A Year of Action

One quarter is behind us. It's an exciting year, a good year, a Year of Action.

Almost everywhere we turn, things are happening. The enrollment jump of 75 last year was retained — and one more! A total of 628 for the fall, and the winter quarter looks strong.

In curriculum there is change. There are 43 enrolled in the new Sacred Music major and another 20 in the minor. There are 88 in the Counseling minor and 28 in the Christian Education major. 35 in the Missions major and 218 in the Biblical Studies major. with 26 in the Religion and Philosophy major.

Further curriculum development is under study at this time, as is the possibility of summer school.

The campus is more commodious than ever with the new Library in full swing and the new Music Center nearly completed. It will be ready just after the opening of the winter quarter — two music classrooms, a choir room with recording control room (doubling for radio class production), thirteen practice and teaching studios, four offices and a conference classroom. With the new Music major and new facilities, Sacred Music will be stronger than ever at N.C.

We have been able to purchase adjoining small parcels of land to consolidate our cam-

pus borders and serve as buffer.

Further campus planning is under way an update of the Master Plan, a complete Administrative Complex, a new entrance and revised road system, and other plans - all looking as far as fifteen to twenty years ahead. Some exciting and challenging ideas.

Internally things are happening, too. We have new auditors with expanded services, the possibility of some accounting automation, a job classification, a top level "Efficiency and Preservation" Board of Directors Committee Study, a revised Pension Plan for long term personnel, and a new Fund raising Promotion Committee - a new face and a new thrust to fund raising. We're tooling up for the future.

Faculty development continues with Amos

Millard in a Doctoral program (now candidate for degree), Jack Dorwart in a Second Masters program (almost finished). Cal White and Darrel Hobson almost finished

with their Master's program.

A broadening of faculty involvement in Missions has proven an enriching development - Dan Pecota in a FEAST, on site session in Malaysia; Frank Rice and Jack Rozell in I.C.I. writing: Maxine Williams in Bethel Institute in Alaska for a summer term. Several of the Bible faculty will be touring the Holy Land. I believe these growth experiences aid the faculty member in the

So, it's a year of action, a year of development - doing all the things that normally comprise parts of a good year, and more. Doing the things that build for the future and insure an even greater contribution of Northwest College to the work of God's Kingdom in the days ahead.

"Going With The Gospel"

Professor Mel Ming is excited. The reason: his Missions course, #141, students are excited about the results of their projects in a course which is specifically designed to train in winning the lost to Christ. The name of the course is Personal Evangelism.

Prof. Ming reports that from among his class of 75 students there was nearly a one-to-one ratio of conversions as a result of student activity in what he designated as "Project No. 2" in the course. The project called for each student to "share the gospel on a one-to-one basis. The students did and they come back with the report," 'It works! I won someone to the Lord last weekend.'

Where did they go to share the gospel? Prof. Ming said about 50% went to the Seattle Center and to the University of Washington district in Seattle, but the other half went to their friends, neighbors and work-mates.

Professor Ming, in updating his report at the conclusion of the quarter, said that the class shared Christ and their personal testimony 305 times during the quarter and from this, 62 people accepted Christ.

This was not the only assignment in the course. Mr. Ming said the students were to share their personal testimony as one project, and to participate in a student evange-

lism team group effort as another.

"Going with the Gospel" has ever been the thrust of the Pentecostal movement. The circuit-riding Methodist minister of frontier days would find a counterpart in a modern Mobile society of college students such as these, who are interested in the practical expression of theology. "How shall they declare (the gospel) unless they be sent, as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach (declare) the Gospel of peace and bring glad tidings (gospel) of good things." (Romans 10:15). In the ultimate conclusion, this is what theology is really all about.

N.C. Low On Ladder For Costs

A Washington Natural Gas Co. survey recently revealed that the cost of tuition and fees at Northwest College ranks lowest among the eleven accredited private colleges and universities in the State of Washington.

It is \$600 less than the number 10 ranking school for costs and is over \$1,000 less than the average for the eleven schools surveyed, a difference of 42% against the eleven school average, which was \$2,425 per year.

Costs of accredited higher education are higher than non-accredited schools because the quality, kind and amount of facilities and faculty training prescribed by standards of accredidation require more of them.

Accredited higher education offers more than transferrable credits and recognized credentials. Today, considerable student aids in various forms are available to students at accredited schools, not available at non-accredited institutions.

The fall quarter hgad 24 students, a record enrollment in the Counseling Internship program, working with pastors and professional counselors in the Seattle area. These include The Veterans Administration Hospital, a mental health unit at Monroe State Reformatory, Youth Eastside Services in Bellevue, The Eastside Community Alcohol Program in Bellevue, Neighbors Who Care — Paraprofessional Lay Counseling Program in Bellevue, and churches in the Seattle-Tacoma

An intern is expected to spend approximately four hours per week in one-to-one or small group counseling, under the supervision of the professional with whom he is working. Campus supervision is also provided through the internship class.
