Spiritual Emphasis Week Speaker: Pastor With A Shepherd Heart

During the Fall Quarter Spiritual Emphasis week, (September 29-October 2). Northwest College students and faculty heard the Reverend Dale Carpenter, pastor of the Stone Church Assembly of God in Yakima, as he communicated something of the meaning of the ministry to the needs of the day. In a word, he expressed through experience and teaching something of the ideals and the genius of the Pentecostal ministry-a pastor with a shepherd's heart and who lives and ministers in the continuing realities of the supernatural and a life-style of simple faith, and a disciplined personal life.

The Reverend Mr. Carpenter is father of senior student at the College, Mr. Calvin Carpenter. Born and reared in the wheat country of Eastern Washington, Pastor Carpenter told of his call to the ministry-a call that took him to northearn Alberta for Bible training. It was here where he met his wife, Mary Lou Taitinger, sister of the Reverend Robert Taitinger, present General Superintendent of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada.

After his training in Bible College, Pastor Carpenter entered the evangelistic ministry in the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God and later served for several years as the District Youth Director for the Northwest District. His first pastorate and also his present one, is the Yakima Stone Church. One of the leading churches in the district, the congregation recently completed a \$500,000 sanctuary and plant and continues in an aggressive evengelistic outreach.

Commenting on the week's series with Pastor Carpenter, College President D.V. Hurst said, "He met the students where they live and pointed toward the joys of the ministry. He was infectious as he portrayed what the ministry and serving God is all about. He showed the man of God to be very human, very joyful and very rewarded in his work. Through 'pages from a preacher's notebook', he gave vignettes of pastoral experience and provided rich insights into the rewards of relating to people in ministry. His portrayal of Biblical narratives made them come alive. The Spirit moved and God blessed. It was a rich week!''

The College's winter series will bring to the campus, the Reverend Otis Keener, recently of Hong Kong, for the annual missionary emphasis week at the College.

N.C. Costs Lowest Among Private Colleges

A College Costs survey conducted by the Washington Natural Gas Company reveals that among the eleven accredited private colleges in the State of Washington, Northwest College's costs are lowest for the 1975-76 academic year. The survey takes into account the package cost of tuition and fees and room and board. Ranking at the top of the cost ladder was Whitman College in Walla Walla with a package cost of nearly \$3900 for the year. Northwest College's package cost is \$2341, and is the only one less than \$3000 per year. The average package cost among the 11 colleges surveyed was around \$3300 per year-about \$1000 per year higher than that at Northwest College.

Commenting on the cost of education at Northwest College, College President Dr. D.V. Hurst noted that "it has always been part of the educational philosophy of the College to seek balance in the factors of quality education and the availability factor i.e. to put quality education within the reach of the constituency whom the College seeks to serve."

BEOG

Northwest College Has All-Time Record Enrollment

An all-time record enrollment of 627 students have enrolled at Northwest College for the Autumn Ouarter, 1975. The students come from 27 states, Canada, and 8 foreign countries, the Registrar's office reports. The roster shows that 55% are Washingtonians, and the remaining 45% come from out of state. By classes, the largest increases occur in the upper classes with Juniors increasing 36% over last year and Seniors by 50% over last year. This is the fifth consecutive quarter that the College has experienced an all-time record for that particular quarter, the Registrar's office reports.
