# Students Given Pastoral Ministry in Emphasis Week

A pastoral ministry geared to contemporary needs and rooted in the Bible was described in the ministry of the Reverend Glen Cole of Olympia to the students, faculty and staff of Northwest College during the College's Spring Spiritual Emphasis Week April 1-5. The Reverend Mr. Cole is pastor of one of the area's fastest growing churches—the Evergreen Christian Center in Olympia. The Center has a multi-ministry outreach ranging from a day-care center to a senior citizen's ministry. Its burgeoning Church School runs an attendance of around 1200 students.

A native of Tacoma, the Rev. Mr. Cole is a graduate of Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri. He returned to the Northwest where he pastored at Maple Valley near Renton and at Calvary Temple in Seattle (Associate pastor) before going to his present pastorate. During his seven years in Olympia, the church outgrew its former building, rebuilt, and is currently contemplating further enlargement to provide for its rapid growth. Its ministerial staff includes two Northwest College grads — Mr. Allen Hulten, minister of Christian Education, and the Reverend and Mrs. Wayne Hathaway, ministers of youth.

At the College, Pastor Cole brought messages he said are those he brings to his congregation in Olympia. They included such themes as Guilt, Pressure, Resentment, Inferiority, Knowing the Will of God, How to Worship, and the Exorcist.

In evaluation and summary of the week, College President, Dr. D.V. Hurst said . . .

"Rev. Cole's ministry to the students was practical and forceful. He led them to a new worship, an appreciation of themselves as potential ministers in the hand of God and a

dedication to give themselves in training for that ministry. His perception of the needs of students made his week with them most worthwhile. It is significant that as pastor of a church which

859 registered guests convened on the campus of Northwest College March 29th for the College's annual Campus Day. College officials view the turn-out as a significant and qualified success in view of gas shortage conditions. Last year the registration was 920. Included in the number were nearly 600 high schoolers or 67% of total registration. Pastors, pastors' wives, youth sponsors, and parents comprised the remaining 33%.

The day's schedule included campus tours, class visitation, information workshops, recreation and entertainment (including an exhibition basketballgame). Highlighting the day were the chapel services. Guest speaker at the morning chapel was Montana District Youth Director, the Reverend Roy Brewer, also an alumnus of the College. Capping the day was the traditional A. S. B. rally featuring music by student groups.

#### Spring Quarter Enrollment Hits 475

Spring quarter enrollment at Northwest College reached a total of 475 exceeding projections by about 25 students. Cumulative student count for the current academic year has reached 618, according to preliminary tabulation in the Registrar's Office. Spring term enrollment exceeds enrollment for the same quarter one year ago by approximately 15 students and that of two years ago by approximately 25 students. Cumulative enrollment will match that of two years ago and will nearly match an all-time high.

# Dr. Butterfield Makes 26th Trip Abroad for Ministry

Dr. and Mrs. Charles E. Butterfield, President Emeritus of Northwest College, left April 4 for a five-month tour of ministry in Europe and Africa.

Dr. Butterfield will conduct a series of ministers' institutes in Austria, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Spain, Portugal, Nigeria, and Ghana. This is his 26th trip abroad for ministry.

Dr. Butterfield served as president of Northwest College from 1949 until his retirement in 1965. Since then he has been in active ministry, including a number of trips abroad.

### Minerva Crowder Is With The Lord



The College chapel and campus of Northwest College was inundated with the radiance of Spring sunshine on the afternoon of April 3rd. In the chapel there was to be heard the softrich tones of the chapel organ backgrounding prayer and the reading of scripture at a simple and dignified funeral service held in honor of the homegoing of Mrs. Minerva Crowder. Mrs. Crowder went home to be with the Lord on Sunday morning, March 31st. For the last 20 years of her life and ministry, as a minister's wife and teacher, she had known the meaning of suffering from the debilitating effects of arthritis. Now she is free.

Participating in the funeral services for her were her pastor, Rev. E. R. Scratch, a 35-year colleague in the ministry and friend of the Crowders, Dr. Jack Rozell, one-time parishioner in the Colfax Assembly of God Church, pastored by Rev. and Mrs. Crowder, and Dr. D. V. Hurst, President of Northwest College. She is survived by her husband, Rev. Herb Crowder, Administrator at Northwest College since 1953 and by her daughter and family, Rev. and Mrs. Glen Rich of Spokane.

As a living memorial to the on-going values in which Minerva Crowder invested so much of her life, the family requested no flowers. Friends who wish to contribute in memory of Minerva Crowder may designate their offerings to "The Minerva Crowder Memorial Fund."

# Internship Is "On The Job" Training

Education at Northwest College is not confined to lectures and textbooks. Each year students gain actual "on the job" training through an extensive internship program. The

program is operative in the summer as well as during the academic year.

There are two patterns of summer internship. Students may apply to the W.O.M. council for missions scholarships if they have a plan for missionary involvement which they feel is worthy of underwriting. About a dozen students receive scholarship aid for such missionary involvement either overseas or in some home missions setting. Summer internship is open to all in the fields of Christian education or youth, pastoral ministries, or sacred music, Such students enroll for internship credit as they would for any other course, and receive credit at the end of the summer on the basis of the work performed and reports submitted. Initiative in each case is the student's, but the Academic Dean does publish to the students information he receives from the field as to churches wishing to participate in summer internship.

Pastors are urged to lend support to this vital program by extending invitations to interns from the college. Dean Frank Rice may be contacted for further information.
