NC PROF AWARDED PH.D.

Dr. Robert Swaffield, Associate Professor of Music at Northwest College, was awarded the Ph.D. degree in Systematic Musicology by the University of Washington on October 27, College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst announced.



Dr. Swaffield is the first of seven Northwes College professors in doctoral candidacy to complete his work and receive his degree it was noted.

Dr. Swaffield's dissertation was complete in a technical area of research and carrie the official title, "The Effects of Certain Melodic Parameters upon the Ability to make fine tuning responses in Context." In layman' terms, Dr. Swaffield explained that the stud concerns the problems involved in singing playing in tune. In order to test the idea, conducted an experiment at Northwest Collegusing 25 students as subjects. He report that the experiment was "very successfuand that the results were not only conclusive but highly practical."

At the College, Dr. Swaffield teaches M. Theory and directs two choral groups, one mixed choral traveling group, and the Colleg Choir. Mr. Swaffield received the B.A. degre from the University of Alberta; the Maste of Music from the University of Montana and the Associate in Music from the Universit of Saskachewan. He has served on the North west College faculty since 1969.

DR. HURST AUTHORS NEW BOOKLET

Northwest College president, Dr. D. Northwest is the author of a newly published book, published by the Gospel Publishin House, entitled, Spiritual Life—God's Gif The book is one of what is called a Charismatic mini-book series authored by leader and scholars in the Assemblies of God denomination. The series encompasses nine book in all selected from "outstanding previous published articles and small books covering variety of subjects related to the Holy Spirit, according to a headquarters news releas from General Council offices in Springfi Missouri.

GORDON'S CALVARY

Just north of the Damascus Gate in the Old City of Jerusalem is a hillock with a precipitous facing that bears a striking resemblance to a skull.

One evening General Charles Gordon sat in the Jerusalem home of the famous missionary family of Mrs. Bertha Spafford Vester (whose father wrote the words of the well-known hymn "It is well with my Soul" after several members of the family were lost in the sinking of the Titanic. As he studied the landscape from over the wall, suddenly he was struck with the realization that the little hillock bore a striking resemblance to the appearance of the skull. As he studied the Scriptures, he was again struck by the statement describing the crucifixion of Jesus in John 19:16, 17-"Then delivered he Him therefore unto them to be crucified. And they took Jesus, and led Him away. And He bearing His cross went forth into a place called the Place of the Skull, which is called in the Hebrew Golgotha." (Latin: Cranium of skull).

General Gordon reasoned that if this be Calvary, then there must be a tomb nearby. He organized an excavation, and turned up what is today called, The Garden Tomb. a rock-hewn tomb in a garden at the base of the knoll and about 50 paces to the west. Since then the place has been called Gordon's Calvary, and is considered by many to be a viable alternative to the traditional site of Golgotha marked by the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, though the perponderance of archaeological opinion favors the latter.

The visitor to Gordon's Calvary will be impressed by the natural simplicity and beauty that it communicates. The warm evangelical message that emanates in this place cannot but be impressive. Wherever Calvary might have been, when our Lord was crucified, nearly two thousand years ago, this place will illustrate the kind of setting it must have been, and it echoes the message of the Gospels most assuredly, "He is not here; He is risen!" Luke 24:6.

It will be of special interest to Assemblies of God people to know that this famous lady. the late Mrs. Vester (who founded the American Colony Hospital, Hotel, and Orphanage in Jerusalem) was a cousin to a gentleman who, together with his family, is a member of one of our Assemblies of God Churches in the Northwest District. She was featured the National Geographic Magazine several years ago. It was from the roof of her home within the walls of the Old City that General Gordon made his discovery.
