N.C. Believes In Training **PREACHERS!**

Preaching is ordained of God!

It's a strange communication technique. It defies analysis and raises questions about its necessity. It's described as "foolish" in the Word. And yet, **God chose it** as the means of getting the message of redemption across to the people!

It may be easier to suggest what preaching is not than what it is. It is not just the sharing of experiences or speculations or opinions.

And preaching is not just teaching. (I don't mean the latter is less, it's different). Years ago W.T. Gaston, a great pulpiteer among us wrote, "All good teaching (in the Christian context) includes some preaching and all good preaching includes some teaching." Neither alone will do; in the total Christian communication both are needed! But preaching has its unique place. There is a function only it will perform.

Our movement was ushered in with heartfelt and heartwarming preaching. People listened . . . responded and were changed!

Nothing will replace a man of God, filled with the Word of God, burning in his spirit, standing in front of his congregation on a Sunday and forthrightly declaring that Word!

He will "sit" with the congregation, as is suggested even of the Messiah, (see Hebrews 2 and Psalm 22), worship with them and sing with them. He will then minister to them. And as he does he will listen to the message, receiving and accepting its thrust even as the congregation does. Thus he will free himself to preach the Word!

Preaching centers in the authority of the Word. As a result, more often than not the preacher will confess **he** needs the message, too!

Have you noticed how much "sharing" is in vogue, even to the point of apologizing for being "preachy?!" There should be no apology for preaching! The divine approval resting on preaching should answer these questions.

What should one preach? Preach Christ, not self! For, He must be lifted up and He will draw men!

Preach the truth! Preach the Word! Not just experience. Movements that have started well often have gone astray when experiences became supreme. Those who just "measure themselves by themselves and compare themselves among themselves" are not wise. (2 Cor. 10:12)

When one lowers his view of scripture, or he wants to be "approved" by all who listen, or he's unsure of himself, or he may not be ready to submit to the message personally, he

may be tempted just to "share," to compare ideas, to compare experiences. But this is not preaching; this is not what is commanded in the Great Commission!

There's something glorious in preaching filled with divine injunction and covered with Holy Spirit unction. It's because God chose it as a way to get His message to people. "Go preach!" Jesus said.

This is why Northwest College believes in training preachers and works at it. Furthermore, to the best of our ability, we're going to work harder at it! We're going to exalt the preaching ministry at N.C. more than ever before!

Workshop Series Slated For Coming Year

A series of highly relevant workshops and seminars for the church are scheduled for the current academic year. They can be divided on a quarterly basis.

Fall quarter will feature a workshop entitled, "The Satellite Church." This is scheduled for Tuesday, October 28 with Pastor Allen Groff and the staff of First Assembly of God in Albany, Oregon. Pastor Groff's church is nationally known for its promotion and eminent success in developing, "satellite churches." Accompanying Pastor Groff will be the pastors of the satellite churches who are also members of the church staff of the mother church in Albany. The workshop finds its basis in Biblical principles and in practical present day necessity when the mobility of western society faces many changes.

Winter quarter workshops will include the Robert E. Schuler Institute of Garden Grove, California presenting their workshop on, "Successful Church Leadership." Dates for the workshop/institute are set for February 9 & 10. This workshop is co-sponsored by the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God and Northwest College. The Schuler Institute has long been known for its forward and progressive work in the field of church growth.

In addition to the above, the annual workshop entitled "Life Threatening Illness", will be held February 23, 24, & 25 at the Veterans Hospital in Seattle. This workshop is sponsored by the Veterans Hospital and is led by Chaplain Whitaker. College credit can be earned.

The spring quarter workshop is in the field of Christian Education and on the theme of, "Christian Education in the 1980's." The College will be bringing in another professonal resource person, "The Rev. Rodney Toews", Vice-President of Gospel Light Publications, and a popular lecturer in church growth conventions. He serves as Director of the International Center for Learning for Gospel Light Publications. This workshop is slated for Tuesday, March 31, 1981.

The summer session will include a one week seminar which will be put on by the nationally known Creation Institute for Creation Research. Those who attend will discover this seminar to be one of Biblical/Science research.

The Creation Institute will bring to the campus some eminent scholars and authors in the field of Creation Research. Pastors, laymen, teachers, and students, will find the subject matter highly relevant to the needs of the church today. This institute is scheduled for June 8-12.

The workshops are for enrichment and for continuing education for graduates, alumni, pastors, students, faculty, and friends of the College.

Salem Oregon's People's Church Welcomed Two Summer Interns

The summer internship program through Northwest College saw thirty-six young people ministering throughout the country and in addition fourteen young people participated in the MAPS program.

Intern Arne Dixon wrote the following. WHAT IS AN IN-TERN? Well, I'm glad you asked that question, because I think I have an answer! Basically, an intern is someone who is in the process of becoming trained and prepared for ministry by becoming involved in on-the-job training.

Internship is a fabulous opportunity for the Bible College student to receive down-to-earth practical experience in ministry. The many tasks that the intern is asked to do help cultivate responsibility and character which could not be sufficiently developed in the college classroom.

An intern also has the privilege of spending a concentrated period of time observing the many ministries of the church. He/she will have the opportunity to spend time with pastors, secretaries, custodians, and practically everyone who makes the church ministry happen. While spending time with the pastors, he/she can discuss important concerns such as: "How do you know for sure that you are called into the ministry?" or "How do you go about preparing your sermons?" and any other issues that may need to be dealt with. While with another, he/she may discover how the sound system operates . . . perhaps another person will explain how the computer works and any other number of necessary parts of the overall church program.

So what exactly does an intern gain from his experience? Certainly he/she gains a greater appreciation for the role that each individual plays in the whole ministry of the church. He/she also has a greater understanding of what the ministry is really like. And finally, the intern has gained a new perspective for the future and how to prepare for his/her work of service toward those he/she will minister to.

National Winners Select Northwest College



Northwest College has the distinction of being selected by the two top national winners in the Christ's Ambassadors Scholarship Contest. Winning the nation-wide event were two young people in the Pacific Northwest Region. They are Mr. Ghyrn Lee Wakefield of Port Orchard, Washington and Deborah Herr of Salem, Oregon. In addition to the top honors won by these two young people, forty-seven district winners were also selected.

Ghyrn Wakefield was the winner in the mens division. He graduated from South Kitsap High School where he ranked third in his class of 449 graduates and was a member of the National Honor Society. During his high school career he served on the yearbook staff and was a representative to the class council for three years. He assisted in the organization of a club for foreign exchange students and served as its president for three years. He also served on the student council advisory and talent program committees.

Ghyrn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. LaVern Jones and is a member of the South Park Assembly of God Church where he serves as youth president, teaches a Sunday School class, serves as church pianist, and directs children's church.

The national winner among young women was Deborah Herr, who graduated from North Salem High School where she also ranked third in scholastics among her graduating class of 264 members.

During her school career she achieved a number of scholastic honors. She was a member of the Spanish Club, Vice-President of Young Life which is a campus Bible Study group. She is a member of Westgate Assembly of God where she has served as secretary of the youth group. She was a member of the 1979 Bible Quiz team which took top honors in competition in the Oregon District, and she was top quizzer in both state and regional competition.

These winners were selected on the basis of character, academic achievement, and participation in both church and community activities. The program was sponsored jointly by the Youth and the Education departments of the Assemblies of God. Each winner will receive a \$500.00 dollar scholarship to Northwest College.

Dr. Pope Retires From Air Force Reserve

Colonel, and has served as Wing Chaplain for the 446th Military Airlift Wing (Associate) at McChord Air Force Base since 1969.

A special meeting and dinner honoring Dr. Pope was held on the date of his retirement, and on September 13th he participated in a formal ceremony at which he received the Meritorious Service Medal.

Dr. Pope, who holds the Ph.D. degree from the University of St. Andrews in Scotland, has served on the Northwest College faculty since 1960. He teaches in the fields of Church History, Philosophy and Biblical Literature.

1980 Summer Session: Another Success

Summer session figures reported by the Registrar's office indicate another successful summer session – the fourth summer session in the school's history. Enrollments reached 119 which included 97 students taking work for college credit.

Figures show that nearly one-half of the summer school registrants were seniors who were either taking courses to accelerate or to complete their programs for graduation or enrichment courses for which they did not have time during the course of the regular school year. A popular enrichment seminar was the Seminar in Applied Eschatology conducted by guest lecturer, Dr. David Lewis.

Nearly one-third of the summer school students were juniors and a number of pastors and laymen enrolled for the session, primarily in the Applied Eschatology seminar. Plans tentatively call for a return of Dr. Lewis in the future to bring another series in the field of Biblical Prophecy.

For the summer session of 1981 the special enrichment course feature will be a one-week seminar put on by the Institute of Creation Research of San Diego. It will bring to the campus some of the leading scholars and writers in the field of Bible-Science research.

Plans have been made to release the full schedule for the summer session for 1981 by November. Dates for the session are June 8-July 3, 1981. Summer school students have lauded the program for its personalized nature in the classroom.

Academic Master Plan Commissioned

The appointment of an Academic Master Plan Commission at Northwest College was announced today by College President, D.V. Hurst. Purpose of the Commission is to continue the work begun by the Academic Master Plan Committee appointed by the College's Board of Directors to probe future directions of academic development at the College.

President Hurst explained that the Academic Master Plan Commission parallels the long-standing Campus Planning Commission at the College. He added that it fulfills a stated purpose of the Bylaws and that it responds to recommendations from the Northwest Association of Schools and College's regarding long-range academic planning.

One of the key tasks of the Committee will be to do continuing studies on trends and needs in the sponsoring church constituency and to recommend curriculum development that responds to the needs.

Represented on the Committee will be representative of the College Board of Directors, the College Administration and the faculty.

Prof Randolph Completes Tape-Slide Presentations



In response to requests from churches for materials that can be used to deal with problems resulting from evolutionary indoctrination, Northwest College Biological Sciences Professor, William Randolph has completed a project to provide three tape-slide presentations on the subject.

The project was made possible by a grant from the Pope Memorial Research Grant Program. The program was funded by an endowment from the estate of the late Mr. and Mrs. Moses Pope, parents of Northwest College Professor, Dr. John M. Pope.

Prof. Randolph indicates the project includes three tapeslide presentations. One deals with the questions of the geologic history of the earth; another, with the fossil record; and the third with the fossil record of man.

Evangelism Is More Than A Course

Meet Chuck Young, who for the past two years has been a student at Echo Glen, an institution for youth that have become criminals.

A couple of months ago an NC student walked into Chuck's cottage and introduced himself as Mark. Mark was a volunteer from Northwest College involved with the Youth Mig, whose aim is to help kids like Chuck. Soon after Mark went to Echo Glen he was assigned to Chuck as his specific volunteer.

One night Mark asked Chuck if he would like to go to a concert. When they arrived everybody was laughing and talking and seemed to be having a good time. When the group started singing it seemed like they were having a good time too. They kept singing about Jesus and His love. Then they saw a film, it talked about the world coming to an end and how a person could be ready. Even though Chuck didn't understand all of it he could see that these people were happy. On the way back to Echo Glen, Mark asked Chuck if he had any questions. Chuck told him he didn't understand and Mark explained it.

Then Mark asked Chuck some questions which were part of the introduction taught in the Personal Evangelism Course at NC. These questions really made Chuck think about where his life was going. Chuck was unsatisfied, going nowhere, and was spiritually dead but he realized he could receive the free gift that Jesus offered. Mark stopped the car on the side of the freeway and helped Chuck ask Jesus Christ to be the controller of his life.

Mark and Chuck are examples of what NC is all about. You must understand that evangelism is more than a course at N.C. It is a way of life.

Professor Thee Receives Ph.D.

Northwest College Professor Thee was the recipient of the Ph.D. degree at the University of Chicago in conferral ceremonies August 29th.

The conferral climaxes over ten years of research and writing on his doctoral dissertation plus his course work at the University which dates back into the 1960's. Prof. Thee's work was taken in the Division of Humanities and in the Department of New Testament and Early Christian Literature at the University. His dessertation is the outcome of extensive research on an early third century Christian writer, Julius Africanus, and the early Christian view of magic.

Dr. Thee, who has served on the faculty of the College since 1963, completed his B.A. degree work at Central Bible College after which he completed Master of Arts degrees at Central Bible College and at Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois. Before coming to Northwest College he served on the pastoral staff of a church in the Chicago area where he commenced his doctoral studies. At Northwest College, Dr. Thee teaches in the fields of Biblical Literature, New Testament Greek, and Theology.

Commenting on Dr. Thee's attainment of Ph.D. Dr. Frank Rice, Academic Dean at the College, observed, that Dr. Thee's attainment "is but further evidence of NC faculty's drive for excellence. A decade ago there were no doctors on the faculty; now one-fourth of the full-time teachers hold doctorates. Others in progress would make the figure more than one-third. N.C.'s teachers believe in both spiritual and academic excellence."

Other faculty members currently in doctoral programs include Professor Calvin White at the University of Washington; Professor Dwaine Braddy, at Drew University; Professor J. Melvyn Ming also at Drew University; and Dean of Students, Waymon Rutledge at California Graduate School of Theology.



The Northwest College faculty includes one Canadian citizen, Wayne Werner, teacher of Christian education and Bible. He grew up in Ontario, where he was saved at the age of 7, Spirit-filled at 14, and ultimately ordained to Christian ministry. It was there he attended Eastern Pentecostal Bible College, and there he first pastored. It was in the U.S., however, that he completed his college education – with a B.A. in elementary education and Christian education at Oral Roberts University, and an M.Div. in Bible and Christian education at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School.

Although his education was strongly theoretical, Wayne always aims at practical applications in his teaching. His own experience as pastor, minister of youth and music, and as director of Christian education provide practical orientation. He had also spent one year as a teacher at Continental Bible College in Brussels, Belgium, prior to joining the NC faculty.

Wayne's wife is the daughter of college educators, the Virgil Nicholsons of Evangel College. Judy teaches music on a parttime basis at NC, holding a Master of Music degree in piano performance from the University of Missouri at Kansas City. Wayne and Judy have two young children, Karl and Kevin. Family life is a top priority with the Werners.

Something of a perfectionist, Wayne makes unusual demands upon himself in preparation for his classes. When he speaks, his students can be sure he has made every effort to give them 'the whole truth.' You have to admire such devotion to his calling.

TWO SIGNIFICANT SPOTS are shown above. In the foreground is part of the Temple Mount – the esplanade on which the ancient Jewish Temple was located. Pictured on the skyline is a church tower marking the approximate spot on the summit of the Mt. of Olives where the Ascension took place. Both are historically prophetically significant. One denotes the place to which Christ will return; and the other the spot of the rebuilt Jewish Temple. To the left of the scene is the famous Golden Gate through which Christ rode on Palm Sunday and through which it is believed He will enter as the Jewish Messiah when He returns. Northwest College has enjoyed remarkable stability in its faculty through the years, and this year is no exception. Her education includes a diploma from NC and a B.A. from the University of Washington in English, and her M.A. at the University is virtually completed. She brings a practical touch to her teaching of English composition, for she is herself a successful writer. She has published many articles in both Assemblies of God and other periodicals, and wrote ICI's textbook on *The Teaching Ministry*. She is also well known as a retreat speaker in the Northwest, and as a promoter of the WM's neighborhood Bible studies program.

Jim Davis resumes his assignment as Missionary-in-Residence at NC for 1980-81, during which time his daughter will be completing high school at King's High School in Seattle. After leaving NC in 1976, Jim went to Australia to direct the ICI work there. Later he assumed duties with Life Publishers in Florida, the Assemblies of God publication arm responsible for translation of Christian materials into foreign languages. Jim also returns with a Doctor of Philosophy degree – from Western Conservative Baptist Seminary. Missions students at NC will be happy to welcome Dr. Davis back to campus.
