From The President The two-story structure as designed by architects Beckwith, Spangler and Davis has the focus of privacy and quietness. The concrete composition floors are covered with wall-towall carpeting in each of the 620-square foot units and each of the units is colorfully furnished. The complex is heated with a centralhot-water heating system. Units consist of a living room, kitchenette, one bedroom and bath. Sliding glass doors open onto a private deck. President Hurst indicated that the two wings are the first of several units which will be developed in the complex as the need arises.

Housing for Married Students Dedicated

Dedication ceremonies on October 15, dedicating the Northwest College's new married student apartment evoked descriptive scenes ranging from the Solomonic temple to recollections of the early days of the college's acquisition and development of its new campus. The honorees for whom the two wings were named were two former district superintendents of the Northwest District, host district. Both men played significant roles in the college's history. They were the Reverend Dwight H. McLaughlin, District Superintendent during the years leading up to the college's acquisition of its campus site in Kirkland; and the Reverend Reuben J. Carlson, District Superintendent during the years of major campus development. Both men, though retired from the superintendency of the district are active in pastoral and evangelistic ministries.

The college's new 24-unit apartment complex for married students known as "The Firs" will also bear the names of these two men. . . with one wing of the complex being named the D.H. McLaughlin wing, and the other, the R.J. Carlson wing. The new \$275,000 structure, furnished in stucco and placed amongst a curtain of evergreens on the college's newlyacquired ten-acre tract, was put into service for the first time this September, with nearly full occupancy from the start. College President D.V. Hurst announced the final unit, which was displayed during open house on dedication day, has now been rented.

Early Childhood Curriculum To Go Into Effect Winter Quarter

KIRKLAND, WASH. — A new Early Childhood Education Program will be offered as an option in the Christian Education major at Northwest College, commencing with Winter Quarter, 1974, Academic Dean, Dr. Frank B. Rice announced today. The new curriculum is being developed in response to a growing need for personnel for Christian Day Schools.

Dr. Rice noted that it is envisioned that the program will be useful to a Minister of Christian Education needing a knowledge of the pre-school program and to persons seeking to prepare for positions as assistants in pre-schools, child care centers, kindergartens, and other occupations where a knowledge of the young child is needed. The curriculum will be offered as option track in the Christian Education major at the College. It will lead to a B.A. degree. Major instructor for the course specialization instruction will be Miss Shirley Newton, from Anchorage, Alaska. She holds the Bachelors degree and Bachelor of Religious Education degree from Central Bible College, and the Masters degree from the University of Alaska where she specialized in Childhood Education.

The Early Childhood Education specialization core will include courses in Introduction to, and Fundamentals of Early Childhood Education, Children's Creative Activities, Parent-Education, Evaluation Techniques, Special Topics in Early Childhood Education, Child and Educational Psychology and some key courses in Christian Education. The program will be supported by a second major in Biblical studies.

The new program is funded in part by a grant from the Lilly Foundation.


