Dedication is set for April 10, the 12th annual lay council session. General Superintendent T.F. Zimmerman will be on hand. It will be a good day.

These all suggest this will be "the year that was".

But its not size of student body and development of campus that count most. Human institutions will pass away and buildings are just steel, bricks and mortar. It's individual students that count at N.C. It's the personal faith victories each of them wins! It's the development of individual ministries that makes N.C. what it is! And from this perspective, I think this will be "the year that was!"

Pray with me that this will be true! Join with us in support of N.C. We can then look back together and rejoice over this school year '75-76, ''the year that was''.

1976 Senior Placement Profiles Published

—A "tools" publication designed to assist n the placement of the College's seniors has oeen published for the use of Church Leaders, it was announced at the College today.

The profile contains background information on 75 candidates for graduation including their field of preparation, internship, and Christian service experience while in College and prior to coming to college, in some cases, vocational and musical skills, marital status, age, and permanent home addresses and degrees for which they are in candidacy at the College.

The profile has been especially used by District Superintendents and pastors of the cooperating districts which participate in the support and administration of the College.

A photo section has again been included this year to enable prospective employers to identify the students in the profile writeups. The Placement Profile has been regarded at the College as a "significant" tool in the success of the College's placement service efforts over the past several years. The profile was first published in 1971.

The primary aim of the service is to identify fields of need and opportunity into which graduates with corresponding skills, training, personal calling and gifts can be placed.

Pastors and other church leaders are invited to write in for a copy of the new profile and to avail themselves of the College's services when a ministry need in their church arises.

The "kick-off" event for each year's activities takes place during the Annual Superintendent's Week in the month of January. A significant number of pastors have found their way to the campus to interview seniors for various ministry needs in their churches. This activity constitutes one of the "harvest" efforts in the college's reason-for-being, College President, D. V. Hurst noted.

Work Study Program

Positions are available for on-campus employment under a program called College Work Study, which is one phase of Federal financial aid for students. It provides employment for students to assist them with their educational costs. Eighty percent of the wages are paid from Federal funds which are allocated to the institution. During the current year 34 students are employed under this program.

Estate Planning

by using a LIFE INCOME CONTRACT

You may transfer money or other property to Northwest College and retain the right to receive the income from the property for your lifetime. This plan removes the property from your probate estate and saves the cost of administration. You are entitled to a current income tax deduction for a portion of the property's value, and no capital gains tax is payable.

Any estate taxes payable on account of your death are reduced. If you have a home, non-income producing, which you desire to use for your lifetime, a similar gift with a life estate reserved to you may be desirable. This permits a current income tax deduction, reduces probate costs and death taxes. Of course in order to qualify for any tax consideration, the gift must be irrevocable. Revocable gifts of future benefit to a non-profit organization carry no tax benefits.


Rev. Roy Southard spoke to Dr. Rozell's Practical Theology class. He told of the needs of the Senior Citizen and the opportunities of ministry to them.
