From The President

The Founder's Fund

Northwest College was founded in 1934 in response to great need and vision. It then was sent on a mission of training pastors, evangelists, missionaries and Christian workers.

As the College developed, curricular programs were enriched. It was accredited by A.A.B.C. in 1952 and by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges in 1973. In 1959 Northwest College moved to its new 35 acre campus in Kirkland. (Twenty-two acres were a government grant—to be earned in twenty years of operation—and thirteen acres were a purchase.)

Along the way there have been many "small" and "large" miracles which have resulted in its development into one of the finest small college

campuses in the nation.

One large bequest, the Dickey estate of \$640,000, gave the thrust needed as the new campus was in its infancy—truly a miracle in timing! Many hundreds of friends and churches have contributed regularly through such programs as the Chapel and Library Share funding drives.

Now however, it is time to set out in a new direction. It is time to endow the operations of the College. This is necessary in order to further enrich and undergird the programs, to insure the continuing functions of the College, to keep the cost to students as low as possible and to raise

faculty salaries.

Northwest College desires to avoid a "crash, let's keep it alive" kind of funding drive. It hopes to build steadily through developing now a growing cash and other assets kind of endowment fund that will produce ever increasing earnings for subsidizing the College each year! This is to be called the Northwest College Founder's Fund. Its purpose is to perpetuate the mission of Northwest College as envisioned by its founders!

Until very recently it had to be said that Northwest College had *no* endowment fund. However, gradually the annuity and endowment funds have grown until they aggregate approximately \$350,000 in cash assets, life income estates, as well as regular faculty writing, and scholarship endowments, etc.

Instead of rasing funds for plant or campus development the next few years, the Board of Directors has authorized raising cash and other assets for the Founder's Fund. A goal of \$1,000,000 in cash and assets has been set for April 1980!

A Founder's Fund share is \$1,000, payable in three years at \$333 per year. Individuals, churches, districts—anyone who will—are invited to subscribe to at least one share. All who have participated in the Chapel and Library Share drives are especially urged to participate.

A Founder's Fund share certificate will be given to the donor and a record of his gift will be

made in the Founder's Fund book.

The important thing to remember is this: Your gift will never be spent. But the earnings it generates will go to the general operations fund of the College each year.

NORTHWEST COLLEGE FOUNDERS FUND INAUGURATED \$1,000,000 goal set

April 6th and 16th went into N.C. annals as significant milestone days in the College's 43-year history. On April 6 a simple, quiet luncheon in the College's Faculty Dining Room brought together a number of persons who symbolize the years of the College's founding and early history, as well as its present.

The special purpose of the luncheon was to recall and to acknowledge the founding of the College over 42 years ago, and to announce the launching of a campaign to undergird the College's future. The drive is targeted to raise a one-million-dollar endowment fund. Hence the occasion significantly brought together the past with the present and linked it with the future.

Among the guests present were Mrs. Henry H. Ness, wife of the late Dr. Henry H. Ness, founder of the College; Mr. Lloyd Ness, son of Dr. Ness: Dr. & Mrs. Charles E. Butterfield, second president and President Emeritus of the College. Among former faculty members were Rev. and Mrs. Allan S. Ellis: Professor and Mrs. Delbert L. Cox: and the Rev. and Mrs. John J. Clement, Graduates of the College who were present were Mrs. Edithora Glew, first student to register when the College opened on October 1, 1934, and considered the College's first graduate of the Pioneer Class of 1937; Mr. and Mrs. Paul Gray of Tacoma; the Rev. Walter Daggett, of Connecticut; Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Phillips of Olympia. It was noted that Rev. Phillips was Treasurer of the College when its new campus site was acquired in 1959. Mr. Frank Bently was present representing the early members of the College Board. It was noted that he had the distinction of being the first laymen to be appointed to the Board of Northwest College and possibly the first layman to be appointed to the board of any Assemblies of God College.

Dr. Hurst noted that up to the present time the College has invested considerable effort in campus development and that now attention is to be given to undergirding the operational base of the College through an endowment. The goal is set for one-million dollars. He noted that up until now the Living Endowment program represented the only viable alternative to a true endowment. In a true endowment, the capital funds are invested but are kept in tact as an income-generating base. The income generated from the investments from the endowment is used to provide support for the college's operational needs. A Founders Fund share is \$1,000 payable at \$333 per year. A share will generate approximately \$70 per year in earnings.

The Endowment Fund drive was officially inaugurated at the Annual Lay Council Banquet April 16. President D.V. Hurst outlined the purpose, need and goals at the Founders Fund. President Emerities C.E. Butterfield spoke on the, "Mission of Northwest College." Following his address, Dr. and Mrs. Butterfield, Mrs. Ness. and President Hurst laid hands upon the Founders Fund Record Book, and prayed for God's blessing (the name of every donor will be recorded in the book.) Then the pledges to the Founders Fund were received. At the conclusion of the banquet a total of \$59,600 was tabulated and announced! There was much rejoicing!

Henry Portin member of the Board of Directors "signed in" recording his gift in the record book as the first Founders Fund shareholder. Mrs. Henry Ness personally contributed \$1,000, in behalf of her husband Dr. Henry Ness, "signed in" as a shareholder, and said, "It delights me to think of Dad giving the College \$70 per year till Jesus comes back. Thank you for the opportunity!"

Thirteen Other Ways You Can Contribute To The Founder's Fund

You may choose to give certain assets you hold to the Founder's Fund instead of cash. Following are some of the ways you can do so:

- 1. Gifts through wills.
- Appreciated property returning life income for the lifetime of both husband and wife.
- Appreciated stocks as gifts or life income.
- Bonds—outright gifts or in a charitable trust which produces income for the life of the donors.
- Gifts through insurance—making the College owner and beneficiary of the policy. Every premium payment becomes a tax deduction.
- 6. Gift annuities which can pay up to 10%, based upon annuitant's age, per year to donor and surviving spouse.
- Short term charitable trusts which give the income to the College for a specific period of years after which the principal sum is returned to the donor's estate.
- Loans through promissory notes to assist with the development of the Campus Complex.
- Living Endowment yearly gifts on a continuing basis of \$10.00 per year or more.
- Give other property—cars, furniture, works of art, jewelry, coin collections, antiques and other valuables.
- Memorial which can perpetuate the memory of a loved one through the Scholarship Endowment Fund.
- 12. Bargain sale—often used by donors to recover original investment and allow the College to sell at appreciated price. The difference becomes a tax deduction for the donor.
- Matching gifts—nearly 500 corporations will match your gift to Northwest College.

New Music Center Dedicated

The Dorothea Amundsen Music Center was dedicated at Northwest College on April 22 during the annual meeting of the Northwest College Lay Council. The new \$130,000 facility occupies the lower level of the College's Chapel building and provides 55,000 square feet of space for instructional and rehearsal studios, offices, practice studios, sound room, and two classrooms designed for music class instruction.

Named for the late Dorothea Amundsen, long-time director of music at Northwest College, the new center was dedicated appropriately on the occasion of a concert by the College Music Department in the College Chapel. Participating in the ceremonies were College President Dr. D.V. Hurst; Academic Dean, Dr. Frank B. Rice; President Emeritus, Dr. C.E. Butterfield; and Lay Council officers including President Wesley Johnson, and the Reverend Herbert Crowder, Executive Secretary.

Carpeted and sound-proofed throughout, the new center is graced with wall-hangings, portraits of some of the Great Music Masters of the world. The new facility was put into service beginning with the Spring Quarter and provides tangible evidence of the College's accentuated offerings and enrichment program in the area of sacred music. Dr. Hurst noted that a total of 43 students are enrolled in the new Sacred Music

Major at the College this year.

TEACHING GRANT

The Lincoln Institute of Land Policy has awarded LeRoy Johnson, Assistant Professor of History, a grant to teach a three credit history course for the summer session at Northwest College.

The grant will be for a class entitled, "The Age of Reform in U.S. History, 1870-1914." The class will deal with religious and social reformers around the turn of the century. The Institute specifies that Henry George and his reform ideas play a prominent part in the course content, and Professor Johnson will include other men and ideas of the time as well.

The class will meet Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 10:00 a.m. beginning Monday June 6, the first day of the summer session.

Record Size Graduating Class

The largest graduating class in its 43 year history is in prospect at Northwest College, the Registrar's office reports. A total of 145 candidates for graduation expect to receive degrees at the close of the current school year on May 29. The candidacy list includes 87 candidates for the B.A. degree, 2 for the B.S. degree, 1 diploma, and 55 for the A.A. degree. The number of candidates tops last year's record figure of 113 graduates. One honorary doctorate will be conferred upon the Reverend E.M. Clark, president of Northwest Central Bible College in Minneapolis. Minnesota.

A considerable amount of activity is in process in placement of the College's Biblical Division grads, and it is expected that by graduation time, an appreciable number will have been placed in various churches and other ministry positions, the placement office reports. A considerable number will be going on to advanced programs of study in graduate schools,

seminaries, and colleges.

Charismatic Duo Ministers At Northwest College

A milestone in the history of Northwest College was observed during the College's Spring Spiritual Emphasis Week series April 4-8, when an Episcopalian clergyman and his wife ministered at the school. The two church bodies, often considered to be at opposite ends of the church spectrum, found a common meeting ground as a result of what is known as the midtwentieth century outpouring of the Holy Spirit, often called the "Charismatic Movement."

Guest pulpiteers for the week were the Reverend and Mrs. Dennis A. Bennett. Heralded as the "Father of the Charismatic Movement" in the Encyclopedia *Britannica*, the Reverend Mr. Bennett and his wife, Rita, themselves symbolize the background components of the movement which have brought together such diverse elements as the Assemblies of God and the Episcopal Church.

Commenting on the ministry of the Bennetts' and concerning the significance of their presence on the campus, Dr. D.V. Hurst said, "We were blessed by the ministry of the Bennetts. I told the College family that should Jesus tary, they would look back to the week as a most significant one. Our history of the current movement will include Dennis Bennett. He has played a most important role in its beginnings and as balancer. To have first hand acquaintance with him is very meaningful!"
