IT'S TIME TO PRAY

I believe in prayer! I've seen what it can do! I was raised in a home where prayer was spontaneous and Pentecostal. It brought results!

When confronting need or challenge I naturally pray. In emergency the first word I have uttered without exception has always been, "Jesus!" And this without deciding to. It just happens!

In our home, my wife, Aggie, and children, Gigi and Rich — now married — and I have lived that way. "The Lord will help us," has been our constant awareness. Without making a great issue of it, we just lived with this

assurance and freely called for help.

When the big test came, when the doctor told my son and me that Aggie had "cancer . . . a large tumor . . . it was spread throughout the abdomen ... it was wrapped around a portion of the kidneys . . . we couldn't get it all, what were we to do? We walked the streets - fast - and we prayed! And we've all prayed often since then, sometimes in the Spirit without full understanding and sometimes in the Spirit with full understanding. (Understanding does not necessarily mean no Spirit!) And around the world they prayed. We received word they were praying 150,000 strong in Korea, in the Full Gospel Central Church, and in Prayer Mountain. And they were praying in Australia, in the South Pacific, in Hong Kong, in Kenya, in Zaire, and in Bangkok - all places where we had visited and ministered. What assurance this brought! And prayer has been answered! A great victory has come. The reports are **all positive** . . . and, this one year **after** the terminus had been indicated. The doctor said he could find no evidence of tumor where he left so much in surgery. And Aggie is doing absolutely great! Many have heard her tell her story of Faith.

A year ago we faced another test. We needed a new residence hall at Northwest College. We had one-hundred-nineteen "extra" students in the "dorms." This negatively impacted three times that many students (three in a room designed for two). A new, 118 bed hall was on the drawing boards. But money! Where would it be secured?! I sent a letter to all the friends of Northwest College urging them to pray. You did! God answered! The students will move into a new residence hall — now named Crowder Hall in

honor of H.W. Crowder's twenty-seven years of service to Northwest College — when they arrive in mid-September. What a thrill it will be to usher them in!

But now it's time to ask you to pray once again. We need not just a good year at N.C. this year but a **great one!** We need prayer for Revival . . . rich spiritual life . . . College family love . . . serious students responding to God's call to Christian career choices . . . more students . . . increased gifts for the general operations of the College, for the students (scholarship grants), for continued development of the campus . . . strength . . . vision and wisdom for future planning . . . favor with God's people who can remember N.C. in their wills . . . faculty . . . staff . . . a continuing strong working relationship with our church, the Assemblies of God . . . Bible centered living.

Will you pray with us? Will you clip this prayer list, place it in your Bible and put your finger on it each time you see it, lifting these needs to God? Oh . . . what miracle results can be wrought if you will!

In Jesus Name, I ask you right now as you read this to


breathe a prayer for N.C.

"CHANGING OF THE GUARD" IN PR DIRECTORSHIP AT NC

Skip Bennett

The Reverend Robert L. Griffin, Public Relations Director at Northwest College since 1975, will be returning to his "first love" in the ministry - the pastorate - in August. Since graduating from Northwest College in 1956, "Bob" (as he is affectionately known to his colleagues at the college) has served continuously in pastoral ministry in four pastorates, all located on the east side of the Mountains in Washington State and ranging from Winthrop to Mabton, Selah, and Spokane. He will resume his role as "Pastor Griffin" when he takes up duties in his fifth pastorate at the Kings' Circle Assembly of God in Corvallis, Oregon.

In his new pastoral setting, "Pastor Bob's" ministry outreach to College students will have been well oriented by his extensive and effective association with College students over the years he has been at Northwest College. Corvallis, Oregon, is a College town which houses Oregon State University. His new church has developed an active college ministry, and is one of the "growing churches" in the district with a special outreach to youth ... a trait to which the affable, youth- and family-oriented

young pastor is well adapted.

Moving with him to Corvallis will be his wife, Ramona, an educator in her own right, having taught in the Lake Washington School system during their stay in Kirkland, and their daughter Gwen, a senior in high school.

Two members of the Griffin family will remain in Kirkland — their son, Ky, a student at Northwest College, and a daughter "Mona," who is working in the area.

Succeeding Reverend Griffin in his post at the College will be another NC alumnus, the Reverend Sherman "Skip" Bennett. Hailing from Ellensburg, he attended Northwest College from 1962 to 1966 and has served in youth and associate pastorate ministry in four churches in the Northwest District since then. His most recent ministry has been at Spanaway Assembly of God near Tacoma. The Bennett's have two children Tami, age 14,

and Robbie, age 10.

In commenting on the personnel change in the Public Relations office, College President D.V. Hurst said: "We have all deeply appreciated Bob Griffin's work at NC in Student Recruitment and Public and Alumni relations. Bob is a friend to all and an energetic hard worker. During his years with the College, new records for enrollment were set each year. The College Choirs and "P.R." Team ministries achieved a level of excellence and effectiveness that can be characterized as real "professional," and more than that, as ministry of the finest sort. Bob will be missed keenly, but as an alumnus and former Colleague he will continue to support NC with enthusiasm, we know."

Bob shared the following: "My six plus years of association with NC has been a very unique opportunity. Very few people know this kind of honor. To associate with the cream of the crop of our Assembly of God young people; to learn and work with men of the highest spiritual status and of outstanding skill in their respective fields; to know as friends faculty members who know God and young people and are also extremely competent in their academic discipline. As if this wasn't enough, I had the privelege of meeting so many ministers in our region and rejoiced to see how God was blessing in church after church. I have been greatly blessed and my family enriched because of our NC experience."

In commenting on "Skip" Bennett's coming, President Hurst cited the letter of resignation he wrote to the Spanaway Church, and quoted what he called "classic

lines," as follows:

"The opportunity to work at the college will enable me to broaden my ministry in many ways. This will be accomplished through my many administrative duties and through speaking in the churches throughout the Northwest District . . . I know the Lord is leading, and I sense a deep peace and His direction in the midst of the storm of my emotion. The Master Gardener, the Lord Himself, has been cracking away the old pot in which I was planted. He now is transplanting me into a new, larger pot that I might grow. The shock of the transplant affects not only the plant, but those who look on it. In time, the result of the transplant will be new growth. I welcome that new growth in my life." Continued President Hurst, "Skip brings many strengths with him. Those who have heard of his coming say, 'great!'. I know Skip will relate well to the students and will do a fine job!"

SUMMER SCHOOL ENROLLMENT: NEW RECORD

The 1981 summer session, fifth in the College's history, saw a record 119 students enrolled, eclipsing the previous record of 112 enrolled in 1979. Records show that summer school enrollment last year totaled 97.

The special "enrichment" feature during this year's summer session was a one-week Institute of Creation Research Seminar put on by the Institute of Creation Research of San Diego, California. A total of 65 persons were enrolled for the Institute, a number of whom were enrolled in other summer school courses on the campus.

A survey taken among the students enrolled in the summer session reflected enthusiasm for the summer school program, citing smaller enrollments and the nature of the courses as prime reasons for attendance. When the program was inaugurated, several objectives were set forth including the offering of core-course material which would enable upper classmen to accelerate or complete their programs leading to graduation and to offer enrichment courses such as the one-week seminar with ICR. Apparently the students concur with these objectives, as their survey responses indicate, the Registrar's Office reports.

Dates for the College's 1982 Summer session are set for

June 7 — July 2.




