Missions Executive Talks About The Missionary Of The 1980's

Special guest at Northwest College's annual Faculty Retreat this year was Reverend Wesley Hurst, Executive Secretary for the Far East in the Assemblies of God foreign missions division. Following the theme of training missionaries for the next decade, Reverend Hurst spoke about the changing role of missionaries to the emerging nations of the world. He cited three kinds of mission fields-the pioneer and primitive field, the developing field with a well-organized national church, and the mature field. He sees the missionary of the future in the light of these present trends. In specific terms, he said the missionary of the future would need to be mature enough to relate to the cultural variables of the fields. He must be diplomatic in his relations with national leaders, and he must be spiritual enough to offer them something that is genuine and substantive. Tied in with this are the political changes that may occur in the next ten years.

Reverend Hurst noted that missionary leadership roles in the field change as the fields develop. The missionary of the future will need to be a better educated person than the missionary of the past. He will need a strong marriage relationship where both parties are committed to Christian service. He will also need a growing and developing ministry founded in the Word of God.

Another important requirement of the missionary of the future is going to be one of personal quality. He will need ethical moorings. Rev. Hurst suggested that the missionary will need a solid and strong ethical base. Missionaries who have not "found themselves" and who have not come into a Christian ethic of life and commitment will be vulnerable to a moral and ethical environment that is contrary and hostile to the Christian faith. In short, Reverend Hurst pointed to the need of the same personal qualities and spiritual vitality and faith that marked the first generation of missionaries

in the history of the Christian church almost two milleniums ago.

The theme of the faculty retreat was "Mission—The Eighties". Recognizing the fact that the average prospective missionary who starts his training as a college freshman this year will not reach the field of missionary service for almost ten years, the faculty see practical questions which must be answered regarding his training. What kind of ministry will he have? How does this affect his present training? What impact should this have on the present curriculum?

Commenting on the message of his brother to the faculty, President D.V. Hurst said, "It was timely and very much to the point! We need to think ahead, identifying the qualities of person and training for a minister that spans all cultures, times and varying progress of indigeneous church development, and understanding the role the missionary of the next decade will fill. Both faculty members and students need to be realistic and anticipate the development of the indigenous church. We dare not be guilty of training for yesterday's tasks!"

A Meaningful Internship



Steve Lazzari has been involved in a unique activity as part of his summer internship. He has ministered to over 1,500 children, seeing many accept Christ and channeled into the Renton Assembly of God Church. Working under Pastor John Tappero and Christian Education Director Paul Tappero in evangelism outreach, he has organized the "Street-Players". They have gone into the streets with Yogi, Cookie, Oscar, and Mr. Ranger (Steve being Mr. Ranger) and have been enthusiastically received by the community. The stage is a truck that was donated to the church by a wheat farmer in eastern Washington and opens up into a large pie-shaped stage with backdrops and a P.A. system. Two crews of actors and helpers, follow-up and the maintenance of the truck have been part of Steve's responsibility.

This Thursday afternoon performance saw over 175 children and parents lining the hillside. On the basis of past experience, they anticipated 300 the following day. Cameras were clicking as mothers took pictures of their children being hugged by Yogi. There was a definite feeling of warmth, love, and friendship as the children gathered around the flatbed truck.

Steve will be a senior at Northwest College this year and one of the young men who played Yogi, Mark Jacobson, is an incoming freshman. This was just one of Steve's intern responsibilities. Their program was featured at the District Sunday School convention in Everett.

New Missions **Instructors Appointed**

It has been announced that Reverend and Mrs. Bill Farrand will become the new missions instructors beginning the winter quarter. They will replace Reverend Jim Davis, who will be taking a pastorate in Australia.

Mr. Farrand and his wife, Alvera, have been ministering in the Philippines since 1963. During that time, Mr. Farrand has been chairman, secretary, and treasurer of the missionary field fellowship at various times. In addition, he has served as general manager of the Assemblies of God printing press in Manila, and is literature director for the area. The Farrands have also pastored Clark Field Assembly of God, where they ministered to Air Force personnel stationed in the Philippines.

During their past term of missionary service, the Farrands were instructors at Bethel Bible Institute in Manila. In addition to teaching, Reverend Farrand has served as head of the Department of Theology, Business Manager, and Academic Dean.

Both Reverend and Mrs. Farrand are graduates of Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri. Reverend Farrand has done graduate work at the Assemblies of God graduate school in Springfield, Missouri and at the University of the Philippines. Alvera has a B.S. in Social Sciences from Evangel College and is also presently working on a masters degree.

It is anticipated that the Farrands' contribution to the missionary program of Northwest College will help the program to continue to be one of the strongest missionary programs in the Assemblies of God. Hundreds of missionaries who graduated from Northwest College are serving the Lord

around the world.

The program is financed by an offering on the fifth Sunday night of months when five Sundays occur. Individual gifts have also been designated from members of the congregation.

Many churches are now using this method to encourage their young people to attend Northwest College. It is proving to be an effective method by which churches have a meaningful part in the training of their young

people for ministry.

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I.C.I. UPDATE

"Summertime living" is seldom the case for N.C. faculty and administration. Reading, (for all), writing (for some), and -rithmatic (for a few) are the rule, not the exception. Some preach and teach in churches and camps, others find different types of employment, but all are busy.

A significant contribution made by N.C. faculty is the writing of courses for the International Correspondence Institute, a missionary arm of the A/G. Under their guidance, college-level courses are produced in rough by the author. The material is edited by the staff in Brussels and published and distributed from there world-wide. Reverend George M. Flattery, President of I.C.I. reports that Professor Pecota's course entitled "Soteriology" is in print. This is a study of the doctrines of salvation. He also indicated that they were in the final editorial stages of the courses written by Jack Rozell and Amos Millard. These should be in print this year. Dr. Frank Rice spent this summer writing a course for the program, Reverend Flattery reported, "This year, we have published one new course every month. This means we are making excellent progress.' These correspondence courses are available and can be secured from Brussels.



Shown in photo above is Mt. Corinth, the "hay-stack" mountain that towered up 1,500 feet above the city of ancient Corinth. From its summit, Athens, some sixty miles away, can be seen. The Apostle Paul would have seen it when he visited the city during the middle of the First Century. He would have vearned for the city as he viewed on its acropolis the temple of Aphrodite which contributed to the moral pollution that submerged one of ancient Greece's most splendid commercial cities. Here he spent 18 months and saw the establishment of a redeemed community cleansed and transformed by the power of the gospel of Christ. It was here when the Lord spake to him in a night vision to be of good courage, "For I have much people in this city." (Acts 18:10). This will be one of the many significant places that the Northwest College Flying Seminar group will visit on the College's 8th annual tour to the Holy Land March 13-27.
