IS IT SPIRITUALITY VS. ACADEMICS?

Must it be one or the other?—Spirituality or Academics? I'm convinced the answer is, "No"! The two are not opposed to each other!

During the Winter Spiritual Emphasis Week (Missions was the theme), Bernhard Johnson, missionary evangelist to Brazil, and Gloria Elliott, former Revivaltime soloist, ministered in the Spirit at Northwest College. The students responded with Spirit, heart, and mind. It was one of the best weeks I have seen. Every morning the Chapel was jammed—required attendance. Never have we had a larger evening attendance—voluntary. Off-campus guests came. The Spirit moved. Spiritual fervor and enthusiasm was high. Time sped by during the services. Testimonies of God's working multi-

plied. Voluntary offerings were likewise the largest we have ever had. The College came alive Spiritually!

At the conclusion of the week Bernhard and Gloria were made honorary alumni of Northwest College. The students responded to the announcement with overwhelming approval.

As the week unfolded I found myself reflecting on this question: "Are intellectual strength and academic excellence diametrically opposed to spirituality and abundant Christian life?"

The reason the question came so forcefully was that just the month before our Academic Dean, Dr. Frank Rice, and I appeared before the College Accrediting Commission of the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges as the final step in the reaffirmation of the accreditation process for N.C. We had been through one year of self-study, an intensive three-day, seven-member visitation team evaluation, review of a thirty-six page team report, and then the Commission appearance.

The outcome? Accreditation was reaffirmed! Under normal circumstances the College will not face the process again for ten years! It can be safely said that you can't do better than that!

So the mark of academic excellence has been stamped on N.C. It continues to hold unqualified accreditation with the Northwest Association and also with the American Association of Bible Colleges.

And yet, immediately following this "new level" of indication of high quality education came this mighty move of God. And both Bernhard Johnson and Gloria Elliott said, "The move of God was here when we came. It was evident in the opening song and prayer of the first service."

But still there are those who assume intensive study at a high academic level is opposed to spiritual life. This just can't be true!

God is omniscient—there is nothing He does not know. There is nothing He did not know from the beginning—"In the beginning God . . ." with all knowledge and power was the *Originator* of eternal Spiritual life! God had life "in Himself and (gave) to the Son to have life in Himself. (John 5:26) The Son, the living Word, said, "I am come that they might have life . . . abundantly!" Theologically, therefore, the two just can't be opposed!

Likewise, logically they cannot be opposed. Jesus said, "Ye shall know the Truth, and the Truth shall make you free!" (John 8:32) The Apostle wrote, "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." (Romans 10:17) Truth . . .

the Word . . . these are the basis for the free life in God, the basis for faith. So there is *no basis without knowledge!* "Come now, let us reason together," says God. (Isa. 1:18) And He asks that we *know*, that we *think*, and *think straight!*

As a boy I heard it said, "God does not place a premium on ignorance!" And yet I heard some argue against learning, against education, against academic excellence almost as if they could not preserve and enrich spiritual life in the midst of knowledge. It always puzzled me.

It was not the wise of whom Jesus said, "It's hard for them to enter the kingdom!" It was the rich! True, wisdom in one's own conceit is condemned. But wisdom "from above" is to be sought! A knowledge of Truth is to desired more than gold! The knowledge of The God of Truth of God's Word is the foundation of faith, of Spiritual life, of abundance in Spiritual living. The Spirit is in the Word!

I've always been encouraged by the Apostle Paul, whose knowledge, wisdom and mental skills did not hinder his spirituality. *On the contrary, they became sharp tools in the hands of God as Paul became a choice servant of God.*

These were my musings as the Spiritual Emphasis Week, just past, came and went. As I watched God working intensively in young hearts, even as they were surrounded by high academic quality, something was then reaffirmed for me.

Spiritual life and academic excellence are not mutually destructive or mutually exclusive. They can complement each other and build together! And as the reaffirmation gathered in my heart through the Week, in a burst of inspiration I said so to the students assembled!


I'm glad! At Northwest College I've seen a high ideal realized—an ideal which I've long held. Abundant Spiritual Life and high academic quality can live side by side and work together!

MILLARD COMPLETES THIRTY YEARS



Three decades of faithful service to N.C. by Dr. A.D. Millard were recently given recognition by the Board of Directors and faculty of Northwest College. Dr. Millard began service as a teacher at N.C. in 1949, immediately following his own graduation with a Bachelor of Arts degree from the College. His subsequent Master's and Doctoral degrees were earned while working at N.C. Since 1955 he has been a member of the College's administrative staff, as Registrar and Dean of Admissions.

As a memorial, a plaque was presented to Dr. Millard. Commendation was given for his many talents and his willingness to use them wherever he sees a possibility of enhancing Northwest College and the cause of Christ. He was cited as a prolific writer, a teacher with depth of content, placement director, College historian and idea resource man, researcher, parliamentarian, and guardian of standards, and much more. Beloved and honored by hundreds, Dr. Millard has been a source of great strength to N.C. for thirty years, and the record is still incomplete.

Music is both the vocational and recreational interest of Dr. William R. Swaffield, affectionately called "Doc" by his choir members, and "Bob" by his colleagues on the N.C. faculty. He first joined the faculty as a part-time teacher in 1969 while completing a doctorate at the University of Washington. Upon graduation he accepted a full-time contract at N.C., and has been the College's Music Coordinator since 1975.

Bob is a transplanted Canadian, having received U.S. citizenship since joining the College. Pentecostal tradition is part of his heritage; he was Spirit-filled in a pentecostal camp while a teenager, after having accepted Christ at age five. His choirs know he still likes to slip in a "camp meeting style" song occasionally.

Drawing upon long experience as a high school music teacher and director of church choirs, Bob sometimes astounds his students with his knowledge of music. Although he is a perfectionist in rehearsals ("God deserves our best"), mistakes in performance seldom draw his criticism. Practice, pray for God's anointing—the rest is up to God. No wonder his students work hard for him and still love "Doc" Swaffield!

**Dr. David Lewis
Summer School
To Feature
Prophecy Seminar**

Northwest College will offer a one week seminar (June 4-8) in Biblical Prophecy with guest lecturer, Dr. David A. Lewis. The thrust of the seminar will be a comprehensive study of the major prophetic themes of the Bible.

It is planned to schedule the five-day series during the afternoon periods (1:15-4:30) the first week of the Summer session, so that pastors, teachers, students, and interested laymen can avail themselves of the studies.

Dr. David Lewis is considered by many to be one of the best informed scholars and spokesmen in the field of Biblical prophecy in the Evangelical Church World. He has made fifteen trips to the Middle East and has conferred with many leading Israeli leaders, including Prime Minister Menechem Begin, Mr. Abba Eban, and various members of the Israeli Parliament.

He is the author of numerous articles on prophecy in a number of periodicals and journals, and has just written a soon-to-be published book entitled, *The Daniel Factor: A Study in Applied Eschatology*. He is editor of *Restoration* magazine, a quarterly journal devoted to developments in the Charismatic Movement and is co-publisher of *Dispatch From Jerusalem*, in cooperation with Dr. G. Douglas Young of the American Institute of Holy Land Studies in Jerusalem.

An ordained Assemblies of God minister, Dr. Lewis has also been active in the field of church Christian relations with the State of Israel. He was one of the incorporators and chairmen of the National Christian Leadership Conference for Israel and was founder of Christians United for Israel. He was honored by conferral of the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity by the late Archbishop Antonia Dranello at the College and Seminary of St. Paul in Rome, Italy.

Working with Dr. Lewis in the seminar at the College will be Dr. Amos D. Millard, Dean of Admissions and instructor of Biblical studies at the College. 

1979 Senior Placement Profiles Published



The College's Placement Profiles Bulletin on over eighty seniors graduating in May, 1979, has been published. Holding a copy are Northwest District Superintendent, Reverend Frank McAllister, and Dr. Amos D. Millard, College Dean of Admissions. The Profile gives a "run down" of information on each candidate for graduation including programs of training being completed, Internship experience, vocational skills, musical skills, leadership roles, and personal data. Also included in the publication are photos of most of the seniors.

Pastors and church leaders are invited to request a copy of the new Profiles Bulletin. It is one of several measures taken by the College to assist its graduates in finding places of ministry upon graduation from the College. It is also intended as an assist to our churches seeking qualified and trained personnel for an increasing variety of ministries being pursued in the churches today.

Serving on the faculty placement committee at the College are Dr. Frank B. Rice, Jr., Academic Dean; Reverend Robert Griffin, Public Relations Director; Dr. Robert Parlotz, Professor of Counseling Ministries; Reverend Waymon T. Rutledge, Dean of Students; and Dr. Amos D. Millard, Chairman and Coordinator of the Placement Service.

New Enrollment Record

A new Winter quarter enrollment record of 725 students at Northwest College has been reached. This marks the eighteenth consecutive quarter that the College has experienced a quarterly enrollment record of a given quarter of the academic year.

The count fell short by only three students of being another all-time record for any quarter, the Registrar's office reported. Enrollment records also show that the Winter quarter count compares with 707 one year ago, which up to that point, was an all-time record.

Men account of nearly 57% of the enrollment which is up slightly from the percentage of men enrollment during the Autumn quarter.

Preparations are currently being made for the Spring quarter which will commence on March 21 for new students. The College has also announced dates for the summer session which will follow from June 4-29.

 1. Submit Financial Aid Form to College Scholarship Service (CSS).
 - a. CSS generates a "needs analysis" which is sent to N.C.
 - b. Apply for BEOG through the Financial Aid Form.
 - c. CSS will forward the information to Basic Grant.
 2. BEOG eligibility statement is sent directly to the student.
 - a. It is called a Student Eligibility Report (SET).
 - b. This must be forwarded to the financial aids office as soon as the student receives it.
 3. Submit Application for Financial Aid to Northwest College.
- C. Financial Aid Award
 1. A calculation of award is made after needs analysis, SER, and Application for Financial Aid are received in the financial aids office.
 2. The Award packet is sent to the student.
 - a. It includes the Notification of Financial Assistance.
 - b. The student's acceptance must be returned within one week.
- D. Apply before June 1 for maximum financial aid consideration.



"Masada Shall Never Fall Again"

This is part of the oath that Israeli soldiers take when they are inducted into the Israeli armed forces. This photo shows a modern cable car as it approaches the top of this famous fortress rock located near the Dead Sea. Its fame in history came when after three years of Roman seige, its occupants—960 Israeli men, women, and children—put the sword to their own throats rather than surrender to the Romans and endure the torture and the slavery that awaited them. On the morning following that fateful day of the 15th of April, 73 AD, the Roman conquerors broke into the fortress and were greeted by an oblique and awesome silence.

This great monument will be one of the historical landmarks in Israel that the College's 1979 Flying Seminars will visit. For further information, write or call the College.




