From The President

Dr. G. Raymond Carlson, Assistant General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, was our campus guest for one full week—in Spiritual Emphasis, Campus Day and Lay Council. I asked him to express himself concerning Northwest in a guest column.

Why A Christian College?

A college can be different things to different people. For some it is an escape from home, or a place to find a marriage partner. To others it has meant a deterrent to military service; another feels college attendance is the social thing to do. The vast majority, we hope, attend college to receive an education.

Education is important. And when I speak of education, I do so in the sense of the instilling of knowledge and of wisdom having to do with mind and character. Such wisdom and knowledge comes from study based upon the Bible and the other areas of truth as it is given to us in the natural revelation. The basic revelation must ever be that which is given through supernatural inspiration, which is the Bible.

All truth is God's truth. The Christian approaches truth with a greater degree of reverence because he is discovering the laws of God. God has made truth available to man for a more profound understanding of man's Creator and, in turn, the enrichment of man's

life. Christian colleges do not seek justification for existence on the basis of the objectives of secular education. The Christian college, through the committment of its faculty and the importance placed upon moral and spiritual values, puts God at the center of education. Dr. R. B. Kuiper stated it well when he said, "One may look at a window pane in one of two ways. Either he may stare at the pane itself and make it alone the object of observation, or he may look through the pane up at the heavens. One may lose himself in the bare facts, or one may look up through the facts at God who is revealed in all the works of his hands and in the guidance of the destinies of men and nations."

Education in a Christian college proceeds on the basis of a committment to certain dogmatics, such as the inspiration and inerrancy of the scriptures, the virgin birth of our Savior, His atoning death and bodily resurrection, His miracles and His second coming. Thus, a Christian college has certain specific values and convictions and not only a spirit "of critical thinking" to give its students.

Northwest is a Christian college; Northwest is Pentecostal. It offers quality work with a Spirit-filled faculty to those who wish to prepare themselves for Christian service.

Spending a week on the campus, I have been profoundly impressed with the results of the education process as profiled by the student body. These young people possess a firm belief in the adequacy of Christ to meet the needs of humanity. In like manner I have sensed their desire to do the will of God through a sincere committment to the Lordship of Christ.

In my opinion, education at Northwest College is producing salt that has savor. The College is worthy of the support of the churches and the people of the Pacific Northwest!

William Menzies. The book is a history of the Assemblies of God and of its antecedents in the Pentecostal revival that took place throughout the United States at the turn of the century. The photo (page 193) is that of a group of early Pentecostal workers known as the Apostolic Faith Band shown with the Reverend Charles F. Parham. Of the 25 persons shown in the photo, eight are members of Mrs. Thompson's family, including her father, Rev. H. G. Tuthill, a pioneer minister in the movement; her grandmother, Mrs. H. H. Aylor; her aunt, Miss Bessie Tuthill, for whom Mrs. Thompson is named; another uncle, aunt, and their son;

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Aylor and son; and her mother's brother and his wife, Mr. and Mrs George Aylor. The photo and the history that surrounds it, would indicate that Mrs. Thompson's family roots go deep in the soil of the early Pentecostal revival. She has served on the college staff since 1966, coming to the College from Prineville, Oregon.

Student Aid

The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Student Aid Grant section, have recommended to the Department of Education that Northwest College receive, during the school year July 1, 1972 to June 30, 1973:

National Defense Student Loans \$63,500 Work Study \$28,000 Economic Opportunity Grants . . \$38,250

The Financial Aids Officer, Lyle B. Spradley, recommends that any student, needy of assistance to attend Northwest College, apply for aid by May 1, 1972 for the next fall's enrollment and attendance.

Grants in aid will be approved by July 1, to those applying and who qualify for such assistance.

Thirty-sixth Commencement Exercises Feature Pioneers

The thirty-sixth annual Commencement exercises will feature two special guests who represent long associations with the Assemblies of God and the College, President D. V. Hurst announced today. The commencement address will be

brought by Dr. C. E Butterfield, President Emeritus of the College, Dr. Butterfield served almost 18 years as president of the College up to his retirement in June, 1966. Dr. Butterfield's tenure as president was marked by development of the college in its organizational structure, in its curricular structure, and in its physical plant. The latter is at once the most visible in the form of the present 35-

acre campus located in Kirkland.

Since his retirement from the presidency six years ago, he has traveled extensively in Europe, the Orient and South Pacific and most recently in Latin America. It was announced that the College Chapel will be named in his honor at the forthcoming commencement exercises. It stands as the "crown jewel" of the campus development under his administration before his retirement. It significantly represents one of the highest values which he sought to develop and undergird during his

presidency and is hence looked upon as a fitting tribute to his ministry at the College.

The second "pioneer" to be special pulpit guest as Baccalaureate speaker has not had as long an association with the College as Dr. Butterfield, but has had a very active one-in the several years that he has served on the College's Board of Directors. He is the Reverend Robert Brandt, Superintendent of the Montana District of the Assemblies of God. He succeeded the late Reverend Earl Goodman who passed away several years ago. Reverend Brandt has had a long tenure of pastoral and administrative work including Superintendent in North Dakota and National Secretary of Home Missions. He currently serves as vicechairman of the Board of Directors. He is in demand as a Bible conference speaker and has been a Spiritual Emphasis Week speaker on campus.

The weekend commencement schedule will start with the Baccalaureate service in the college chapel on Saturday evening, May 27 at 7:30 p.m., and Commencement will be held in the College Pavilion at 3:00 p.m. Sunday. 28th.

INSTRUCTOR FINDS ARCTIC MINISTRY

Dwayne Turner, full-time member of the faculty at Northwest College, is one instructor who has found a thrilling, perhaps chilling, off-campus ministry. At the invitation of Missionary Arvin Glandon, former NC faculty member and member of the Board of Directors, Mr. Turner spent part of another January in the Eskimo Camp held annually at the Inupiat Assembly of God, at Barrow, Alaska. He describes it as "a camp meeting in the middle of January".

Barrow, Alaska's largest Eskimo village, is located on the shore of the Arctic Ocean in the central part of Alaska's barren northslope. The 2,000 villagers refer to Barrow as the "Top of the World", as it is the northernmost point in the North American continent. Frigid temperatures complicated by fierce winds blowing in off the Arctic's ice pack drive the chill factor to extreme lows. During the 82 days of summer when the sun does not set, the people busily prepare for the following winter. These conditions make a summer camping ministry impractical —hence, the mid-winter spiritual retreat is becoming increasingly popular.

The camp provides opportunity for fellowship as missionaries, native pastors and Christians gather from the villages of the Arctic section. Some of them fly in more than a thousand miles while others travel nearly a hundred miles by sled or snowmobile to attend. The Christians of Barrow readily open their homes to visiting "campers" thus providing a warm fellowship.

Far North Bible School, Alaska's unique, nine year old training school, was founded by Missionary Arvin Glandon, who also serves as its director. It has teaching centers in many of the native villages. Instead of the students coming to a central resident campus, the professor goes to them. Students may remain near their homes with their families. For the past two years, Rev. Turner has been a guest instructor of Far North Bible School for the Eskimo Camp term and has taught classes designed to help native Christians prepare and teach Sunday School lessons to their own people.
