PLEASE PASS THE BREAD-

The theme of the Northwest College faculty retreat this year was drawn from the scene of Jesus' test in the wilderness. The first temptation framed by Satan was: "If thou be the Son of God, command these stones be made bread." (Matthew 4:3) Jesus' response was taken from Deuteronomy 8:3, given to Israel along with the manna, "Man shall not live by bread only, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of the Lord ..." "Not by bread alone ..." was our theme.

These words were among the first that Jesus would have learned in the synagogue at Nazareth. For they were in the Shema', that body of Scripture first taught to a Jewish lad. It was out of these first Biblical learnings as a "pre-schooler" or a "first grader" that Jesus met and defeated the first temptation! Not only did it meet the temptation to use His miracle power to sustain physical life and "save" Himself—a temptation repeated at the cross—but the principle, "not by bread alone," has broad application today. It speaks forcefully to those who would do the Work of God!

It strikes at the heart of Secular Humanism and its wicked pervasive inroads into much of the educational world. This modern, sophisticated, educated restatement of Satan's flaw, uttered in the word "Hath God said?" and "ye shall be as God's"—seeks to deny the existence of God and His authority, truth and ethic and to enthrone man and his creativity and products. Interestingly, these same ideas moved men at Babel for they said, "Let **us** build . . . a tower . . . unto heaven," and "let **us** make a **name** . . ."

In the humanistic view, man and what he creates are everything. All there is and can be! His "salvation" is to be found within himself, his reason, his science and his international politics—"one world," if you will.

But Jesus said, "not by bread alone!" Just like the Israelistes in the wilderness needed the miracle of manna, so man today needs the Living Bread. The salvation and sustenance of man required divine miracle bread.

Sharing the miracle bread and meeting the long standing errors of humanism is something of what Northwest College is all about—

Please pass The Bread!

But Jesus' statement says something else to those who would follow Him and do His work today. It cries, "Integrate! Weave biblical truth into all subjects taught, setting them in clear perspective. He is truth! He is the Source . . . Creator . . . Sustainer of all things! He is above all things! Without Him there is no meaning! Without Him there is no understanding of beginning . . . of ending . . . of hope! Without Him all learning is bread without life!"

Because Jesus said all men needed the Living Bread and affirmed Himself to be that Bread, the challenge to make the Christian college **truly Christian** by serving **The Bread** in every class is so insistent.

It's not enough to teach a subject as it is taught in a secular institution and "tack" a bit of Bible on at the end. This does not make a Christian college. It's not enough until divine revealed truth is seen as the core of all truth, until all learning points toward Christ, the source.

John Henry Cardinal Neurman said, "If we could see with the eyes of God, we would perceive the oneness of truth . . ." It's toward this sublime goal that a Christian college should reach with all its might!

Please pass The Bread!

But Jesus' use of God's Word to Israel in the wilderness as He met Satan's temptation says still another thing to us: "More important than learning is living. More important than physical existence is spiritual life. Nothing is more important for the Christian teacher than to 'feed the lambs . . . feed the sheep!' To Peter He said, "If you love me, feed '!'' (John 21)

The spiritual life and growth of the student is the most important thing. And that life and growth comes from feeding on **The Bread**.

Years ago I heard an evangelist of our fellowship describe a communion service in South America with believers jammed inside and out. The windows were open and the only way they could get the bread and cup to those outside was to pass it from one believer to another and yet to another, on through the windows to those outside until the elements were lost from view.

I never forgot that description! It spoke so eloquently of what the Body of Christ does, in feeding the flock, whether it's to pre-schoolers or to college students. Passing the Bread is what **real** Christian education is all about! Please pass **The Bread**

To the students he is "Dean Tex"—a name he earned honestly through being reared in Texas and reinforced by his Texas drawl and his affinity for Western clothing. He is Waymon P. Rutledge, Dean

Dean Tex's personal history is unique. After finishing high school in Texas, he joined the army signal corps and served overseas in radio. It was the military that brought him west to California, where he was saved and Spiritfilled in then Bethel Temple in Sacramento. He was later ordained to preaching ministry in the same church.


Tex might have been a professional football or baseball player except for God's changing the direction of his life. He had offers to play from both sports. But after his conversion, he never returned to pursue those opportunities. Instead, he entered Glad Tidings Bible Institute to begin preparation for Christian service. He later added to his Bible college diploma a B.A. degree from Willamette and a M.S.Ed. degree in Counseling from Oregon College of Education.

Tex has twenty-seven years of pastoral experience, but at times paralleled a second career in law enforcement—as a deputy sheriff and as counselor, consultant, and project coordinator in the Oregon State Corrections Division. He is no policeman to his students, however, but works to encourage their spiritual growth.

Dean Tex admits to feeling the pressures of decision making in his role as director of student activities, but he balances this against the enjoyment of working with Christian students and observing their committment to Christian service. "I've never been in such a rewarding experience," he says with a smile. (The non-academic aspects of student life fall within the purview of the Dean of Students.)

Tex and Winni (his wife) now live alone in a home near the campus. Both are within easy walking distance of their jobs, since Winni works for the Northwest District office of the Assemblies of God, adjoining the NC campus. Their three children are now grown and married, and the Rutledges speak of them with pride. But they are proud of their "other children", too—the students at NC!


CONVOCATION CHAPEL OPENS SCHOOL YEAR

During the District Council held in Spokane, Cal Carpenter and Tom Pendleton were elected to prominent positions as departmental leaders. Cal was elected as Northwest District Youth Director and Tom as Northwest Christian Education Director. We at N.C. offer our congratulations.

Tom is a 1973 graduate of Northwest, receiving a B.A. degree in Pastoral Studies. He and his wife, Retha, are the proud parents of two boys, Gavin and Brandt. He accepted this new position having served as Minister of Outreach at Bellevue Neighborhood Church and Minister of Christian Education at First Assembly of God-Life Center in Tacoma. Tom shares these reflections on his days at N.C.:

"Being a new Christian when I entered N.C., I majored in Biblical Literature. I was not yet sure of the specific direction of ministry God was leading me toward. I felt what I needed the most for a full-time ministry was a solid Biblical base to develop a scriptural philosophy of ministry. N.C. provided this, plus resources and personalities, from which I did and still do draw from, to assist the ministry God has placed me in." Tom's capable leadership in the Christian Education office was evidenced by the successful Christian Education Convention which just concluded in Olympia.

Cal Carpenter traveled with his wife Tina in the "Northwesterners" and later graduated in 1976 with a B.A. degree in Biblical Literature. Having served as associate pastor in Yakima's Stone Church for three years, he and his family then ministered on the evangelistic field for two-and-a-half years before assuming the position as Youth Director in the district. Cal and Tina are the proud parents of two lovely girls, Kelly and Chrissy. Cal shared that:

"N.C. gave me a strong Bible foundation on which to base my ministry, and the relationships that were formed at Northwest helped to broaden that ministry." 



FLYING SEMINAR - '82

PETRA—the name means "Rock", and for good reasons as this photo shows. This famed ancient city is nestled in the rugged mountains of Mt. Seir between the Dead Sea and the Fulf of Aqaba, a wing of the Red Sea. The Prophet Obadiah describes the ancient Edomites as taking pride in the "clefts of the rocks", as an eagle nesting "among the stars", where they took re-

eagle nesting "among the stars", where they took refuge from the potential enemies (Obad. 1:2-4). The vast construction chiseled out of the perpendicular walls of this canyon "hideout" was largely done by the Nabateans who followed the ancient Edomites here. Some students of Biblical prophecy believe that this rock-walled city is reserved as a sanctuary for the Jewish people in the period known in the Bible as the "Great Tribulation". It is on the itinerary of places to be visited by the College's Flying Seminar to Israel, Jordan, Egypt, and Rome next March 12-25, 1982.
