

God is continuing to bless this work.

The campus (already a park) is looking better all the time. The slabs are gone: the landscaping is in progress. With the fall rains, the grass will leap and this project will be done!

Married student housing planning is well underway-24 units. The construction has been authorized. They will be one bedroom efficiency units, with balconies to the west and a full view of gorgeous Lake Washington, the Seattle skyline and the snow-capped Olympic Mountains.

The Library planning is on schedule. The detailed, 17-page proposal involving three years of work, hundreds of man hours in consultation and visits to other facilities has been approved. It is now in the hands of our architects. The graphics will be unveiled in April, 1973, at the Annual Lay Council Master Plan Partners Banquet. A total of just over \$50,000 in funding is already in hand! This includes a \$35,000 gift from one party for the project!

And think of this! Negotiations are underway which may result in a thirty per cent increase in campus size—ten acres of undeveloped land adjacent to the east side of the campus is being made available at a "bargain" price—less than one-third its appraisal value. And a single gift of \$10,000 (with more help later) has been promised to enable this purchase. Please pray with us about these negotiations!!

SEVEN NC FACULTY GRANTED DOCTORAL CANDIDACY STATUS by Amos Millard

Three more Northwest College faculty were granted doctoral status this summer, Northwest College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst has announced. This brings to seven, the total number of faculty who have attained this level of progress in their respective programs. Dr. Hurst explained that admission to candidacy in an academic pursuit is a significant level of recognition, and is normally granted only upon completion of course work and the passing of doctoral examinations. Thereafter the can-

didate completes an acceptable dissertation and is granted his degree.

The latest faculty members to be granted candidacy in their respective programs include **Frank B. Rice, Jr.,** Academic Dean at the College. Dean Rice has been on special leave for study at Washington State University for the past eight months and expects to complete his dissertation for the Ph.D. in Education within the coming academic year. Also receiving candidacy status recently is **Professor Daniel B. Pecota.** He was on sabbatical leave during the winter and spring quarters of the past year for study at Phillips University in pursuit of a Doctor of Ministry Degree. The latest faculty member to receive doctoral candidacy is **Jack V. Rozell,** former dean of students, who will be on special leave for the 1972-73 academic year to pursue studies for the Doctor of Ministries Degree at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California.

Three other members of the faculty had achieved candidacy during the course of the previous academic year. They include **Professor Robert Swaffield**, who is presently completing his dissertation for the Ph.D. in Musicology at the University of Washington. Professor Swaffield expects to receive his degree this fall. **Professor Donald Tarno**, whose field at the College is Speech and Missions, was in London doing research work in the field of Speech for the Ph.D. degree from the University of Washington. A former missionary to Pakistan, Professor Tarno's dissertation will deal with Bengali Rhetoric.

Professor Francis Thee is currently in research for his dissertation for the Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in the field of New Testament studies. Professor Thee is writing on a noted scholar in the early church named Africanus whose work the

Kestoi is the special object of study.

Professor John M. Pope, who holds candidacy for the Ph.D. in Church History at St. Andrews University in Scotland, is pursuing research and writing on his disserta-

tion on the teachings of a French theologian named Claude Pajon.

President Hurst noted that each faculty member in doctoral candidacy is researching and writing for his dissertation in the fields of study which relate to their fields of instruction or work at the College. Dean Rice's dissertation will be in the field of Bible College administration. Professor Pope and Professor Thee are working in the field of theology. Professor Pecota is working in the field of preaching as it relates to children in the church congregation. Professor Swaffield's dissertation is in the field of the Psychology of Music or Sound Perception. Professor Tarno's dissertation is in the field of speech. Dean Rozell expects to write in the field of Pastoral Counseling, he indicated.

Among the College's full-time instructional faculty, Dr. Hurst noted that 40% will hold doctorates and that among the remaining members of the faculty, none will hold less than the master's degree in their field of specialization. Dr. Hurst further noted that the distribution of faculty holding the doctoral degree will be almost in direct balance in the ratio of student enrollments between the Bible College and

General Studies division.

Dr. Hurst noted that these achievements are in fruition of an intense in-service advanced degree program that was launched about four years ago. He points to what is considered a significant combination of attainment in faculty degree and teaching strength, while at the same time preserving the continuity of faculty service at the college. The great majority of those attaining these new levels of achievement hold significant tenures of service at the College—something that President Hurst believes will add unique strength to the college's academic posture and to its commitment—to its central Christian education distinctives.



SOME NEW COURSES - OTHERS REOFFERED

Prospective missionaries will be interested in an exciting series of Missionary Workshop Seminars on a number of up-to-date missionary topics. In the fall quarter there will be two seminars: (1) Current Trends and Problems in Missions and (2) Family Relations Seminar (as it relates to the missionary family).

The winter quarter seminars will be on Overseas Evangelism. Overseas Bible Schools and Missionary Orientation will be offered in the spring quarter. Missionary Lester Kenney will also "team teach" in a series of Missions Courses with Professor Donald Tarno. . . . Autumn: Missionary Principles; Winter: Communications and Culture; and Spring: Comparative Religions. (The seminars will be scheduled at the 200 course number level to make them available to sophomores, as well as to upperclassmen.)

Introduction to Art will be offered again during the fall term of the 1972-73 academic year. Music students will be offered the possibility of **String Ensemble**. (Richard Evans,

Instructor)

With the coming of Miss Lois Winter to the College faculty we will resume some of the specialized Sociology courses formerly offered. While she will be largely preoccupied with the General Psychology and Introduction to Sociology courses this year, in the Spring she will teach **Social Problems**, a course which is highly relevant to a day characterized by social turbulence.

Calculus with Analytic Geometry will be offered during the coming school year. We are fortunate to have available the teacher resource in the person of Mrs. Kathryn Tulloch.

Replacing Math 103, **Trigonometry** will be a new course, Math 110, **Mathematics for Elementary Teachers** (5 credits). The course will be taught in the Spring Quarter by Professor Gustafson.

Making Good Marks

Reassigning of spaces is one of the many oncampus tasks that must precede the opening of fall term instruction. Designing engineer in the Faculty Parking zone is senior student Gordon Fletcher. Helpers Mitzi and Rufus serve on a strictly volunteer basis.

We are pleased to announce that **Speed Reading Instruction** will be offered on campus during the coming school year. Instructing the course will be Professor William Randolph, who was trained by the AGP Institute offering the program. Fall quarter dates will be October 9, 16 and 23. The evening classes are 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. The cost is \$25, which is a low fee compared with the charges of reading clinics. The average rate of reading speed increase experienced during the spring course with Dr. Hammack was 300%.

Denny Davis Guest Speaker for Spiritual Emphasis

Reverend Denny Davis, well-known pastor-evangelist, comes to Northwest College October 2-6 for a week of spiritual emphasis on campus, at the invitation of Dr. D. V. Hurst.

An alumnus of Northwest College ('56),



Reverend Davis is pastor of Central Assembly of God in Salem, Oregon. The church has been honored the past two years as the fastest growing Assembly of God congregation in the state, currently averaging 547 compared to 479 of last year. His great demand as speaker has taken him to more than forty youth camps and 150 revival crusades.

Holding to a firm conviction that the Bible deals relevantly with the issues and crises of our day, Reverend Davis has been active in both civic and denominational affairs.

Spiritual Emphasis Week services will be held during scheduled morning chapel periods and each evening at 7:00 p.m. in the C.E. Butterfield Chapel. The public is invited to attend.

1973 FLYING SEMINAR TO INCLUDE ROCK-HEWN CITY OF PETRA

Plans for the 1972 Northwest College Flying Seminar were unveiled today by Dr. D. V. Hurst, College President. The seminar, which will be the fourth to be sponsored by the College, will include visits to Israel, and five other countries between the dates of March 12-29, it was indicated. A new feature to the coming seminar will be a visit to the famed rose-colored rock-carved city of Petra and to Amman, Jordan. Leading the tour will be Dr. Hurst, and accompanying the group this year will be Professor Maxine Williams, long - time instructor in Bible Geography at the College.

While the itinerary will concentrate in Israel, covering biblical sites ranging from the Patriarchal city of Hebron in the south, to famed ruins of Capernaum on the Sea of Galilee in the north, it will also include five other major points in the Mediterranean area, commonly regarded as "lands of the Bible." These include Rome, Athens, Corinth, Cairo, and Jordan. The seminar group expects to enter Israel via the famed Allenby Bridge over the

Jordan River after visiting Amman and Petra. The party will fly directly from Seattle to Copenhagen, making Copenhagen the European "gateway" city for the tour. The group will have rest stops in Copenhagen both going and coming, it was indicated.

In the interests of Palestinian Studies, the tour will provide one of the most thorough coverages of Palestine as it was in Bible times, covering the eastbank area as well as the west bank area of the tribal territory once within the boundaries of ancient Israel, Dr.

Hurst noted.

The College's approach to the tour will again give emphasis to study preparation. Directing the winter quarter lecture-studies series will be Dean Amos D. Millard, who instructs in Biblical History, Archaeology and Geography at the College. The lecture series will be conducted on Monday evenings throughout the winter quarter until departure time and will provide correspondence study materials for those unable to commute to the campus for the series, it was indicated.

Seminar registrations and information service are being handled through the office of the President at the College, it was indicated.

Alumni Homecoming Planned For Spring

Those all-important dates for Homecoming with its usual fellowship activities are May 25-26, 1973, Alumni President Richard Strum announces. The change from winter dates was decided by the Alumni Executive Committee when responses from a questionnaire indicated that an overwhelming number of alums favored non-winter scheduling for their Homecoming activities. (Extreme weather conditions the past two years was cited). The Alumni Banquet is planned for May 25.

The Alumni are invited to be present for the Music Festival sponsored by the Public Relations teams in the Butterfield Chapel at 7:00 p.m. on September 29. Early days films will

be shown following this event.

Summer Internship Travels

This year's summer internship program included travels to Panama, Finland, Columbia, South America, Alaska, Canada, Samoa,

and Munich, Germany.

One of these was a Youth Action Crusade to American and Western Samoa led by Professor Dwayne Turner. The crusade co-sponsored by the Northwest District Youth Department included four Northwest College students. During the 23-day trip the YAC visited practically every church in Samoa, working with missionary Earl J. Hance. They witnessed house to house and on the streets, conducted open-air services and passed out literature in both English and Samoan languages. Public rallies were held nightly and a total of 30 different services including Bible studies were conducted. It is estimated that over 100 persons came to Christ during the crusade.

Students from Northwest participating in the crusade were Marc Pearson, Mark Haines, Phil Hines, and Jim Whatley. Accompanying them were Steve Larson (U. of W.) and Jim Norlie (S.P.C.).

The crusade was the fourth summer internship program led by Mr. Turner.
