


Dr. Hurst congratulated the Evergreen Christian Center in Olympia and Rev. Glen Cole for being the largest contributor to the College this past year. Evergreen Christian Center contributed over \$13,700 to the school and was the largest contributor not only for the Northwest District but for all districts that support the College.

In addition to Founder's Fund pledges and the 2% contribution from the church, they also have a very fine scholarship program for students who qualify. The church has been a supporter of the school for many years.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS ACTS LONG RANGE

In its recent annual meeting the College Board of Directors approved a far reaching Priorities and Strategy report for campus development which it received after months of study. The College has experienced sixteen consecutive quarters of record enrollment. During the last two years alone four all-time high records were set. Facilities are full at almost every point and overflowing in many ways. The question is: What facilities do we need most and how can we provide them? It has two thrusts: What do we need to adequately service the present enrollment and what will we need at succeeding levels of enrollment if the College should continue to grow?

To answer these questions, study in many directions was required—enrollment trends and projections inside and outside church related schools, selected facilities to student ratio formulas, debt service availabilities, and sources of funding.

As a result of the study the Board authorized the planning of work on the following projects: (1) Phase I of the Administration/Faculty Complex. This ties Bronson Hall, Ness Administration Building, and the Science Building together and nearly doubles the administration/faculty office space; (2) Completion of the Library basement providing three classrooms, four faculty offices, storage and related service facilities; (3) Conversion of two classrooms in Perks Hall to eight residence rooms and an infirmary; (4) Erection of a twelve unit Married Student Residence Hall, as well as completion of two other married student apartments; (5) Surfacing of the Pavilion parking lot; (6) Further development of the series of ponds near the Chapel and sidewalks and stairs near the Learning Center.

Under careful consideration in the fall Executive Committee meeting will be the possible enlargement of the Chapel through the addition of two "wings." Following this will be the scheduling of the new athletic field development and then the new entrance. Also the Cafeteria food service line will be

studied for improvement.

This is a heavy agenda, but before we can move very far in these developments we must have City approval of the Campus Master Plan. In these days of environmental impact concerns, heavy citizen input, strong city preoccupation with details of planning, etc., securing approval of a long range Master Plan for a 55 acre campus in the heart of a single family residential district is a delicate thing. We have experienced requests for more information . . . threatened City constriction . . . and delays. We have the zoning; we need approval on the plan! Pray with us!

Pastoral Ministries III Report

Professor Dwaine Braddy reports that the class is over; the report is in. The first offering of the new Pastoral Ministries III class under the new Pastoral Studies Major has met with enthusiastic response. The subject matter covered in this class included public relations and promotion, office management, legal aspects of church business, banking and budgeting, the minister's personal finances, church architecture and construction and many other similar topics.

Degrees, Honors Conferred At 42nd Commencement



It was exactly 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 28, when flagbearing color guards led a processional of graduates, faculty, members of the College Board, and guests from the Butterfield Chapel to the College's Pavilion to observe the College's 42nd Commencement. Highlighting the occasion was the conferral of degrees upon 115 candidates for graduation among which were 72 candidates for the B.A., 2 for the Th.-B., 1 for the Diploma, and 40 for the two-year A.A. degree. In addition to these was the conferral of the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity, upon the Reverend Dr. D.H. McLaughlin, long-time minister, District Superintendent and Executive Presbyter for the General Council, considered by many to be the ''Dean'' of the Executive Presbytery in the Assemblies of God.

Other special honors included alumni Miss Estelle Crittendon, Miss Eva Radanovsky (both of the class of 1938), and the Reverend Dr. Ward M. Tanneberg (class of 1958), who were granted honorary membership in the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society in recognition of outstanding achievement pursuant to graduation from the College.

The President's Award was made for the first time in recognition of special contribution of service to the College by retiring Financial Aids Director, Mr. Buel Brodin of Olympia.

Special guests on the occasion were Dr. John Mostert, Executive Director for the American Association of Bible Colleges, who was the commencement speaker, and the Reverend Dr. D.H. McLaughlin, long-time district superintendent and Executive Presbyter in the Assemblies of God.

In his Commencement Address Dr. John Mostert pointed up the timeliness of Christian Commitment in Higher Education. He noted some of the national trends that give cause for concern in national moral standards and in the stability of western society.

Preceding the Commencement on Saturday evening was the traditional Baccalaureate Service held in the College Chapel which the Dr. D.H. McLaughlin challenged the graduates concerning an unprecedented opportunity they have to be witness to, and to be part of one of the greatest movements of the Holy Spirit in Church History. His text was 1 Thessalonians 1:5 from which he concluded that we have a WITNESS OF CERTAINTY. He challenged the graduates with the thought that no one can preach the gospel this way without being the right kind of man.







Passing of a Pioneer

Sky-pilot of the Carribou Country is the title of a book describing the early ministry of the Reverend Allan S. Ellis in the northwoods country of Canada. On May 25, Reverend Ellis passed on to his eternal reward in fulfillment of the message and life which he proclaimed during



over 50 years of ministry. A significant part of Reverend Ellis' ministry was on the faculty of Northwest College from 1944 to 1952, where he taught New Testament and Greek.

After a lingering illness, the 82 year old veteran ministereducator left a legacy of spiritual enrichment and example which has touched the lives of hundreds of former students, parishioners and colleagues in the ministry over the Pacific Northwest.

Born in Chester, England, Reverend Ellis immigrated with his parents early in his life to British Columbia. After teaching school there for a short while he entered theministry and served in pastorates in some of the leading churches of the Pacific Northwest and Western Canada before coming to serve at Northwest College.

Two of his sons are graduates of Northwest College—the Reverend Richard Ellis, missionary to Panama, and Mr. Mark Ellis, who is associated with the ministry of Shoreline Community Church.

Reverend Ellis' homegoing was celebrated at Calvary Temple on May 31 at which time an unusual array of ministers and friends were in attendance. Participating in the service were Pastor Charles Anderson of Calvary Temple, Pastor Ben Birkeland of Shoreline Community Church, former student of Professor Ellis, District Superintendent Rev. Frank McAllister, and President Emeritus of Northwest College, the Reverend Dr. Charles E. Butterfield.

College alumni expressed special appreciation for the popular former professor at one of their recent homecoming banquets held at the College two years ago.

Professor Esther Dine Harmon



Esther Harmon comes to Northwest College with long and deep roots in the work of the Church which start in the state of Colorado.

Mrs. Harmon's pathway moves from Colorado to Springfield, Missouri, where she took her college training in Evangel College, receiving her Bachelor of Business Administration degree in 1963. Her career took her to Canyonville Bible Academy in southern Oregon where she taught from 1963 to 1966.

The third move of her career brought her to Northwest Col lege in 1966 where she has just completed her twelfth year of service on the faculty of the College, teaching in the area of Secretarial Science and Business.

Mrs. Harmon's business skills have found ministry expression in the work of the local church as well. She has served as Sunday School Secretary, Church Secretary, and currently serves as Secretary-Treasurer for the College Women's Auxiliary. In other areas of ministry she has served as a Sunday School teacher, and ministered as a member of the church choir.

Mr. Paul Gray, Tacoma Businessman, alumnus of the College, and lay leader at Tacoma's First Assembly of God Church, was elected to the chairmanship of the Board of Directors of Northwest College at the Board's June meeting. Mr. Gray succeeds the Reverend Frank McAllister, who has completed two successive terms as Board chairman.

Newly elected Vice-chairman is the Reverend Robert Brandt, District Superintendent of the Montana District Council of the Assemblies of God. Rev. Brandt, a member of the Board since 1969, now resides in Billings, Montana.

The Reverend C.L. Hobson, Kirkland resident, alumnus of the College, and District Secretary-Treasurer for the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God, was elected for another term as Secretary of the Board.

Newly elected Treasurer was the Reverend Frank Cole, also a Kirkland resident, alumnus and Assistant District Superintendent of the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God.

The officers will give executive leadership to the College in behalf of the 32-member Board comprising of church leaders and laymen from throughout Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, and Alaska.

1979 Flying Seminar Plans Announced

Dr. D.V. Hurst announced the College's 1979 Flying Seminar to the Holy Land March 8-23. The itinerary includes visits to Jordan (Amman and Petra), to Israel, and to Western Turkey, where the group will visit the sites of the Seven Churches of Revelation. Leading the tour will be Dr. Hurst.

An integral part of the College's tour program is a comprehensive study series in preparation for the tours. Instructing the tour groups will be Dr. Amos D. Millard. In terms of its Biblical educational values, he points out that it literally moves from "Genesis through Revelation" in its geographic and historical settings starting with the King's Highway of Patriarchal Times moving to settings of Israel's history from the Conquest to the Gospels and ending up in the setting to be found in the book of Revelation.

Plans are under study for the possibility of another summer tour, especially designed for public school teachers and others who cannot get released during the regular school year.

Pictured below is a dock at Capernaum on the Sea of Galilee that presents a view which may well have been seen by Jesus and the Disciples two thousand years ago. In the distance are the Galilean hills through which Jesus and the Disciples must have walked often. Capernaum represents one of the great archaeological discoveries in the Holy Land. The city, known to the archaeologosts as "Tel Hum" was buried beneath the debris of its own destruction and the ravages of time, is today excavated and recreates the setting of an ancient Galilean fishing village dating to Roman times.
