LIBRARY DRIVE MOVES AHEAD— NEEDS YOUR HELP!

The library fund for Northwest College's new library is growing! It has reached \$244,000 and is moving towards the goal of \$300,000!

Many who originally pledged one, two, and up to five library shares have **doubled** their pledge! (A library share is \$1,000 payable over four years.) Others have indicated they will consider doing so and will confer with their Boards of Deacons about the possibility of doing so.

Now, how about you? If you believe in Northwest and what it is doing, here is a chance for you to really help!

Presently our library is temporarily housed in the basement of C. C. Butterfield Chapel. This space has worked well but the library has long since outgrown it. Also, the Music Department desperately needs that space. It will be ideally suited for a large choir and orchestra room, music studios, and class and practice rooms.

When I came to Northwest College eight years ago, there were 20,000 volumes in the library. Now there are almost 47,000 volumes—a whopping 135% increase! This is an average of almost 17% per year! To make room for them, we have added services in the library—audio-visual, microfilm, etc. And these services demand space. The books and services are pushing out the students!

Our original target date for ground-breaking was April 1977. But that was before the current inflation spiral took effect. Now we realize we must move the target date up a year if we possibly can! We can save as much as 10% on the cost of the building if we do this. But we must reach and even pass the goal of \$300,000.

We need **your** help. Can you or your church pledge one library share or more? One share is \$250 per year, just \$21 per month.

The College Board of Directors will convene in their semi-annual meeting in late January 1975. The decision will be made then. Will you pray with us? We need a miracle!

I have a color brochure and other information ready to send to you telling you about it. Give me a call or drop me a note today. I'll get it right to you.

Flying Seminar - North Sea To Mediterranean

Northwest College's Sixth Annual Flying Seminar will girdle nearly half the globe, jet hopping from the North Sea of Scandinavia to the Mediterranean Sea. All of this will be done in just twelve days, next March 12-23, College President D. V. Hurst announced today. The dates were selected to take advantage of low season group air fares, the College's economy-minded President and leader of the Seminar noted.

Upon touching down in Scandinavia's crossroads city and northern jet gateway city to Europe, the Seminar party will take off on a sweeping triangular route over the Alps and to the Eastern Mediterranean, touching down in Tel Aviv, Israel, western tip of the Cradle of Civilization, and the Land of Promise to Abraham and his posterity. After one of the most thorough visits yet planned for seeing the length and breadth of the land of Israel, the Seminar party will fly to Rome, political center of the New Testament World. Here, the party will view the setting from whence the decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be taxed—thus setting in motion a series of events that made Bethlehem the most famous little village in the world.

Tue.	March 18	- Jerusalem/Samaria/Galilee
Wed.	March 19	- Tiberias, Haifa, Caesarea, Tel Aviv
Thur.	March 20	- Flight over the Mediterranean: Tel Aviv/Rome
Fri.	March 21	- All day in Rome
Sat.	March 22	- Morning flight: Rome/Copenhagen (overnight in Copenhagen)
Sun.	March 23	- Return flight: Copenhagen/Seattle back over pole.

Instructing tour members to prepare them for the tour will be Amos D. Millard. Dean Millard, a five-time traveler to the Middle East, led the Seminar last April. It is open to the general public as well as to students of the College and may be taken with or without college credit (at no extra charge.)

Dr. Hurst said that the College has earned through "hard work" and integrity, a reputation for excellence in this service that stands somewhat unique among Bible Lands tours today. Students, friends, and members of the general public are invited to write in for the College's monthly tour bulletin reporting developments and features of the tour, affording effective tools for orientation to Bible Lands travel.

Good Samaritans: 20th Century Style

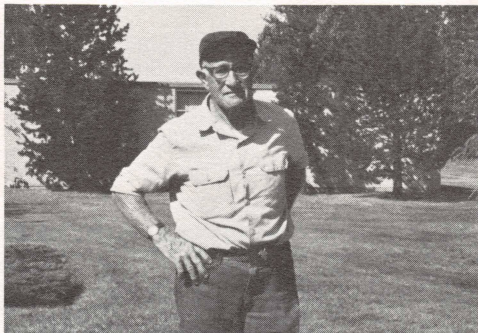

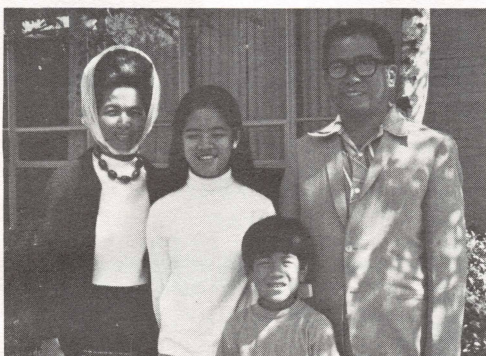

It was at this moment that the telephone rang. The call was from Rev. H. W. Crowder, Business Manager at the College, inviting the Greens to consider an opening for building maintenance work at the College. The Greens responded to the call, feeling that it was providential.

Looking back upon his career in Northwest College, Ernest Green said, "I am real happy about my experience at the College. This association came in my life at a time when it provided me with a real spiritual uplift. I enjoyed working with youth. The College was a real answer to fulfillment in my life. I would recommend it to any young person to come to Northwest College."

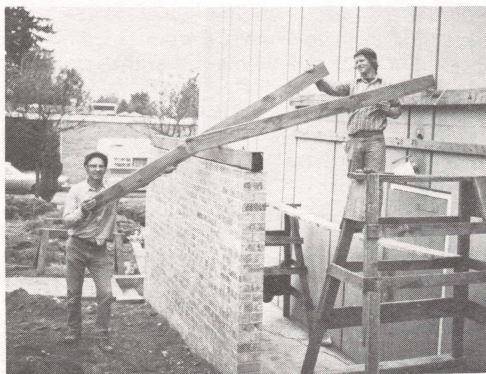
The Greens plan to live in Kirkland, to work in their garden, and plan to come back to campus for Spiritual Emphasis Week services and other special events.

Northwest College Grad Featured: "Jungle's Kissinger"

The Reverend Marvin Cole, Northwest College graduate of 1951, was recently the subject of a Sunday feature in the **Tacoma News Tribune** entitled, "Marvin Cole: The Jungle's Kissinger." Marvin, who has spent the last twenty years with his family in the jungle areas of Paraguay for the New Tribes Mission, has been home on furlough.

In his work on the field, Marvin, now 44, directs the activities of some thirty missionary families by a two-way radio from the office of the Mission in Ascuncion, Paraguay. He is chairman of the local mission field for the Mission. Having spent some twenty years in the jungle himself, Marvin has been known for his in-depth knowledge of how to care for tribes newly emerging into 20th century culture, as well as into the knowledge of the Gospel of Christ.

Because of the confidence he holds with the tribesmen, particularly the Guyaki Tribe, missionary Marvin together with his colleagues have gained insights and access to them that few white men enjoy. The Coles, together with their two children, were scheduled to return to Paraguay in late August.
