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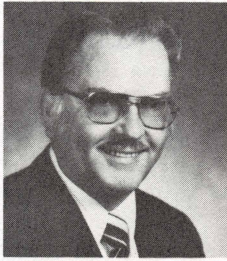

From The President

I'M EXCITED

I have to say it again! I'm still excited about what is happening here at Northwest!

I'm excited about the progress in the library. The footings are in and the basement level walls are going in now—should be finished as you read this. Then it's on with the second floor. No major construction hurdles have been encountered to this point.

Now one gets a sense of the size of the building. It's going to be **big** and beautiful! Situated at the center of the campus, it's going to add a great dimension to what goes on here. The educational process will be enriched! The already beautiful campus will be better than ever!

I'm excited, too, about the faculty strength here at N.C.—experience, academic preparation, and tenure of service. We now have six earned doctorates on faculty, four in the areas of religion, Biblical studies and applied theology, one in music and one in education administration. Two others are candidates for doctoral degrees, meaning they have completed all requirements except the dissertation. One in the area of religion and one in speech. Two others are investigating programs and quite likely could be into them very shortly. Again, one is in the area of religion and the other in general studies. All other full-time faculty—save one—have master's degrees and more.

Another strength of faculty is its tenure of service. The rate of turnover has been extremely low. And a number have been with the College for many years—One for 26 years, one for 25 years and on down. This provides strength of continuity and consistency of direction! It is always considered a mark of excellence in higher education.

The experience of the faculty in Christian service and ministry is deep. I know this. And they are all Assemblies of God and active in our churches. We're going to do a new survey to find out just

how deep this experience is and will report it in the next issue of the Northwesterner.

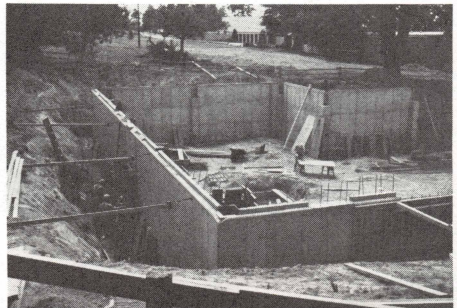
I'm excited about the student body at N.C. Traditionally they have been great young people! And it's a growing student body. We closed the last year with four consecutive quarters of record enrollment. The number of returning students and new applications tell us we should be up again this next year—it could be a significant increase. Applications are up about eight percent and returning students about 20 percent. However, the remaining month and one half and registration day tell the story. Nevertheless, enrollment should be good.

But I'm excited about something else, too. The casual observer may not look at it, but it speaks good things to me. It's the area of internships. This past year, 37 credit hours of internship were earned by students. This is "on the job" training with faculty supervision and classroom interaction—the best kind of practical and applied "finishing" education.

After meeting the requirements of courses, many students continued in internships of various kinds—pastoral, youth, music, counseling, etc.—without seeking credit. And many are involved in summer internships of all kinds right now. This is all over and above the regular work during the year. So not only are students receiving top quality instruction but they are putting it to work at the same time, enriching their training.

So, for these reasons, and many more, I'm excited about what is happening at N.C. I'm eagerly looking forward to this coming year. Join with us in prayer and financial support. Northwest College will be bigger and better if you do!

A SIMPLE TRUST AVAILABLE TO ALL

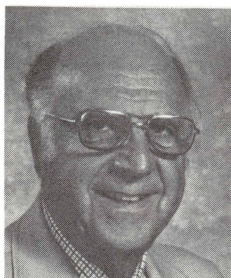
Many persons with regular passbook accounts or certificates of deposit in a savings institution desire to make a gift of that sum to the NORTHWEST COLLEGE OF THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD upon death, but do not want to undertake the expense of changing their wills.

Fortunately, there is a simple but little-known method to accomplish this objective. You may simply transfer your funds from your present account to a trust registration at your savings institution and name the NORTHWEST COLLEGE OF THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD as beneficiary. There is no cost for doing this. You still have the right to add to, withdraw from, or to close the account whenever you wish—just as you do now. All the income earned by the trust account still belongs to you and is taxable to you.

However, any amount which remains in the account upon death automatically goes to NORTHWEST COLLEGE, thus saving on probate expenses, delays and administrative red tape, because the amount in the account passes outside of your will. It is not even mentioned in your will.

This is certainly an easier method of changing your testamentary intentions than revising your present will.

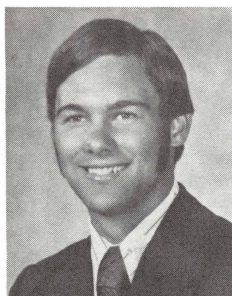

As a national winner, Mr. Gillatt was awarded a \$500 scholarship to the Assemblies of God college of his choice.

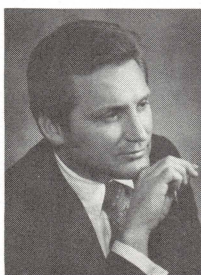
Flying Seminar

Dale Carpenter is a native of Washington, raised on a ranch near Fruitland. He cannot ever remember being in Sunday School or church, reading a Bible or hearing a prayer, until at age 13, a tent was set up near the ranch where he was raised at Fruitland, where the Fruitland Campgrounds now stand. There in an old-fashioned campmeeting service, he first heard the gospel and took Jesus Christ as his Savior. He was greatly influenced the following year by the ministry of D.N. Buntain, the father of Mark Buntain, who was the camp speaker. As a result, he attended Northwest Bible Institute in Edmonton, Alberta, where Pastor Buntain was founder and President of the school. He graduated from there and went into the full time ministry. Rev. Carpenter traveled for a number of years as an evangelist, served the Northwest District for nearly six years as Christ Ambassadors President and Sunday School Director. For the past eleven years, he has pastored the Stone Church in Yakima. A vital and constant characteristic of his ministry has been an interest in youth. For the past twenty-one consecutive years he has ministered in youth camps, conventions, and retreats throughout the Pacific Northwest area. His ministry is marked by a direct evangelistic appeal that touches the hearts of young and old alike.

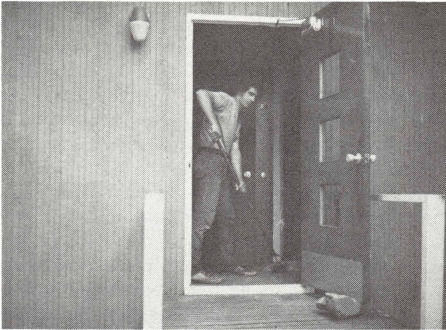
A Happy Pastor

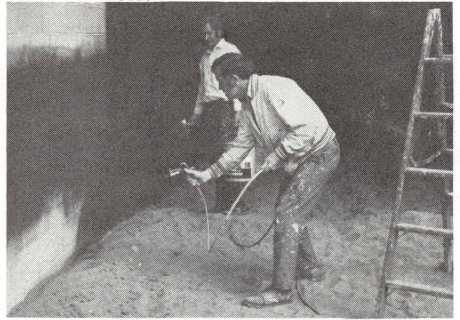

Shirley Newton Attends Institute

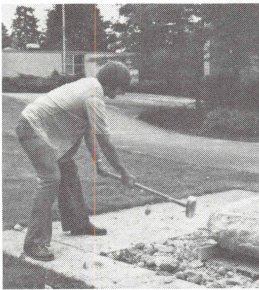

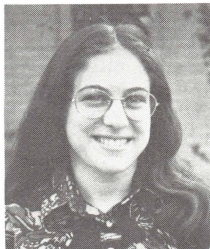


Tom is Married Now

All four of the girls stayed in our home Friday night where we were equally pleased with their conduct. They were a tremendous uplift for our growing church.

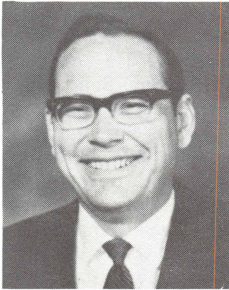
I would be very interested in scheduling another group of this caliber. The ideal thing would be a service in the late fall in the high school auditorium. Could something like that be arranged?

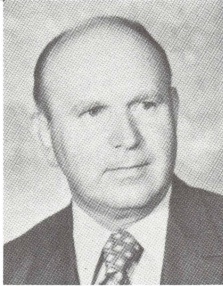
Faculty Recognized
