Will They Graduate?

What are the prospects a freshman who enters Northwest College will graduate from Northwest? This is a question of marked significance.

Current studies—part of the process of preparing for a visit from the Accrediting Association next fall—reveal a very favorable trend.

It is understood some students try college for one, two, or three quarters. Some start at a college such as N.C. desiring a year or two in its setting, with the plan they will then go to a university or liberal arts college offering a major not found at N.C. But first, they want some grounding in theology and Biblical studies! Meeting the needs of these students is one of the key functions of Northwest.

But what about those who started at N.C. and finished? The study just completed according to Dean of Admissions, Dr. Amos Millard, "shows a marked increase in the ratio of graduates to matriculants in comparison with the same study completed five years ago." At that time 25% of the entering freshmen completed work for graduation. On the other hand, an average of 38% completed graduation requirements during the first five years.

More significantly, the number has risen each of the last five years. Of the freshmen of 1969 a total of 25% graduated; 1970—33%; 1971—35%; 1972—43%; and 1973—55%.

When one considers the structure of N.C.'s curriculum this is a truly significant trend.

In discussing the probable factors affecting this trend with Dr. Millard, it appeared they certainly include:

1. The Spiritual tone of the College;

The academic quality of programs and resources of N.C.;

 The strength of its faculty in commitment and academic preparation giving confidence of learning accomplishment;

 N.C.'s accreditation—both as a Bible College and by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. Dual accreditation signifies breadth of excellence;

The placement assistance offered to graduates. The record here is likewise excellent;

 The personal care of individual students through the counseling services of the College; The exit interviews, guidance and other follow-up of students;

8. The dedication and determination of the students themselves. Without doubt, this is most significant. All opportunity and assistance can be given, but without student goal setting and follow-through, the results would not be there.

Perceptive analysts of the internal workings of Northwest are most encouraged by this trend! But the record of 55% can be improved. The final mark of excellence of any College is its graduates—and graduates who find a place of service in their chosen field, the work for which they have been trained. The faculty and administration of Northwest College are committed to accomplishing this purpose.

The Reverend Everett McKinney, Class of '63, has been appointed president of the Far East Advanced School of Theology (FEAST) in Manila, Philippines. The Far East Advanced School of Theology serves the Assemblies of God in all countries of the Far East and Pacific Oceania by training ministers for Bible school teaching and other types of church ministry. Total enrollment in FEAST for 1975 was 335 students.

Harvest Plenteous: Laborers Few

Never in the 43 year history of Northwest College have there been more calls for students and graduates to fill positions of ministry than has been experienced during the past year, Dr. Amos Millard, the College's Placement Director observes. He has received calls not only from the local area but from points up and down the Pacific Coast.

"The College had its largest graduating class last Spring," Dr. Millard said, "but the demand has out-distanced the supply of workers. Never in the College's history have the words of the Lord of the Harvest been more realized than now, 'The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth laborers into his harvest.'" (Luke 10:2)

He observed several factors are in the present scene. "Churches are growing, and growth in turn, is outstripping the output of trained workers. We never tell a pastor 'No.' We tell him, 'We'll try to help you,' and try we do, while praying the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers to meet the needs of the field."


Speaker's Theme: Loving God

If the theme of the Fall Quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week messages by the Reverend Linfield Crowder could be epitomized by a single statement of Scripture, it would be from the classic passage of the Bible, "... Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might." (Deut. 6:5) A three-time Siritual Emphasis Week speaker at the College and alumnus of the College, the Reverend Mr. Crowder pursued the theme of God's love, and the human response to it as he addressed the students and faculty who filled the Chapel each day and evening during the five day series.

The impact of his messages upon the students was observed not only by students' attentiveness and attendance, but by their response in prayer. Yet, the real results will be measured by the response of obedience to the call and will of God, and it is in this measure that the abiding value of the Spiritual Emphasis Week's ministry will make its impact upon the lives of the students.

The Reverend Mr. Crowder, who graduated from the College in 1953, is known as a missionary evangelist throughout the United States. His major field of missionary evangelism has been in the South Pacific from where he was on special assignment in Samoa and whence he took a leave of absence to come to the campus for the College's Spiritual Emphasis Week, October 3-7.

Commenting on the week, President Hurst said, "The ministry of Linfield Crowder is always fresh and relative. He knows where people are and how to use the Word to move them forward in God. He loves youth and thoroughly enjoys helping them. He comes on with a genuine quality of experience himself. Once again it's the case of the man and his message."



New Majors Popular on Campus



The College's two newest majors, Sacred Music and Pastoral Ministries, have gained ready acceptance by students who are preparing themselves for ministry. While these are traditional fields of professional training in the Bible College context, the organization of the programs into full majors indicates the trend towards indepth and greater intensity of training for the ministry.

The new Sacred Music Major, instituted last year, shows an enrollment of 59 students plus another 21 in the minor. The technicality and rigorous intensity of the Sacred Music programs at the College appears to be accepted by the students as a challenge rather than a deterrent.

The new Pastoral Ministries Major, instituted just this year, already shows a total of 29 students enrolled plus another 48 in the minor. The professional context of the new major is not an 'easy road," observers at the College note. Yet it appears to reflect the recognition that the "mainline" of ministry on the church scene today is still the pastoral ministry.


