ANNUITY RATES ARE UP!

One way to build an estate and gain tax advantage at the same time is through an annuity program.

An annuity is a guaranteed annual income for life in return for a gift or contractual assignment of cash, property, or securities to an institution such as Northwest College.

Why An Annuity?

 Gift Credit. Tax credit from the gift portion of an annuity may be spread over a five year period.

2. Tax Free. Much of the annual proceeds of the annuity are excludable as income.

3. Capital Gains. Stocks, bonds or property can be used at their current market value to purchase an annuity. However, no capital gains tax is payable even if the original price was much less.

4. Estate Tax. Annuities are not subject to federal estate taxes.

COLLEGE BOARD PLANS FOR PROGRESS

The Northwest College Board of Directors took some significant actions during its January meeting just concluded, Dr. D. V. Hurst, College president announced today. Among them was an action to rename the Women's Residence Hall "Guy-Perks Hall" in honor of retiring Dean of Women, Bessie Guy and the former Dean of Women, the late Mrs. Mollie Perks for whom the north wing was previously named.

Campus improvements are in store for the coming summer, and steps will be taken to develop additional space to keep pace with growing enrollments at the College. The Board noted that four of the last five quarters have been all-time record enrollments, and the last fifteen quarters have represented record enrollments for those respective quarters. This growth has necessitated taking steps to plan and develop additional housing for both single and married students and to develop space for administrative, faculty, and classroom needs at the College.


The Board authorized the establishment of an Early Childhood Education minor based on course offerings already in the program over the last several years.

The Board noted some marked developments in the College's Founder's Fund and acted to utilize the investment returns from the funds to upgrade faculty salaries for the coming year, Dr. Hurst said.

One of the social highlights of the Board's meeting at the College was a joint Board-Faculty dinner—a first in the school's history.

Joining the Board for the first time this session were three new members, two of whom were appointed by action of the Board in its recent meeting. Representing the College Lay Council for the first time was its President and Chehalis businessman, Mr. Stan Beckman. Newly appointed to the Board were Pastor Orvil Holden of Gillette, Wyoming, and Anchorage, Alaska educator, Mr. Richard Blue, currently on leave to complete doctoral studies in school administration at the University of Oregon. Mr. Blue is director in a school system in which he oversees the work of 53 school principals in his district.

DR. DANIEL B. PECOTA came to Northwest College in 1958. His undergraduate training was at Southern California College. He pastored the Assembly of God at Newport Beach, California, and in 1953 attended Fuller Theological Seminary, earning his Master of Divinity degree. He started the work of his Th.M. before coming to Northwest and returned in 1961 to complete the degree. In 1972-73 he earned his Doctor of Ministry degree from Phillips University.

At Northwest College Dr. Dan, as he is affectionately called by students, has had many roles. He served as Dean of Students from 1964 to 1967, and still has a vital concern in student life. Dr. Pecota is recognized by his peers both at the College and in the denominations as an outstanding teacher and scholar. He relates well to his students and is deeply interested in helping them learn.

He has served on the General-Council Theological Study Committee developing position papers and has completed a correspondence course for I.C.I. in Brussels, Belgium, entitled, "THE DOCTRINES OF SALVATION." He has contributed to the *Paraclete, Advance, Campus Ambassador, Pentecostal Evangel*, and written an Instructor's Guide for the Gospel Publishing House. In addition, he has worked on the revision of seventeen articles for the International Standard Bible Encyclopedia for Eerdmans Publishing Company.

PRESIDENT ELECTED MAYOR PRO TEM

Northwest College President Dr. D. V. Hurst was recently elected by the Kirkland City Council to serve as Mayor Pro Tem, it was announced today. Dr. Hurst has served on the City Council since 1976 when he was elected to the Council for a four year term.

As Mayor Pro Tem he serves as Vice-Mayor to Mayor Robert Neir whenever the occasion might require.

Dr. Hurst's service on the City Council is seen as an expression of constructive civic interest, and his election by the Council to the post of Mayor Pro Tem is seen as a positive response of confidence and good will on the part of the Council for his contribution to city government.

It was noted that Kirkland has a city-manager form of government and thus much of the executive work of the municipality is professionally executed through and under the oversight of the city-manager. The growing Lake Washington community is one of the fastest developing municipalities in the residential complex of the Greater Seattle area, recent reports indicate.

Commenting on Dr. Hurst's election to the post, Kirkland Mayor Robert Neir said, "Dr. Hurst, as President of Northwest College, has brought deep insights into local government and the community. The result of this is the addition of vital elements to the life of the Kirkland area."

FULL CIRCLE IN MISSIONS

The Reverend A. M. Cakau, Winter Quarter Missions Emphasis Week speaker at Northwest College, was more than a guest pulpiteer. He is the product of missions itself representing "Missions full circle." The 45 year old Fijian Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, oversees the work of about 100 established churches and over 300 other preaching points in the Fijian Islands.

Reverend Cakau told the students and faculty at the College that his conversion came about when he was serving in the Fijian Army and a friend took him to church where he was converted under the preaching of a lady evangelist from Oklahoma. The missions church was pastored by veteran missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. Heeterbry. The tall Fijian said he intends to visit Mrs. Heeterbry (Rev. Heeterbry has since passed away) before returning to Fiji.

Superintendent Cakau sees a changing role in the function of missionaries in Fiji. Missionaries will play an auxiliary role, particularly in training of national pastors and national leaders. They will not be fulfilling the traditional pastoral role of missions as they have been in the past.

Rev. Cakau sees a prospect of change coming to political life in the Islands with increasing unrest, as they seek to catch up with the economics and technology of the world at large. In this setting the missionary will continue to have a role, but it will be a more specialized role.

The energetic superintendent has served as Assemblies of God leader in Fiji since 1966, and prior to that he served as Assistant General Superintendent from 1959-66.

His messages at the College were filled with Biblical content and spiritual impact. He said that his greatest impression of the U.S. is the immensity of its size. This was his third speaking mission to the U.S.

NEW ALL-TIME ENROLLMENT RECORD: 707

A new milestone was reached in the history of enrollments at Northwest College in Kirkland when 707 students enrolled for the College's Winter Quarter term, the Registrar's Office announced today. It is the first time that the College's enrollment reached and exceeded 700. It is the fifteenth consecutive quarter that the College has experienced an enrollment record for that respective quarter. It is the second year in a row that the Winter Quarter enrollment exceeded the enrollment on record for the Autumn Quarter, a phenomenon not previously experienced. In five quarters the College has set a new all-time high enrollment four times and broken that record three times.

The new record exceeded college projections both as to the total number of new students who enrolled for the quarter and as to the number of students who enrolled. Projections called for 699 based on the previous year's experience and 675 based on a composite of the last five years' experience.

Commenting on the new record, Dr. D. V. Hurst said, "The record of enrollment growth is exciting, challenging, and rewarding! It says much about the health of the church, the academic programs offered at N.C., and the quality of the academic work. It says much about the future of the ministry and the church. It also reminds us of our building needs, but growth problems are good problems."

"Bessie Guy Day" at Northwest College was observed to honor the College's retiring Dean of Women, a twenty-year veteran on the College faculty. It was forty-three years ago to the month that Miss Guy had her first contact with the College as a student.

Though she is retiring as Dean of Women, she is not fully retiring from the services of the College, President Dr. D. V. Hurst explained. After a month's leave of absence for a trip that will take her to Africa and South America where she will visit alumni missionaries, Miss Guy will return to the College to continue duties on a part-time basis as the College's Director of Off-Campus Student Employment and Housing.

The day was highlighted by special honors paid the vivacious Dean when she was speaker in the College's chapel service on January 26. Following recollections and an introduction, students gave her a standing ovation and displayed a banner expressing their affection for the witty Dean reading, "She's a Great 'Guy!'" The slogan became the theme of the day on the campus as students and faculty donned lapel badges carrying the words.

Before the chapel concluded, students presented to her a set of luggage. President Hurst presented to her a check, a gift from the College as a gesture of appreciation from the College's Board of Directors.

President Hurst also announced that the Board of Directors had determined the name of the women's residence halls will now be Guy-Perks Halls, with the west wing named in honor of Bessie Guy and the north wing in honor of Mollie Perks, whom Miss Guy succeeded as Dean of Women.

That evening at the faculty-board dinner, Miss Guy was featured as the guest of honor.
