#### A PLACE... A TIME... TO PRAY

I've been impressed this year about N.C. - a place to

pray - and N.C. a time to pray.

As the year opened we were in deep need of a breakthrough so that we could commence construction on the new residence hall. We desperately need it. I wrote to all our friends asking them to pray. We've had a breakthrough; we have started building. And it will be ready by September 1981. But I believe we will see an even greater breakthrough on the financing!

No letter I have written about N.C. has seen the response that letter brought. We didn't ask for money, we asked for prayer. But many sent dollars and said they were praying. Others wrote of their concern and pledged to

pray.

We know they are! We feel it!

Let's keep it up! And more earnestly' "The effectual fer-

vent prayer" breaks through.

Also early in the year I received a copy of a memorandum from student John Young, leader of the Campus MIG (Ministry Interest Group) to all faculty and staff regarding "Secret Prayer" saying:

"This is to inform you that the Student Leadership of this campus feels the burden in their heart to uplift you daily in prayer. Each student leader has been assigned a name of a faculty member, parttime faculty, or staff member and will be praying for that person daily. This will be done for you throughout the year. You will find out at the end of the year who it was who was praying for you."

Early in the winter quarter alumnus Linfield Crowder joined us for a week of Missions Emphasis. He brought a Spirit of prayer. Night after night students stayed late at the altar of prayer. We saw a good move of God!

Linfield preached prayer – prayed prayer and urged prayer. He said: "I'm jealous over the altar, I'll do anything to get you to give God time to do His work in your life." Again he said: "Give me a young man or a young women who will hit the altar, climb the hill and pick up his or her cross and die! One cross can save the world." Still again he said: "A long time ago my heart moved from the pulpit to the altar. Jesus said, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer'."

And just recently there was a full page report on N.C. in our East Side paper, *The Journal American*. In one of the articles, covering a third page and quoting one student, Willy Miller, was captioned—"Students don't hesitate to pray in the halls!"

So we've seen a great prayer emphasis and are seeing it. Pray with us that this will continue and grow at N.C. We want the Spirit of supplication . . . the old time sights and sounds of young people at the altar praying and learning to pray to be everywhere evident at N.C.

What greater experience?!



## ADMINISTRATOR FEATURE: Crowder and Fletcher

Unlike other members of the N.C. administration, H.W. ("Herb") Crowder and Woodrow J. ("Woody") Fletcher spend most of their time away from the campus. As the College's Director of Development and Stewardship Consultant, respectively, their primary job is to build good will and support for Northwest College by serving its publics as financial counselors and consultants. Churches, pastors, districts, and missions programs of the Northwest region have been greatly helped through the ministry of these men—as the standing ovations they sometimes receive testify.

A 5-foot 8-inch tall Irishman born and reared in Canada, Woody Fletcher brings a varied background to his work. He trained pilots for the RCAF during World War II, then eturned home to earn his diploma at Western Bible Colege in Winnipeg. Subsequently, he served churches in several Canadian provinces and in the States of Massachusetts and Washington as pastor, but also worked as a licensed ife insurance and investment broker, and for sixteen years as an investment counselor. Out of this vast experience, he s now able to counsel pastors and laymen about their axes and personal finances.

Herb Crowder has served Northwest College for more han twenty-six years—as Assistant to the President, Pubic Relations Director, Business Manager, and Director of Development. From those "early days" he recalls his negotations for the present N.C. campus, feverish efforts to aise the faculty payroll in only three days, and the many niracles encountered in purchasing necessary items to quip the newly-acquired campus. He is happy that he can vork on deferred giving instead of crisis money raising.

Herb's training for his present job included work at N.C., the University of Omaha, and a diploma from Laballe Extension University. His experience includes ten ears as salesman, sales manager, and manager in business, plus eighteen years of pastoring Washington hurches. He entered service with Northwest College with sense of divine mission which goes back to his childhood, when his mother gave him to God in prayer. His present appiness in the work derives from knowing he does God's york.

Woody and Herb have some things in common—such as neir mutual love of golfing and their weariness with notels and restaurants. But more importantly they agree hat Christians are stewards of all God has given them and hould see that God gets the benefit of all their goods. ## EVANGELIST CALLS FOR REVIVAL, MISSIONS

Like the voice of the Hebrew prophets echoing down the corridors of time . . . came the voice of Evangelist Linfield Crowder, N.C. alumnus, and three-time speaker at Northwest College's winter quarter Missionary Emphasis Week, January 12-16. Seldom has the pulpit of Northwest College reverberated with a more searching message and a more earnest call for surrender to God and to His service at home and abroad.

This week was the College's annual Missionary Emphasis week. It marked the third time that Evangelist Crowder has been the Spiritual Emphasis week speaker at the College—a record held by no other speaker throughout the nearly 30-year history of Spiritual Emphasis weeks at the College.

Evangelist Crowder, himself a graduate of N.C.'s class of 1953, spends considerable time on the mission field in the Pacific under the auspices of the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God.

Not only did Evangelist Crowder address the college community of students, faculty, and administration, but he was the guest speaker for a fellowship gathering of the Seattle Charismatic Pastors on the campus on the final day of the week.

The searching quality and power of his messages brought a response from the spiritually responsive students who filled the chapel consistently throughout the week. The Evangelist's call for commitment and his earnest prayers for revival on the campus of the College continue to burn as a sacred flame in the hearts of his hearers.

#### ICR SUMMER INSTITUTE

Northwest College will host a one-week Summer Institute on Scientific Creationism put on by the Institute of Scientific Creationism June 8-12.

Faculty for the Institute will include three of the top men in the field of Creation research. They include Dr. Henry M. Morris, well-known author, lecturer, Director of the Institute who is also President of Heritage College in San Diego; Dr. Richard B. Bliss, Director of Curriculum for the Institute and Professor of Science education at Christian Heritage College in San Diego; and Professor Harold Slusher, Assistant Professor of Physics and Director of Kidd Memorial Seismic Observatory at the University of Texas, El Paso.

The College's interest in scientific creationism is directly tied to its commitment to Biblical creationism in particular and to Biblical faith in general. The inroads of popular uncritical assumptions about the origins of the earth and of man are seen as concerns of the day especially as they affect the role of the pastor, the youth minister and others who must deal with questions of faith in relation to these questions. The impact of the work of the Institute on educational and political circles in the U.S. has come in for national attention.

The five-day concentrated institute will be scheduled for full-day sessions and will deal with such topics as "Creation and Evolution;" "The Origin of the Universe;" "The Modern Classroom;" "Thermodynamics, Entropy and Evolution;" "The Origin of the Solar System;" "The Origin of Life;" "The Geological Record;" "The Age of the Earth;" "Critique of Radiometric Dating" and other similar topics. The lectures will be augmented by two film presentations.

Information about the seminar may be secured from the Admissions office at the College.

Also included in the 25-page publication are photos of the majority of the seniors and contact information for the convenience of those desiring to get in touch with them.




