SIXTH ANNUAL LAY COUNCIL TO HEAR CALIFORNIA PASTOR

The executive committee of the Northwest College Lay Council announced recently that the Reverend Kenneth E. Schmidt will be the featured speaker at the Council's annual meeting on April 17-18. The Reverend Schmidt, who is a popular Bible Conference minister, was Spiritual Emphasis Week speaker at the college during the autumn quarter. He presently serves as pastor of the First Assembly of God in Santa Cruz, California. Reverend Schmidt's travels have taken him to over 40 countries around the world where he has ministered to U.S. military personnel, teachers, and missionaries.

Two special events are slated for the Council's sixth annual gathering. These include the dedication of the new fountain. recently installed near the Learning Center building, and the unveiling of NC's Master Plan of campus development recently adopted by the College Board of Directors. The Council has actively participated in both projects. Council members secured funds for the design and construction of the "Reaching Arms" fountain and presented it as a gift to the College. The council received a preliminary report on the Master Plan in its last annual meeting and launched a Master Plan Partners funding program at that time. The Master Plan will be unveiled and presented publicly for the first time during the April Council.

One of the social highlights for the men will be the annual 18-hole Lay Council golf tournament. All interested participants are to meet at the Juanita Golf Club (north from downtown on Market Street) in Kirkland, on April 17. Tee-off times will begin at 9 a.m.

Ladies in attendance will enjoy several activities as well as their annual business session.

RESIDENCE HALL NAMED BY DIRECTORS

The new residence hall, recently completed, was named by the board of directors in their January meeting. The name chosen is Frank Gray Hall. It is designed to be a memorial to one of the great pioneers of Pentecost in the Pacific Northwest.

Reverend Gray gave his life in ministry in the Northwest. He was the first district superintendent of the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God. At that time the district included Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Western Montana and Alaska. This same area now is divided into several districts and comprises much of the region supporting Northwest College.

Reverend Gray also served as a chairman of the college board of directors during the early years of NC's history. His influence has left a significant impression with regard to the ongoing of the institution, accord-

ing to President D. V. Hurst.

Reverend Gray's son, Paul, is presently serving as the chairman of NC's board of directors.


