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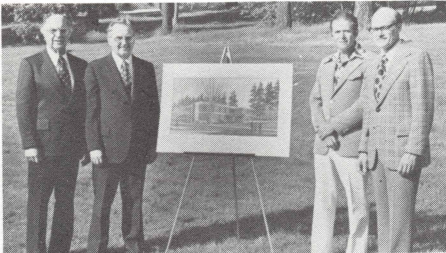

New Library Construction Begins

Against a musical backdrop of chimes from the College chapel, marking the postlude for the 39th Commencement at Northwest College, another ceremony took place on June 1 as prelude to the biggest and most auspicious of all building projects yet undertaken on the campus. It was the ground-breaking service marking the ceremonial beginning of construction of the College's new \$800,000 library building. Leading the ceremonies was College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst, and participating were members of the College Board of Directors, Kirkland City officials, members of the College Planning Commission, College administration and faculty, and student leaders.

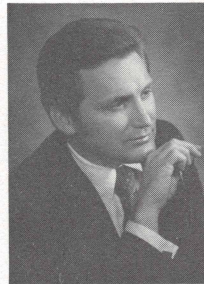
Construction has started with dedication of the 3-story fire-proof structure hopefully set for Lay Council time next April, Dr. Hurst said. The new building will provide 24,300 square feet of floor space when fully completed. Two of its floors will be completed now with a third one built in for future expansion. It will be fully air-conditioned and will handle over 100,000 volumes and provide seating and working space for 200 students at one time. It will include listening rooms, private study rooms, small conference and class rooms, and a board room, in addition to rooms for technical services and librarians' offices.

During the ground-breaking ceremonies College Academic Dean, Dr. Frank B. Rice, stated that the College Chapel occupying the crowning elevation of the campus, symbolizes the College's spiritual purpose, while the new Library located at the hub of the campus aptly symbolizes its academic purpose. Around it will be clustered the major classrooms and learning facilities.

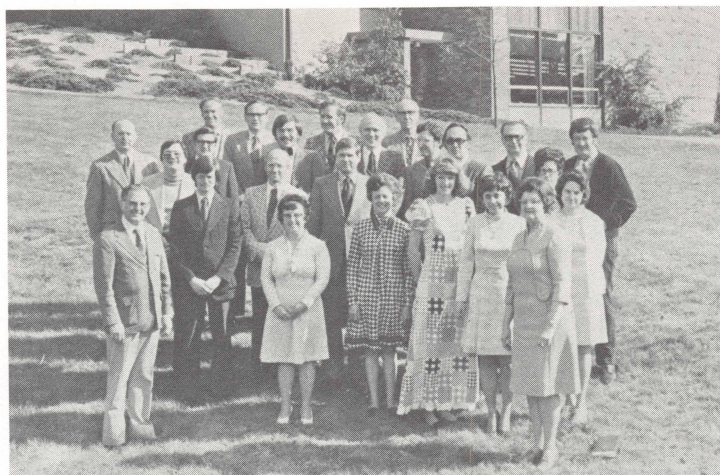

Faculty Summer Activities

Missionary Representative Appointed

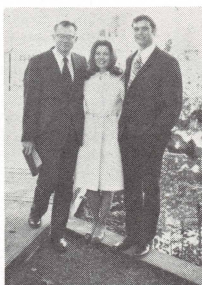

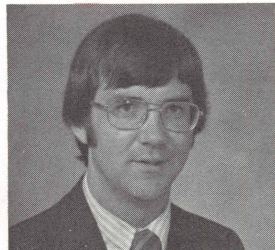

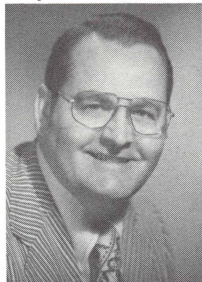

New Appointment

The appointment of Dr. Robert L. Harris to the Northwest College faculty in the field of Applied Theology Studies was announced by Dr. Hurst. Dr. Harris, who currently resides in Glendale, California, brings with him 15 years of pastoral experience and a list of educational credentials that start at Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri, where he majored in Bible up to 1959; North Central Bible College in Minneapolis, where he earned his B.A. Degree in Theology; Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis, where he earned the Master of Divinity in Church Administration in 1969; and the S.T.M. in Christian Education in 1970; and the California Graduate School of Theology where he received a Ph.D. in Church Administration in June 1975. Dr. Harris is currently in further studies at the California Graduate School of Theology and has matriculated into a program leading to the Th.D.

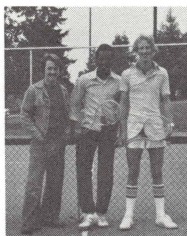


His experience in the pastoral field is equally extensive, College President, Dr. Hurst noted. His contact with the pastoral ministry started while at Central Bible College, working in a Community Church near Springfield, and since then, he has served in pastorates at the 1st Assembly of God in North St. Paul, Minnesota; Evangel Tabernacle in North Vernon, Indiana and most recently at the First Assembly of God Church in Rockanay, New Jersey. He also served as assistant pastor at the 1st Assembly of God Church in Franklin, Indiana.

Dr. Harris essentially will pick up the teaching areas in Applied Theology formerly taught by Prof. Donald H. Fee, who retired from full-time teaching at the College in 1973. Dr. and Mrs. Harris expect to move to Kirkland in late November in preparation for taking up his duties at the college in the winter quarter.

He was ordained by the Assemblies of God in the Southern California District in 1964. He served in military service in the army in 1959-61 and saw overseas service in Seoul, Korea.

In describing Dr. Harris, President Hurst refers to him as a "traditionalist with firm roots of background, thinking and ministry in the Assemblies of God, a man trained in the current pastoral scene in a forward-looking manner."

Evergreen Christian Center Awards Three Scholarships

The Olympia Evergreen Christian Center has awarded three scholarships to students who will attend N.C. this fall.

A \$500 scholarship for the outstanding girl graduate went to Cindy Burns. She was selected as the candidate for Lakemair queen from Olympia High School and competed for that honor in July. She sings in the sanctuary choir, the youth choir and the youth ensemble. She also interprets the services for the church's deaf adherents.

The second \$500 scholarship for the outstanding boy went to Rick Cole who graduated from Tumwater High School. He is a three sport letterman in football, basketball and baseball. Rick is also a member of the sanctuary choir, youth choir and the youth ensemble at the church. He was selected as the outstanding boy camper at Fort Flagler Camp last year.

The third scholarship called the Brian Findell Scholarship for \$300 was awarded to Debbie Holland who is a graduate of Centralia Junior College. The Brian Findell Scholarship is made possible by Mrs. Eileen Findell, whose son, Brian, was killed at age 19. These monies are put in a trust account with Northwest College so that deserving young people might be assisted in their education and preparation for ministry. Debbie has been active in the youth program at Evergreen and is the office secretary on Saturdays. She also helps in the Sunday School and midweek programs.

Other funds to provide scholarships through the church are made available through offerings given on the fifth Sunday night of months with five Sundays. Numbers of youth have been helped by this program, Pastor Cole reports. He mentioned that he was the first recipient of a similar scholarship in 1951 from his home church in Tacoma, Washington.
