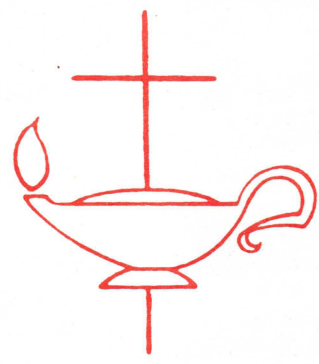

From The President

HERE & THERE

These are busy days at Northwest College!

The accrediting team from the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges visited campus October 30, 31, and November 1. They did an in-depth study while on campus. The College administration and faculty had done a self-study during the last year and printed the report, submitting it to the Commission of the Association in late August. Dean Frank Rice had done a fine job of coordinating the study. In early December Dr. Rice and I will appear before the Higher Commission.

The College was accredited by the Association five years ago, friends will recall. The review visit and the self-study are all a part of the normal accreditation process.

The Master Plan for the campus has been approved by the City, as we have reported. The Campus Planning Commission is working with our architect "fine tooling" the plans in accord with the City's requests. The Commission has also adopted a planning and construction "time frame" for the next two years. Soon we will commence construction of an additional married residence hall, the administrative/faculty complex, and further development of the campus itself.

We have completed and are now using three new classrooms and four faculty offices in the first floor of the library.

The eight new ladies residence rooms in Perks Hall are all but complete. A needed 23 new beds!

The enrollment record this year is encouraging and challenging. "Whither Northwest?" is the question! We had 707 last year as a peak and now 727 thus far this year. "Is it on to 747?", some are asking.

Seventeen consecutive quarters of record enrollment is a record in itself!

The Founder's Fund is moving ahead as the accompanying graph shows. Almost \$700,000 in assets! And there has been activity since the last tabulation. There are two significant gifts in motion at the present.

If you know of someone who has appreciated property or securities (stocks, etc.) who needs a tax benefit, let us know. We can help! There are many plans available.

The spiritual tone on campus is good. We are pleased with the quality of the incoming students.

This week is Heritage Week. Speaking in Chapel will be veterans of the faith: Eric Johnson, Missionary and Pastor; Dr. A.D. Millard, 30 years at Northwest; and Dr. C.E. Butterfield, President Emeritus.

The Chapel is alive! The students are alive! God is blessing! Northwest moves forward in its mission!

Why?—Northwest College remains strong in Bible and Ministry training and is getting stronger! Praise God!

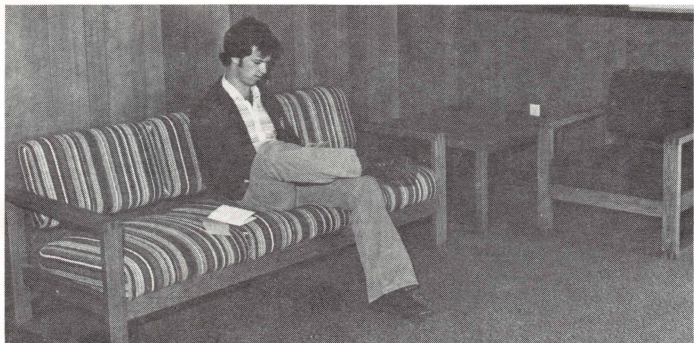

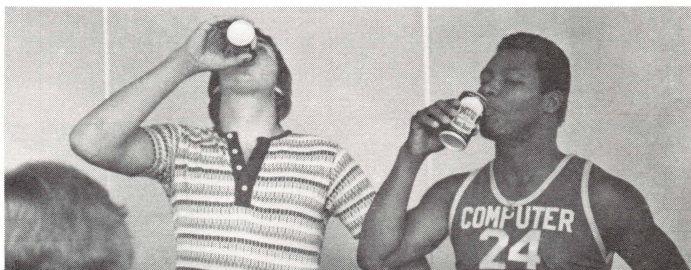

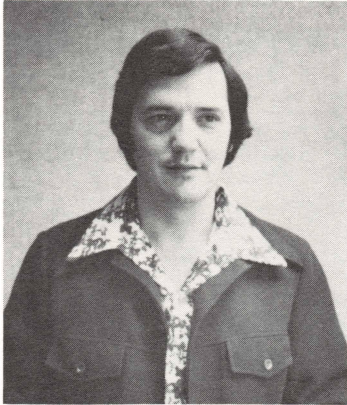

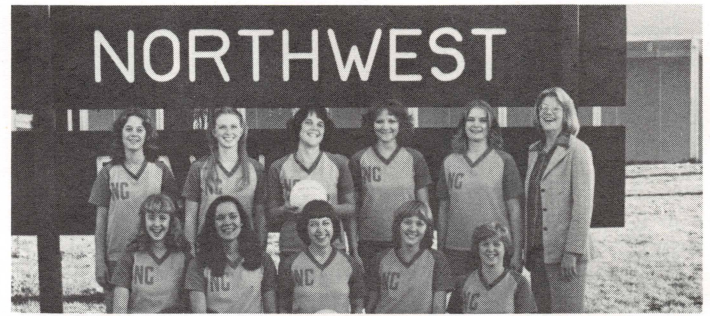
Linda McGuire writes:

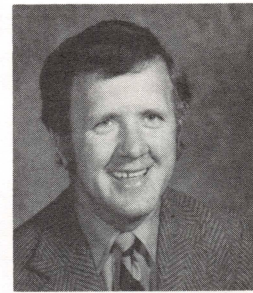
PARENTS' WEEKEND '79

Johnson



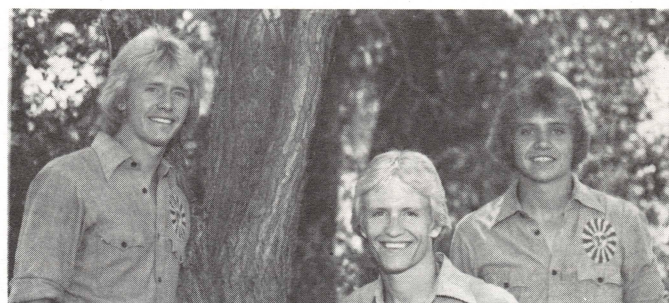

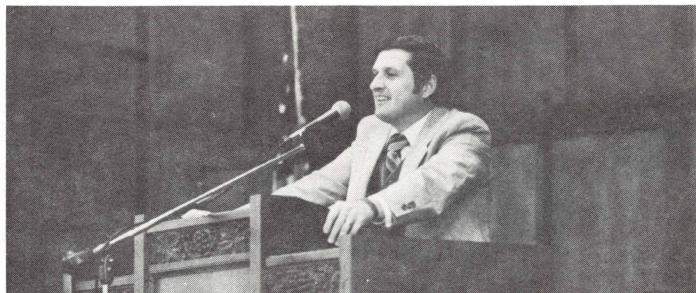

TWO SPRING SEMINARS

Two special seminars in the field of the Bible will be scheduled this coming spring at Northwest College which are considered to be of high priority significance for pastors, and laymen whose studies deal extensively with the Bible.

A one-day seminar dealing with some of the latest discoveries in Biblical Archaeology will be brought by Dr. Robert Cooley, Director of Archaeological Research from the Southwest Missouri State University. 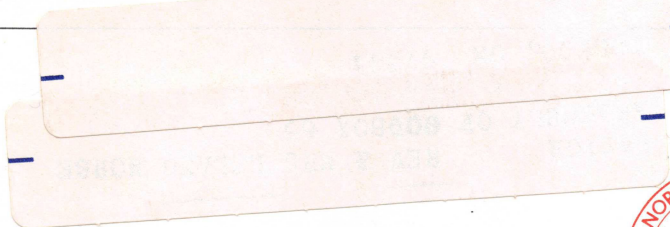
