque, is a huge rock about fifty feet in diameter. At the east end of it is a cave with a channel through which it is believed that blood of the sacrificial animals was drained. To the west of this edifice would have been located the sanctuary proper with its holy place and beyond

that the most holy place where rested the Ark of the Covenant over which dwelled the Shekinah Glory of God.

Of the second Temple, our Lord said ''not one stone would remain upon another'' (Mark 13:2). So accurately and completely was this prophecy fulfilled that today the only stone work remaining at the site is what is popularly called the ''wailing wall'' — the retainer wall built by Herod to support the western edge of the temple courtyard. It is here that for centuries the Jews have come to recite psalms of lamentations and prayers lamenting the destruction of their national sanctuary in A.D. 70 by the Roman General Titus. It is indeed one of the historically and prophetically significant spots on earth. This site will be one of the highlights of the College's Flying Seminar to Jerusalem next March.

PAVING OF CAMPUS STREETS COMPLETED

Northwest College students came back to the campus after vacation to find the streets transformed from oil and gravel to paved asphalting. The \$18,000 project resulted in almost 20,000 square yards of paving surface. Virtually all of the colleges' thoroughfares, about one-half of its parking areas, and its other more heavily traveled streets were paved. Recording Artist To Be Banquet Guest



The Reverend Lee Robbins, evangelist, tenor soloist and recording artist, will be the featured speaker at the Northwest College All-School Banquet on May 3. A graduate of Central Bible College, the Reverend Robbins served as broadcast soloist for Revivaltime, weekly international radio service of the Assemblies of God which is heard on more than 525 ABC network and independent stations. He worked with Revivaltime for five years before entering the evangelistic ministry full-time.

The Reverend Robbins recently recorded a new album entitled, "Sunrise Tomorrow," released by Diadem Records. He was also featured soloist on a number of Revivaltime choir record albums. While with Revivaltime he completed two extended tours throughout the United States and has travelled as soloist at conventions, rallies, youth services and churches throughout the United States and Canada.

Following his graduation from high school in Fresno, California, Mr. Robbins served in the United States Marine Corps andworked part-time as soloist in Youth for Christ rallies. After his discharge from the Marine Corps he enrolled in Central Bible College for ministerial training. Today he ministers extensively to youth groups in churches, high schools and colleges.

An annual tradition at the college, the semi-formal banquet will pursue the theme, "In the Garden" and will be held at the Scottish Rites Temple in Seattle.

NC INSTRUCTOR PARTICIPATES IN CONFERENCE

Mrs. Jestin Blewitt, instructor in pian at Northwest College, recently participated in the Music Educator's National Conference regional meeting in Eugene, Oregon. She lectured on Basic Concepts in Teaching the Time Element in Music. Approximately 2,000 music educators from Wyoming, Montana, Idaho and the Pacific coast states were in attendance. Mrs. Blewitt has developed some new techniques for video broadcast instruction in piano. She gave instruction via television while living in Utah.

STUDENTS PLEDGE \$6,200 FOR MISSIONS IN SPRING QUARTER

Northwest College students joined together in responding to a missionary pledge subscription totaling \$6,200 for the coming quarter. World Outreach Ministries leaders note that total giving to world missions for the current school year promises to be an all-time record. Under the new plan of giving, seventyfive percent of each dollar will be set aside for foreign missions; ten-percent will be set aside for home missions; and another ter percent for missionary internship funds. The remaining 5% will be budgeted for incidental expenses connected with the World Outreach Missions program. This distribution is designed to build balanced and comprehensive support of foreign and home missions on the campus. It also provides an opportunity to educate youth in the basic World Ministries philosophy of giving which is a vital part of Assemblies of God world outreach.

COLLEGE EXPERIENCES NEW YEARLY RECORD

In keeping with soaring quarterly enrollments during the past five years, the Registrar's office reports a new cumulative enrollment count for the 1968-69 school year. The new count of 614 for the year topped the former record of last year with its count of 602. Spring quarter enrollment, always the smallest among the three quarters of the school year, stands at approximately 475. The cumulative gain over last year is about 2%.

NEW CATALOG NOW AVAILABLE

The Admissions office at Northwest College has announced the publication of the college's 1969-70 catalog. The new catalog, which is distributed to applicants and propective students contemplating admissions, is the largest yet to be published by the College. It will reflect, as a matter of official publication, the revised and expanded philosophy of education and educational objectives as well as some extensive revisions in the curriculum structure.

Curriculum revisions provide for a common core of General Studies for all curriculum offered at the college — liberal arts and Biblical. In the Division of Biblical Studies, the new structure provides for full majors and minors built upon a base of General Studies

and Biblical Studies.

Under the new plan, Bible College students may major in Biblical Literature, Christian Education, Missions, or take a divisional major in Religion and Philosophy. At the same time they will also select a complementing minor from New Testament Greek, Christian Education, Missions, Sacred Music, Pastoral Studies, Philosophy, or Business Education.

All majors are built around a core of Biblical studies and theology.

In addition to the majors, two special programs will be available. The Th. B. degree results from a five-year program built upon a Biblical Literature major and a minor in Pastoral Studies to which the student adds a year of advanced studies in Biblical Languages, Theology and Biblical Studies. It is intended for those going into the pastoral ministry and is generally equivalent to subject content normally taken for the B.D. degree in Seminary. Still another avenue of study provides something akin to the Bible Institute program of a number of years ago. It is conducted on a two-year scale, offering a concentration of courses in Bible and supporting areas.

The Division of General Studies (Junior College) has been considerably revised. It is built around the common core of liberal arts and general studies, while still providing for diversification according to students' special educational interests. It will offer concentrations in Humanities, Social Studies, Science and Math, Education and Pyschology,

Business Education, Music Education, and a one-year pre-nursing program.

Christian Service Report Shows Activity of Students

Christian Service reports, compiled by the office of the Dean of Students, show that Northwest College students are actively engaged in Christian service with some positive and impressive results. In view of 538 reports filed for the autumn and winter quarters, it was noted that a significant number of students were involved in Sunday School work, Junior Church, Bible Clubs, and youth work. Several students are presently serving as assistant pastors, choir directors, and youth directors. Almost twenty-five percent of those reporting were active as Sunday School teachers with another twenty-five percent involved in Bible Club and youth work. Approximately forty-five percent were active in various types of personal evangelism ministry. The remaining five percent were engaged in hospital ministry and other specialized avenues of Christian service.

One of the special projects undertaken during the school year was the participation of students as counselors in the well known annual King's Teens Valentine Banquet held in Seattle. At Thanksgiving season a special team journeyed to the Mattaniah Indian Reservation on Vancouver Island. Their project was designated "Operation Turkey". The students, under the direction of Dwayne Turner, assisted in the erection of a new church building. Another student has served as a counselor at the Miracle Ranch youth evangelism center near Seattle. Altogether, the reports show that 163 persons have responded for salvation and 20 have received the infilling of the Holy Spirit as a result of the varied Christian Service outreach ministries.
