## WHY ACCREDITED CHRISTIAN SCHOOLS?

Accreditation is a big word. Its meanings and values in the American system of education are sometimes misunderstood. Accreditation is sometimes down played as not important.

Northwest College is accredited by both the American Association of Bible Colleges and the Northwest Association of schools and Colleges. The latter is the regional association which has in its purview all state universities, colleges, and community colleges, in the Northwest.

For Northwest College to have such dual accreditation is not unique, but few Bible Colleges can claim this. It is a mark of excellence and speaks of the quality education available in the Northwest.

Realizing what accreditation is all about needs to be communicated to our church and those interested in Northwest College, we asked Dr. Frank Rice, our Academic Dean, to explain it for our friends and supporters. Dr. Rice is on the Accreditation Commission of the AABC and has been trained as an accreditor by the Northwest Association. Here is his statement:



#### DR. FRANK RICE

"What is this thing called 'accreditation' and why should it be applied to a Christian school or college—such as Northwest College? Is it perhaps unspiritual or even anti-spiritual? Such questions trouble many sincere Christians who want the right kind of education for their children.

To **accredit** means to certify as meeting official requirements. What those official requirements are, of course, depends upon who does the accrediting. In the case of school and colleges, the accrediting agencies are made up of the member schools themselves, and the official requirements are those they have found to be minimal necessities if the school is to provide a sound education for its students. Accreditation exists to protect the 'consumer', the student not the school.

How does it do that? Here is how it works: The school voluntarily seeks accreditation by an appropriate agency. The agency does a preliminary investigation to determine the propriety of proceeding. A team of educators from other schools whose quality have already been certified visits the applicant school and examines it in detail to determine what the school is designed to accomplish and whether it has the appropriate resources to accomplish it. If it lacks the minimal requirements, the school must wait a few years while it works to strengthen the area of weakness; then it is re-examined. It is normal for an institution to be placed in some tentative category for a time before it attains full accreditation.

What kinds of things do the accreditors look for? The essentials to do the job right—such things as teachers trained in their teaching fields (instead of just someone who was available), an adequate library collection to insure that the student can receive instruction and reside safely and in health, a sufficient support base to insure that the school won't have to close down suddenly and leave the student without an alma mater to certify his education. These and other marks of quality.

Once the school is accredited, many things are easier for the student and the institution. The school is no longer an 'unknown quantity' to other schools and to the public. A student's college work can be transferred to another campus more easily, since that campus knows his work was done at a quality level. (This is not to say that **all** work will automatically transfer, for that would depend upon its appropriateness to the program into which the student is transfer-ing.) Certain financial aids become available to the students or the college, for the governmental agencies or businesses providing the aids want to insure that they are being used to produce quality education. Yet the process does not end; the school continues to be visited and evaluated periodically to insure that it continues to improve in quality.

Spiritual? Well, Paul does encourage Christians to 'approve the things which are excellent', and that is what the process seeks to do. Northwest College is accredited by two recognized agencies, the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges and the American Association of Bible Colleges. The first certifies the quality of all types of educational institutions in its region and is therefore neutral with regard to the spiritual qualities of the college. The second consists of member colleges whose spiritual goals are similar to those of Northwest College, so their concerns for quality would include those. Having both, NC is in an enviable position; it has been certified to be doing a quality job of educating its students even by schoolmen lacking Christian orientation.

To attain the quality needed for accreditation is not easy. It takes time, and it is expensive. But the fine Christian students in this Northwest region are worth it! Thoughtful Christians will want to encourage and maintain it."

## STAFF FEATURE: Dale Sorenson

Dale Sorenson accepted the staff position of accountant at Northwest College in May 1981, and comes with credentials that qualify him for this responsible position.

He ,graduated from Washington State University at Pullman, with a BA in Business Administration and an Accounting Option. He subsequently was employed by a CPA firm in Oregon before coming to Northwest College.

Being "a PK", the son of Norman Sorenson currently of Colville, Washington, he has lived and received his schooling in several towns and areas of the country. Born in Corington, Louisiana, "the strawberry capital", he attended grade school in New Orleans. He attended Junior High in Ellensburg and graduated from high school at Ellensburg in 1975 though his residence at that time was Colville.

Open to the will and call of God but not feeling any strong leading to full-time pulpit ministry, he enrolled at Northwest College in the fall of 1975 to take one year of basic and general education since he felt this was needed regardless of what vocation he would choose. He was a member of the Choralons that year and traveled with the choir as they presented their memorable patriotic package in the spring of 1976.

His NC credits were all transferred to a community college where he took accounting for one year. He then transferred to Pullman and received his graduation diploma. Always interested in math, he feels that one of the instructors at the high school indirectly influenced his decision to go into the accounting field because of his teaching techniques and personal attention shown to Dale.

He was married to Judy (who was a member of his fathers congregation in Colville) at the close of his first year at WSU.

Two months after his wedding, Dale was returning home on his bicycle after taking a mid-term exam. The hill, a 90 degree turn, and some gravel caused the bicycle to go out of control. Dale was thrown from the bicycle and upon impact, crushed some vertebrae in his spine. The next conscious moment Dale remembers was in a hospital in Spokane six hours later, paralyzed from the waist down. The doctor indicated that he would be at least three months in the hospital, however, he lost only one semester of school and was out of the hospital in two months and returned to his studies in February.

Dale sees the hand of God in the choosing of a career ... which he chose before the accident and not as a result of it. In his coming to Northwest College a series of circumstances all dovetailed together to make it possible—timing, sale of property, etc. He indicates he was happy in his previous employment but that God has given him a "total transfer of our roots to Kirkland and to Northwest College. It gives me a feeling of fulfillment to be a part of the training of ministers—even though I am not teaching—it is a vital part. Right now I would rather be

here than anywhere else . . . ".

Dale is currently taking the remaining examinations to receive his CPA.

His expertise in the area of accounting together with the increasing responsibilities at Northwest College, offers opportunity for a mutually beneficial relationship for years to come. Everybody appreciates the happy, capable, and willing spirit with which he discharges his responsibilities.

### NC STUDENTS COME FROM 30 STATES

A survey just completed by the office of the Registrar at Northwest College reveals that the College's 761 students enrolled on campus this fall come from 30 states.

Among the sponsoring districts, the College's host State (Washington) leads the list with 423 students (56% of the student body). Following the Washingtonians are 118 Oregonians who are 16% of the enrollment. The other states follow in this order: Alaska, 49; Montana, 37; Idaho, 23; California, 19; and Wyoming, 9.

Among the remaining 23 states, 4 are from Pennsylvania; 3 each from Arizona, Florida, Illinois, New Mexico, and New York; 2 each from Hawaii, Iowa, Louisiana, Massachusettes, Michigan, Nevada, New Jersey, Ohio, Utah, and Wisconsin; and 1 each from Connecticut, Maryland, Minnesota, South Dakota, Tennessee, and Texas.

The Washington State component is fairly consistent with the percentage observed in past years, the office said. While the miscellaneous states group represents only six percent of the total, it does include a fairly wide spectrum of states, it was noted.

### 22 DENOMINATIONS REPRESENTED AT NC

The days of trans-denominational enrollment at Northwest College has been observed for almost two decades. This year a study shows that while five out of every six students came to Northwest College from Assemblies of God churches, the remaining 17% came from a variety of 21 denominations and church bodies ranging from Advent Christian to Weslyan.

Among the group from non-Assemblies of God (the sponsoring denomination) the majority prefer to identify themselves as "independent", "non-denominational", and "Pentecostal". The next three largest to identify themselves in terms of a specific denomination are the Baptists with 15 students, followed by the Foursquare with 13, and then the Presbyterians with 5. Other denominational backgrounds include Advent Christian, California Evangelistic Association, Calvary Chapel, Catholic, Christian, Christian and Missionary Alliance, Christian Reformed, Covenant, Episcopal, Evangelical Free, Fundamental Churches of America, Lutheran, Methodist, Open Bible, and Weslyan.

## "BWANA TEMBO", MISSIONARY EVANGELIST WINTER SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS SPEAKER



KIRKLAND, WASH.— The Reverend Morris Plotts, veteran overseas evangelist known as "Bwana Tembo" in Africa, will be the Winter Quarter Missionary Emphasis Week speaker at Northwest College January 18-22.

The Assemblies of God minister, whose first pastorate was the Methodist Church in Wilcox, Nebraska, has travelled more than half a century in Gospel work and has covered more than 2,000,000 miles

in his evangelistic journeys which have taken him three times around the world and into 58 nations of the world.

"Bwana Tembo" has shared his experiences on the wilds of Africa over radio and national television and on convention platforms across the nation.

In 1955, Rev. Plotts left his Louisiana pastorate. Since that time he and his wife have devoted themselves entirely to faith missionary labors. These labors involved the participation in the building of 28 churches in the countries of Japan, South America, Iran, and Africa. In recent months, he has dedicated three evangelistic centers . . . one of them in the wilds of Kenya's north country, made famous by the television series ''Born Free''. For the last three years he has participated in the building of the East Africa School of Theology in Nairobi and Kenya, Africa, near famed Lake Victoria, source of the Nile.

As guest speaker for the College's annual Missionary Emphasis Week, he will be speaking twice daily in the college chapel. The College president, D. V. Hurst, states that friends of the college are cordially invited. Services are held at 9:30 a.m. and at 7:00 p.m.

## FRESHMAN CLASS OFFICERS ELECTED




Tracy Frasier, Ricardo Quintana, Elizabeth (Liz) Dean
