

'We believe missionaries for the future are attending our Assemblies of God colleges now and thus your efforts in the training of lives for future ministry will contribute at some future point to this vast literature outreach."

I believe that! In fact, that's why I'm involved in

Northwest College today!

I can look back and recall facing men and women in my classes in days gone by who are now District Superintendents (like Richard Dartch of Illinois, and S. H. Peterson of South Dakota), District Secretaries (like Omar Kallevig of Wisconsin), Evangelists (like Joe Johnson, who we have had at NC as a Spiritual Emphasis week speaker and who is coming again next year, and Evangelist-Writer Doug Weed), Missionaries (like Pat D'anadio in Alaska and Monroe and Betty Grams of Pace), and pastors and youth workers by the scores.

Yes, they have been there in training in my classes and are now out there serving and they are here in training

now, getting ready for the days just ahead.

I wonder how many of our over 1,200 missionaries scattered around the world trained in Assemblies of God colleges. Most of them I'm sure!

We just closed a fine missions emphasis week with Bwana Tembo, missionary Morris Plotts, who has watched three quarters of a century go by and who spent over the last third of his life in missions.

What a remarkable man! What an impression he made on the students. A humble . . . deeply spiritual . . . committed . . . selfless . . . and driven man! Driven by Divine purpose! "A spiritual missionary statesman," said Owen Hodges, our business manager.

He spoke not in black and white, but technicolor; not in two dimensions - length and breadth - but three length, breadth and depth - and a fourth - Spirit! How

he made his message live!

All students will remember I.R.C. pertaining to following God; Intimation . . . Revelation . . . Confirmation.

It will be a week long remembered, and eternity will bear results.

Enrollment for the winter quarter is better. We registered exactly the same as fall quarter, at 761. This is better than projections would have suggested so we're thankful! And encouraged!

And especially so because the enrollment of men is strong, almost equal to last year — the all time high!

But Operation HELP must move forward to a successful conclusion if we are to go through the year in the black!

The goal is \$150,000 by June 30, 1982. We stand at approximately half way in cash and pledges.

We need:

Five churches or individuals who will give \$5,000 each.

Ten churches or individuals who will give \$2,000 each.

One hundred five churches or indivudals who will give \$1,000 each.

We must subsidize each student an additional \$200 this school year. It can be said that we have done the equivalent of \$100 for each one so far. Thank God!

"Among God's people, there is always the danger of the pendulum swinging too far. On the left ditch, you have formalism and on the right ditch, fanaticism. Stay in the middle of the road."

"ERA, said one Arkansas hillbilly, stands for Eve Ruined Adam."

"He that believeth will not make haste! God has lived forever and will live forever. He is not in a hurry."

"Missions begins at your fingertips."

"Speaking of Jesus taking His disciples apart after their first missionary journey (Mark 6) He said, "Come apart... or fall apart!"

"I've not finished paying on the debt I owe, a debt that started 59 years ago, when as a 17 year old teenager in Nebraska I heard about Jesus and accepted Him. That's why I'm a missionary to Africa; I'm paying on the debt."

The above scene shows veteran Assemblies of God missionary, the Reverend Maurice Plotts in interview with NC Dean of Admission, Amos D. Millard, during the College's winter quarter Missionary Emphasis week on campus. He reports that it is "harvestime" in Kenya, East Africa, and cautions that the church must not let Africa slip through its fingers as happened with China and then with Japan, earlier in this century.

The successful missionary approach in Africa today is premised on a spirit of "brotherhood" between missionaries and nationals rather than the "old paternalism," of earlier years, he said. Rev. Plotts stated that one of the promising new enterprises in East Africa is the newly-founded East Africa School of

Theology for the training of national leaders and pastors.

WINTER ENROLLMENT: 761

KIRKLAND, WASH. — A resurgent trend was observed in winter quarter enrollment figures just released by the Registrar's office at Northwest College. The winter quarter enrollment total of 761 students is the exact same number equaling the college's fall quarter enrollment of 761 students and is within 5% of last year's enrollment figure. It represents the third highest winter enrollment in the school's history.

Other figures coming out of the winter quarter enrollment shows that almost 90% of the students are full-time and that the full-time equivalency on total enrollment is 95% of the total enrollment. Full-time equivalency represents the number of full-time students plus full-time equivalency on the credit hours carried by part-time students.

The survey also shows that Bible College students make up almost two-thirds of the enrollment on campus. Freshman and Sophomores make up about two-thirds of the total enrollment. However, out of the graduations from the Junior College, more than one-half return and continue their studies in the Bible College division, it was noted.

A strong 56% of the enrollment favors men students, enrollment figures reveal — probably due to the Bible College focus of the college. However, it is noted that an increasing number of placement opportunities are development for women graduates, particularly in the fields of Early Childhood education and business skills.





"I have called . . . and filled him with the Spirit of God, in wisdom, in understanding, and in knowledge, and in all manner of workmenship, to devise cunning works, to work in gold and in silver and in brass and in cutting of stone to set them and carving of timber — to work all manner of workmenship." Exodus 31:2-5

Being the Business Manager, I am proud of and thankful for the campus maintenance staff. Good men . . . gifted men . . . dedicated men . . . spiritual men — now giving of themselves every day to make the work at NC

Orville "Matt" Mathison (his wife Virginia serves as Resident Dean in the girls' residence hall) has a background of wide experience prior to joining the NC staff three years ago. An ordained minister, "Matt" has ministered in Alaska and Hawaii, as well as in the states, with a wide range of experience in building, electrical, plumbing and general carpentry. He serves as Director of Plant Maintenance.

Bill Flisram — Plant Technician — serves also in the area of maintenance. He came to NC approximately seventeen years ago after retiring from the Navy shipyards in Banger, Washington, as a pipe fitter. For many years, he was "Mr. Maintenance" and served the entire campus along in all areas of maintenance. His wife, Mary, was Resident Dean in the girls' residence hall until retiring three years ago. Bill, in his earlier days, was active in his church, in Sunday School, choir, etc. His retirement years have been busy — eight to twelve hours a day, six days a week — yet he is happy serving God at NC! His knowledge of the plant makes his presence and experience invaluable.

Murray Kemper (his wife Shirley cooks in the Cafeteria) is Plant Engineer. The Kempers came from Utah where they pioneered and ministered for fifteen years, establishing a congregation and building a church in the Mormon stronghold of Santa Quin, Utah. He supported himself as an employee of the Public Utilities Company and has been using this experience to serve Northwest College for the past two years.

Supervisor of Grounds — Dan Paulsson (wife Alta) was raised in Eastern Washington and exposed to the rigors of ranching. Here is a man with a gentle spirit but a very energetic body. He works to care for the grounds (land-

scaping, mowing, pruning, watering, etc.) as well as the roads and parking areas. This, together with the maintenance of vehicles — six traveling vans, three maintenance vans, five grounds pickups, tractors, mowers, etc. — gives opportunity for lots of practical ministry.

Jim Wilson — Supervisor of Custodial Services (his wife, Faye, is Resident Counselor in the girls' residence hall) also served as a minister in Montana where he pastored in two churches over nineteen years. Jim has a variety of talents and abilities. The coordination and assignment of the custodial duties and monitoring the student personnel is a sizable challenge. Seventeen buildings and twenty-six floors require his attention.

The entire custodial crew is student personnel with one exception, Leonard Haarstad (his wife, Clara, was a cook's helper in the Cafeteria). A retired laborer, Leonard works part-time to assist in the custodial services. He is a happy, willing-spirited man who enjoys and who believes "an hour's pay deserves an hour's work" — and practices it! He makes the load lighter at NC with his dependable, willing, happy manner in the area of custodial services.

Earl Cowley — Campus Carpentyer (wife, Mary, is a secretary at the District Office) came to NC from Euphrata, Washington, where they pastored for sixteen years. Being a craftsman par excellence, his assignments include: construction of cabinetry, tables and new facilities.

These men labor with a sense of mission and dedication that goes far beyond the call of duty. They have a job \dots a big one \dots but more than a job — a ministry. They serve God at Northwest College with their talents so that others can train for a ministry.

"Helping To Build Ministries"

THEE DISSERTATION ACCEPTED FOR PUBLICATION

The value of Dr. Francis Thee's doctoral dissertation to the academic community recently received further certification, when it was accepted for publication by J.C.B. Mo (Paul Siebeck) — a German publishing house dating back to 1802. Publication is to be from typescript as part of a hermeneutical-theological series which has reference use in university departments of religion or ancient history. Date of publication is expected to be sometime this year.

Dr. Thee has been a member of NC's Bible college faculty since 1963. The dissertation, entitled **Julius Africanus** and the Early Christian View of Magic, was written as part of the requirements for his Ph.D degree awarded by the University of Chicago in 1980. Julius Africanus was one of the early church fathers — the only layman among them — who lived in the second and third centuries.

The value to his own teaching, Dr. Thee believes, was not only in giving him a better understanding of Africanus and his views, but also in providing him an acquaintance with all the early church fathers. It is to be hoped that Thee's students appreciate the scholarship of their teacher. It seems likely that the exercise has given Dr. Thee more sympathy for the students' task in learning as well.
