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

Succeeding Rev. Paul Pomerville as special instructor in Missions will be the Reverend Derrick Hillary from Manila, P.I. Reverend Pomerville will be returning to regular missionary assignments by the Foreign Missions Department following work he will pursue training in the Assemblies of God Graduate School of Theology in Springfield, Missouri.

Alumni President Takes Pastorate

Allen L. Baunsgard, Northwest College Alumni President, has accepted a call to pastor the First Assembly of God in Anacortes. Washington. commencing August 1. Reverend Baunsgard, who also served as Northwest District Youth Director for five years, continue to serve in his

Financial Aid For Students Looks Good!

The College has received a Federal Grant of \$30,650.00 for students. Eligible students may each receive as much as \$1,050.00. These are grants, not loans! Entering students who may have need of financial assistance and desiring to qualify should complete the application for a 1974-75 Basic Educational Opportunity Grant (BEOG). These applications and further information is available by writing to: Financial Aids Officer, Northwest College, P.O. Box 579, Kirkland, WA 98033.

In addition to public Student Aid programs the college has a number of privately-sponsored aid programs available on a selective basis. These include scholarship help to high achieving students entering from high school, youth talent winners, certain ministerial courtesy awards,

and some private short-term loan programs.

Experience at Northwest indicates that it is possible for a student to work his way through college! The greatest source of student aid at the college continues to be self-help through employment. The Office of Off-Campus Employment is managed by Miss Bessie Guy, Dean of Women. On-Campus Employment is directed by Business Manager Owen Hodges. The college does all possible to assist students in finding good paying part-time employment. The college enjoys an excellent employment market for its students.

College President Dr. D. V. Hurst noted that low tuition rates in low employment areas of the country quickly lose their meaning if there are not practical means for students to gain meaningful employment with which to meet their educational expenses. He also noted that in many cases the unaccredited quality and status of such programs adds to diminishing returns for the student. Such work is often not recognized or transferable if the student ever has need

to have it considered for an accredited degree.

Dr. Hurst concludes that educational costs are to be weighed against the quality and recognition of the education received as well as the practical means by which the student can qualify and obtain the unprecedented number and kinds of financial help available, including employ-

ment, while attending college.

Financial Aids Officer Spradley emphasized that high school seniors should complete and send in the Parent's Confidential Statement (PCS) form even though they are not sure if they will apply for assistance under any of the Government Financial Aid programs. This form, also available at the college, is required for all Government-College sponsored aid programs. The importance of the PCS may be seen in the fact that it is used by college personnel when called upon to nominate students who are eligible for educational assistance from the state of Washington or when other private groups seek to aid a student. Aids from these sources are increasing. Fourteen Washington students received \$450.00 grants near the close of last year without advance information or application on their part. The grants came as a total surprise!

''In view of these aids,'' said President Hurst, ''anyone thinking of college should 'press' the issue; should pursue all possible financial aid alternatives; should think quality transferable

education; and should believe with assurance that he can make it through!"

1975 Flying Seminar Plans Outlined

Northwest College's sixth Flying Seminar will be geared to several general guidelines, it was announced at the College today. Dates are tentatively set for a ten-day tour in mid-March. The itinerary will give emphasis to coverage in Israel with a possible en-route visit in Athens or Rome. Plans will be geared to economy in the face of rising travel costs. Leading the tour will be President Dr. D. V. Hurst.

Leading the 1974 Seminar was Dean of Admissions Amos D. Millard. Dean Millard who led the College group together with a Juanita pastor and served as a special lecturer on a jet cruise itinerary in mid-April, rated the tour as one of the College's most successful in terms of travel and learning experience.

The 1975 Flying Seminar will again feature on-campus instruction, available course credit, and informational bulletins with maps covering each day's trip. Previous Flying Seminarians have come to appreciate these unique services.

New Instructional Resources Boost Counseling Training at College

Northwest College's new Counseling Ministries program will get a boost as a result of personnel resources that will be made available to the college next year.

The Veterans Administration Hospital, Seattle, is making available the services of Chaplain Milton Whittaker with whom the college has been working for some time in its Hospital Ministries Program. Chaplain Whittaker, an ordained minister, will teach the Hospital Ministries course on campus in the Fall Quarter. He will supervise the Hospital Internship Program for the college in the Winter Quarter and will come back on campus to teach a two-hour course in Pastoral Care for the Terminally III in the Spring Quarter.

Another institutional resource person for the new training program will be Dr. Sig Weedman, Counseling Consultant to the college. Dr. Weedman, an Assemblies of God layman, is a staff member of a mental health clinic in Seattle. He will instruct a course in Ministry in Crisis Situations.

Dean of Students Rev. Orville Clark, who is also a trained and experienced counselor, will be instructor for yet two more courses to be offered as part of the new training program—Psychology of Religion in the Fall Quarter and Interpersonal Relationships in the Spring Quarter.

The new training program in Counseling Ministries will be offered as a minor, effective Autumn Quarter 1974 and will be largely taught by Dr. Jack Rozell, Professor in Counseling and Pastoral Studies and Director of Counseling at the college.

Evening School Registration Simplified

"As easy as falling off a log" is an adage meant to convey simplicity in procedure. This old adage may well be applied to registration for evening classes at Northwest College, the admissions office reports.

Persons desiring to come on campus for the classes need only complete a simplified registration form at the first class session or in advance at the Registrar's Office and pay their course fees for the courses they wish to take.

Formal application procedures are not required unless an evening school student wishes to matriculate into the day school or into a degree program; the Admissions office explained.

Pre-School Program At Northwest College Successful

"Nothing succeeds like success" is a well-known adage that appears to be borne out in the new Early Child-hood Education program at Northwest College. The new program was launched with the help of a grant from the Lilly Foundation at the beginning of the Winter Ouarter, 1974. While

the curriculum was organized to utilize course offerings in the field of education and psychology, a core of specialized courses was introduced to support the program. Joining the faculty to offer instruction in the specialization courses was Miss Shirley Newton. Miss Newton holds the Masters' degree from the University of Alaska.

After two quarters of trial run experience with the program, Miss Newton views the new curriculum as highly successful. She reports that in six specialization classes offered there were a total of 32 students enrolled including 9 men students and 23 women students.

Miss Newton notes with satisfaction and pride that all four students who were enrolled in Practicum in the Spring were placed in near-by pre-school child care centers and planned to work in some phase of early child-hood education during the summer of 1974.

The Co-Weds, student wives and married female students, elected Darlayne Brand as their new president. Other officers for the coming year are Holly Moore, vice-president and Sharon Lawson, secretary. Mrs. Jean Clark will be faculty advisor.

Internship Has Solid Biblical Basis

"And He sent them forth and commanded them "(Mt. 10:5). Internship training was employed by our Lord in the training of the twelve disciples—the same twelve who later became the Apostles, the "sent ones." Internship thus has a firm Biblical basis.

At Northwest College internship training has been increasingly growing as a paraclassroom learning experience for ministerial students. The concept of Christian service through gospel teams has always been emphasized at the College but within the last several years it has been tied to the classroom instruction in a structured and systematic manner.

During the 1973-74 academic year a total of 87 credit hours of Internship were earned by upper division ministerial students. Internship experience which is jointly supervised by the respective professor on campus and a pastor or other field supervisors included Pastoral Internships, Christian Education, Youth Ministries, the Chaplaincy, Music, Hospital Visitation, and Counseling.

One quarter of some form of internship is now required as a part of each of the various four year academic programs at the College. Whereas only one quarter is required, experience shows that most students having started it continue for at least one full year.

New internship opportunities have developed which include the Washington State Reformatory at Monroe. The program has been tied mainly to area churches in cooperation with the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God.
