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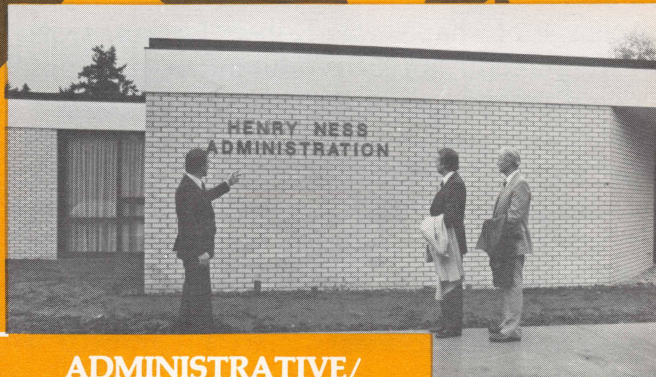

DEDICATION And FRIENDS OF NORTHWEST BANQUET A GREAT SUCCESS

It was excitement at every turn! April 10 hundreds gathered for the dedication of the new enlarged administration/faculty/classroom complex and stayed for the Friends of Northwest Banquet.

Dedication

Honored in the dedication were Henry Ness, first president; C.V. Bronson, long time Dean; Maxine Williams, now in her 31st year of teaching at NC; Dr. Donald Fee, long time teacher; and Wonda Dickey, benefactor whose gift in her will in the amount of \$640,000 in 1959 enabled much of the early development on the 55 acre campus. Four halls and a beautiful plaza now comprise the entire complex: Bronson, Ness, Williams and Fee Halls and Dickey Plaza.

Pre-dedication conducted tours brought "ohs" and "ahs!" What a beautiful and functional facility it is! The complex now encompasses a total of 30,600 feet of new and refurbished space.

The question asked in the design stage was, "How should the 'traffic' flow?" The answer to that question controlled all planning. When friends toured the facility, they saw the answer to that question in graphic evidence.

The dedication service brought together many representatives of influence from the past as well as the present.

On hand were: Mrs. Henry Ness and Mrs. C.E. Butterfield, whose husbands were again honored; many members of the Ness family; Dr. and Mrs. Donald Fee and Miss Williams whose long time service to NC was also honored. Offering the tribute to all those honored was Dr. Amos Millard, Dean of Admissions, Registrar and thirty-two year faculty member. Responding in behalf of those honored was Dr. Donald Fee. Describing the facilities, the need for them and how they would serve the College in the decades ahead should Jesus tarry, was H.W. Crowder, Development Director, himself in his 27th year of service to Northwest College.

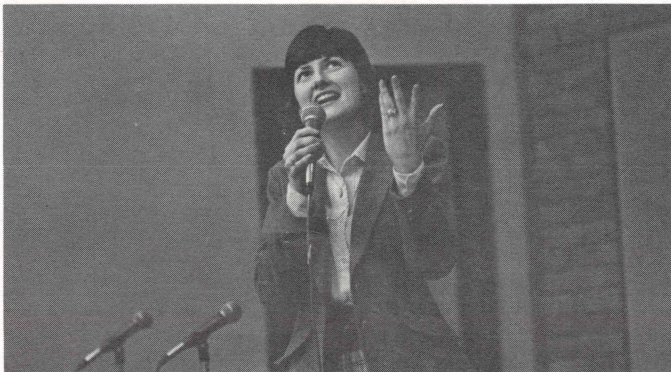
The Act of Dedication was written by Dr. Frank Rice, Academic Dean for the last fourteen years.

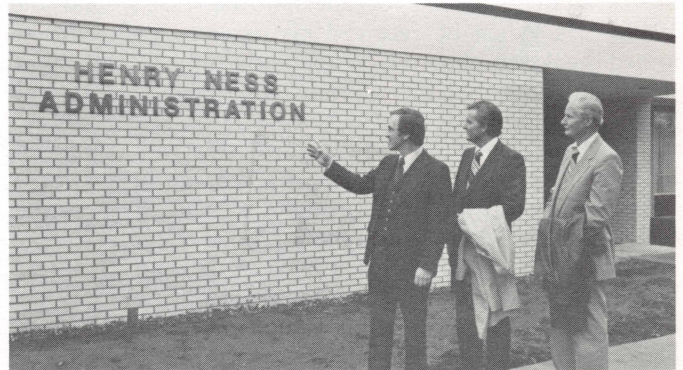
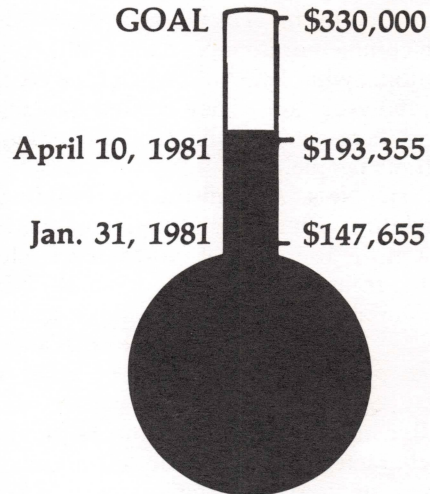
At the close of the dedication, all who were present went directly to the Friends of Northwest College Banquet. It was a "fun" time and there was a serious purpose. City officials, neighbors of the College and long time friends of NC all shared in the excitement. Singing as special guest was NC's "Kate Smith of the gospel" Judy Owings of Missoula, Montana.

Challenging the audience of almost 300 was Dr. Ward Tanneberg, pastor of Valley Christian Center, Dublin, California, a 1958 graduate of NC and former Public Relations Director. Everyone felt he was so to-the-point in speaking of the "obvious statement" NC comprises regarding values and purposes.

And then it came time for Forward Thrust commitments. A total of \$45,700 in cash and \$1,000 three-year share pledges was added to the previous total of \$147,655. The three-year drive, just one year old, stands at \$193,355 on its way to a goal of \$333,000.

Yes, there was excitement in the air when the evening finished! There was praise to God! There was a sense God is bringing the work along! NC does have friends and they do share in the work.

He started it! He will finish it! There is reason to have faith!

TRIBUTE BY DR. AMOS MILLARD

In the Word of God men are honored on the basis of their faith. Faith is simply the response of men and women to the call and will of God which he has placed upon their lives. "By faith, Abraham when he was called . . . obeyed." Hebrews 11:8

The on-going work of Northwest College is the product of this kind of faith that motivated and moved the men and women who have been a part of its history.

Today we pause to honor five persons who were moved by faith to obey God in this, His work, at Northwest College. When we commemorate their names into these halls we are simply doing what Israel did when they crossed the river Jordan 3,400 years ago. They erected a memorial of stones to remind themselves of what God did in their midst in and through his people.

The Henry H. Ness Administration Building commemorates the faith, vision, and initiative of the late Dr. Henry H. Ness in the founding of Northwest College. He was riding on the train from Seattle to Bismark, ND when God spoke to him about founding of a Bible school. Like Abraham, he . . . "obeyed." His implicit faith and his explicit obedience produced the genesis of what we see around us today.

Bronson Hall, commemorates the name, faith, and sterling Christian character of a man who left an eternal imprint on the lives, ministry, and the influence of hundreds of his students in the decades of the 1930's, and the 1940's . . . When he received his personal pentecost he joined the Assemblies of God and imparted a pioneer spirit to his students that has literally sent them out into the highways and byways.

The Wanda Dickey Plaza, in which we stand, commemorates the faith and obedience of a woman upon whose heart God laid to provide through her estate by financial means of doing the initial building on this campus. Like Sarah, her legacy of faith involved an investment in the hundreds of students who have trained for the work of the Lord in the halls and on this campus. "By faith" Wanda Dickey . . . when she was called to give . . . "obeyed."

The Donald Fee Lecture Hall commemorates the faith, example, and character of a gentleman who has influenced hundreds of students who have sat in his classroom in the decades of the 1950's, 1960's, and right up to the present period. Dr. Fee has, and continues, to be not only a skilled spiritually minded exegete of the Scriptures, but an exemplar of them through a life and a Christian spirit that has graced this institute as few men have.

Williams Hall commemorates the faith, dedication, loyalty, and the finest tradition of classroom excellence. Both her life and ministry have been an exhibition of these qualities dating from the 1950's to the present. Her roots represent one of those "priestly families" that have made the Assemblies of God what it is today. Her pioneer spirit has given her a versatility that few people have exhibited. Her understanding of students and her ability to reach them at their level and lift them up marks her as a distinguished teacher endowed with the spirit of the great teacher, the Lord Jesus Christ.

For these great exemplars of the faith, we thank God, and we pay tribute to them for their work and for those qualities of character that gave special meaning to the material objects that bear their names.

RESPONSE BY DR. DONALD FEE

. . . the College has for some time, when dedicating new facilities, inscribed the name of some person closely connected to the school, on that facility. Today, five extensions of this new complex will carry a name also. I consider it to be a great personal honor to be asked to represent these people and response in their behalf . . . three of these persons have gone on to be with the Lord. Each of them played an important role in the establishing of this College, and its continuation. I am certain that if they were here today, they would respond to this moving acknowledgement made to all of us, as Maxine Williams and I do with the deepest appreciation and gratitude. These dear people were our friends, and we cannot forget the many precious moments we had with them in years past.

One seldom feels worthy when such honors have been bestowed for one does not feel all that deserving. In fact, we feel, already honored to have had the privilege of serving in such an institution as ours, . . . for this we thank you. We are rewarded even more when we review the remarkable spiritual successes of those who have graduated from this College and have had established gospel bases all over the world, which are manifold tokens of Divine favor. This is the Lord's doing and it is marvelous in our eyes. To have had a small part in this world harvest is a distinct joy and pleasure.

To those of you who have been responsible for presenting to us this distinctive honor, and paying so generously the loving tribute, we say, thank you. We receive it with grateful but humble hearts.



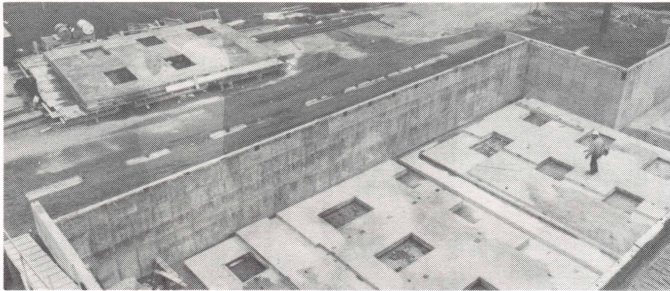

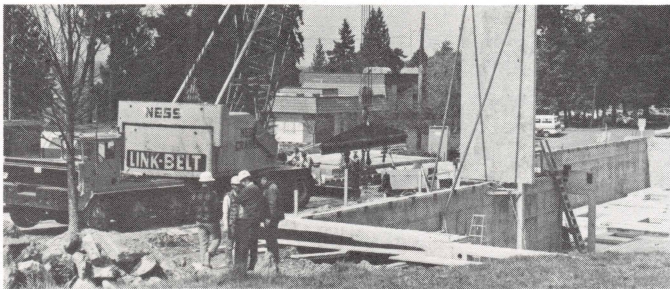

"A BUILDING IN THREE DAYS?"

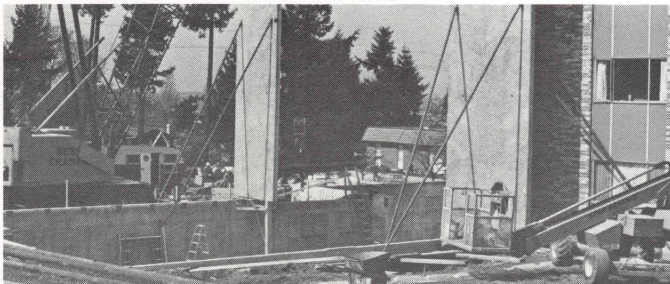

A basement full of walls.



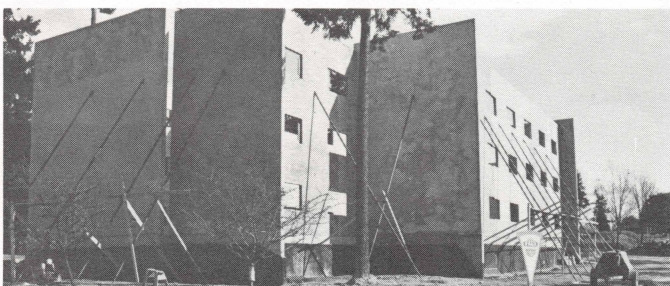

MINISTRY:

AT CROSS ROADS OF HUMAN NEED

The Reverend Dr. Ward M. Tanneberg, pastor of the Valley Christian Center in Dublin, California, was the College's Spiritual Emphasis week speaker April 6-10. A graduate of Northwest College and former member of the College's Administrative staff who described himself as a "sergeant from the front-line trenches" and his community as a "mission field."

During his week of pulpit ministry at the College, Dr. Tanneberg focused attention on the rich treasury of spiritual truths in the Old Testament Historical Books, often illustrating the life of David. From these narratives and passages he pointed out practical lessons for Christian living and ministry in such topics as, "What God Looks for in a Person," and "How to Handle Overwhelming Odds." Commenting on Dr. Tanneberg's ministry to the students and faculty during the week, College President, Dr. D.V. Hurst said, "The whole campus was blessed by Ward Tanneberg's message and ministry. It was great to have him and his wife, Dixie "back home," and to hear how God is blessing the work under their leadership in Dublin. N.C. is proud of alumni like this who go from its halls to have such impact on their world."

Not only did Dr. Tanneberg minister from the pulpit, but he carried out a rigorous schedule of classroom lectures as guest of various professors. The Tannebergs are not strangers to a rigorous speaking schedule as they both speak extensively in Christian marriage conferences, on college campuses and in conferences for pastors and pastor's wives.

The Tannebergs said that in traveling the freeways of their mobile, middle-class community they were impacted with a sense of the **human need** for God and the precepts of His word caused them to spend the first months of their ministry in this city "knocking on the doors" of 2,500 homes.

SUMMER INSTITUTE ON CREATIONISM JUNE 8-12

(Seminar Also Available Evenings)

The Institute of Creation Research will be sending three of their top lecturers to conduct the seminar scheduled for June 8-12. They are Henry M. Morris, Ph.D.; Richard B. Bliss, Ed.D.; and Harold S. Slusher, D.Sc.

These men will cover the areas of creation/evolution models, thermodynamics, geological record, origin and age of the universe and life, dating of artifacts, and how to present these ideas effectively in the classroom.

The influence and activity of the Institute has attracted considerable nation-wide attention recently because of its challenge of "the dogma of the educational and scientific establishments concerning the theory of evolution."

Because many have conflicts during the day the College has received permission to videotape these sessions and show them in the evenings of the same week. These sessions will run from 6:30 to 10:30, Monday through Friday; 9:00 to 5:00 on Saturday. It is planned that one of the men from the Institute will be there to answer questions.

The fee for the Institute will be \$95.00 for an audit or \$135.00 if one is taking the Institute for three college credits.

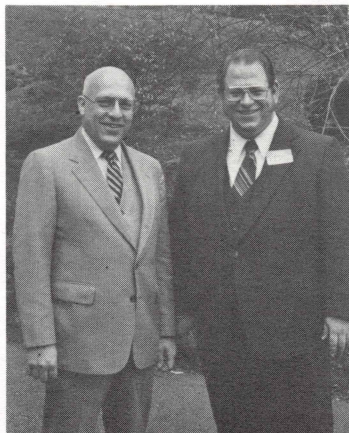

ADMINISTRATIVE FEATURE: Amos Millard



The administrator and faculty member with the longest tenure at Northwest College is Dr. Amos D. Millard, who has taught Biblical studies since 1949 and served as Registrar and Dean of Admissions since 1955. His sense of campus history often serves to guide the rest of the staff. In fact, he was part of NC even before that—as a student, graduating with a diploma in 1948 and a B.A. degree in 1949.

Always the scholar, Dr. Millard maintained a near “straight A” record at NC, and has since earned M.A. and D. Min. degrees from Winona Lake School of Theology and California Graduate School of Theology. His instant recall of detailed facts, whether theological or practical, still amazes his students and colleagues.

Dr. Millard is also a prolific author, frequently contributing to the various publications of the Assemblies of God. In addition to his many articles, he has written the historical and archeological materials for the *Adult Teacher Supplement*, and a textbook guide for the Old Testament historical books for ICI in Brussels, Belgium. And on campus he still produces a constant stream of publicity and in-house materials.

The multiplicity of his interests and accomplishments defies capsulization: Popular Bible and archeology teacher. World traveller as teacher-leader of the College’s annual Flying Seminar to Israel. Prophecy teacher and promoter both on and off campus. Parliamentarian for the district conventions. Idea man for the alumni association. Placement director. Researcher and analyst of college trends. Guardian of standards. Promoter of College spiritual life. Hardworking committee member and chairman of many important campus and district committees. Recipient of many honors. Husband, father, camper, and woodsman. The list has no end. Generations of Northwest College students and the church owe him thanks.

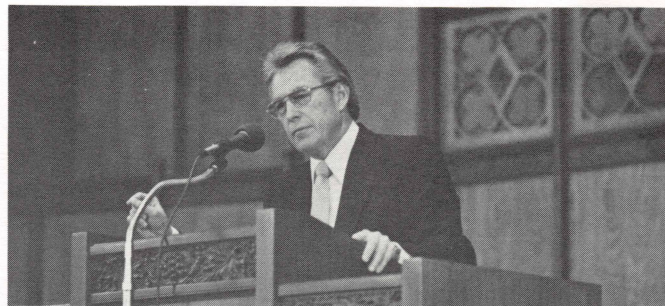
