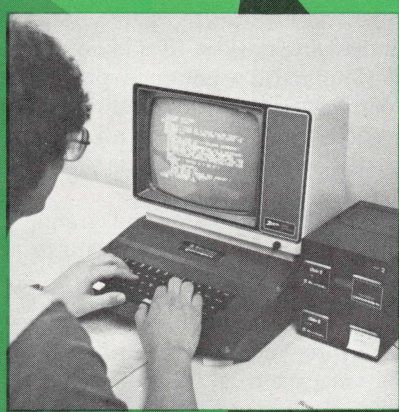

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

**OPERATION  
HELP . . .  
Let's Do It Again!**

Once again this year Northwest College faces the prospect of a deficit in its operational general fund. A drop in enrollment from what was reasonably anticipated and budgeted has resulted in a projected deficit of \$190,000.00.

### Economics and Aids

The reasons for the enrollment drop, seemingly, are the economic crunch and the perceived loss of student aids. (Actually, the various federal financial aids are available, but since they have not increased as much as was projected at one point, it **seems** they are not as large. The **media** adds to this perception. The result is that some potential students assume they cannot "make it" and do not try.)

### The Need

The projected deficit of \$190,000.00 is a result of the reduced revenue from students. This deficit would be larger, however, were not many economies in expenditures to have been effected. Discretionary accounts are few in college financing. Those available at NC have been "frozen" and significant savings have been made, keeping the anticipated deficit down. But, faculty and staff salaries, utility costs, campus debt service costs and a host of other costs go on! **General Fund adjustments at NC are particularly difficult because the College has always operated on a lean budget. Costs to students have purposely been kept as low as possible. NC has long been the lowest in charges to its students of all traditional four year private colleges in the entire Northwest. There just have not been "frills" in the budget which could now be trimmed in hard times.**

The projected deficit of \$190,000.00 equals \$268.00 per current student for the year. The target date for reaching this fund raising goal is June 30, 1983. We can make it.

Last year we needed approximately \$150,000.00 to break even and we made it! The College closed the year in the black. Praise God!

Now it's time to **do it again!** I believe the friends and supporters of NC will!!

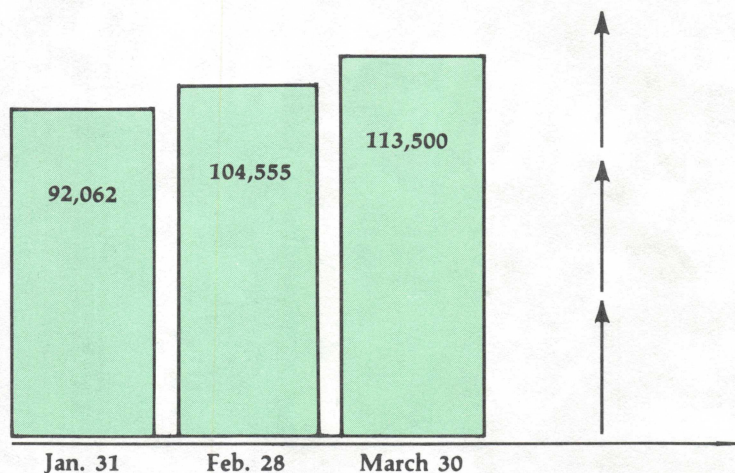
One church has pledged 10% of the need. I personally am giving 1% of the need. Many have given or have pledged \$1,000.00, \$500.00, \$268.00 (one student subsidy) and other amounts. This is what it takes. We have approximately \$110,000.00 pledged and given. There are others who can help . . . and I believe they will.

## FOUNDER'S FUND CONTINUES TO GROW HELPS MEET FUNDING NEED

The Founder's Fund — Northwest College's endowment fund concept — continues to grow. It was launched at the annual Friends of Northwest College Banquet in April of 1977. It had as its goal \$1,000,000 in assets with a target date of three years hence, April 1980. That goal was reached by January of 1980. How exciting it was when we gathered in April of that year to receive the report.

Since then annuities, trusts, capital gifts, wills and selective restricted endowments — such as the Aggie Hurst Scholarship Memorial Fund — have been added and the total fund now stands at \$1,337,345.

The Founder's Fund is a great blessing to Northwest College now! The earnings this year going directly into the general fund will be approximately \$57,500 or about \$18 per student in subsidy. In addition, there will be many special scholarships going to particular students and there will be faculty study and writing grants coming from restricted parts of the fund. Already the fund is doing what it was designed to do:

Keep costs down

Aid students through scholarships and grants.

Assist faculty with better salaries and study grants.

As the fund grows it will do more of this.

One way to help the Founder's Fund is to write Northwest College into your will. Another is through an annuity or a life income trust. In fact, there is a score of ways by which you could help. And you can gain tax benefits as you do.

## Campus Forward Thrust Drive Does A Job

In April 1980, at the Friends of NC Banquet, a drive was launched to raise funds to improve the Campus. Although efforts to raise funds for this purpose have had to be deferred due to general fund needs, the fund has grown. To date, a total of \$119,849 in cash has come in. \$40,391 in pledges remain to be received. (Many friends of the college have deferred payment on their Forward Thrust commitments and have made significant gifts to Operation HELP, both last year and this year.)



The first project in campus improvement that was completed and paid for by Forward Thrust was the redevelopment of the 53rd street, the south border of the campus. Here the curb and sidewalk was totally redone and a new entrance was developed. What an improvement this is!

Also a chain link fence along the north border of the campus was installed, "islands" were placed in the chapel parking lot and much needed landscaping was also completed.

Although the campus development pace has slowed — indeed much of the campus has already been developed as it should be — these improvements have meant much and make an even more beautiful place for students to live and learn while on a campus which many said was already the "most beautiful in our fellowship."

One further thing just finished is the planting of a score of flowering trees in the administration and chapel areas — replacing those removed when the Administrative/Faculty complex was developed. Next Spring this work will show beautifully!

Forward Thrust has already done a job and will do more!

## Living Endowment Fund Redesigned

For over two decades a living endowment fund for Northwest College was promoted. It was a great help to the general operations of the college year after year. And with little promotion, the fund has continued to help. Upwards of \$200,000 have been contributed to the College through the years in this way. Hundreds of friends of NC have participated in it.

The single premise of the fund centered on the fact that the College had no endowment. Friends who could not give large amounts which could be invested and provide regular earnings committed themselves to give \$10.00 or more per year as a "living earning," the amount that could be reasonably expected as annual interest earnings from \$100.00 or more. Those who thus committed themselves have continued to give year after year. The "earnings" from this fund — called living endowment because the commitment was for as long

as the person lived or as long as God enabled the gift — have paid **one half of a faculty salary** year after year. What a blessing!

Now due to inflation it takes \$25.00 to do what \$10.00 did when the living endowment fund was started. With this in mind the Board of Directors has said, "Let's revise the promotion of this fine approach and talk of units of \$25.00 per year. Many cannot give large amounts, but they would like to be a part of NC and do what they can. Let's give them a share in the ministry of Northwest College through opening this fund to them. Let's set a goal of one faculty salary being paid each year from this fund and let's also set a goal of \$10.00 to go directly to student aid from each \$25.00 gift." Now, that is what the new Living Endowment Fund is to be.

Friends who have shared will be encouraged to continue to do so. Those who can will be encouraged to increase their commitment to \$25.00 per year. Hundreds of new Living Endowment Fund Supporters will be sought. All who join the fund will receive a certificate of participation. They will also receive the regular bulletin of the College, The Northwesterner. Above all, they will receive the undying gratitude of NC's faculty and student body and the sense of **personal involvement** in one of God's finest works — the training of young people for ministry at N.C.

## Financial Aid . . .

As the cost of education continues to rise an increasing number of students and their families are seeking assistance in financing college costs. During the 1982-83 academic year, 340 students have received financial aid totalling \$765,000 to help them pay college costs. Grant awards averaged \$1,400 and \$1,100 for student loans taken out for the year.

Northwest College participates in all regular federal aid programs, as well as some participation in the state grant and work study programs. To apply for these aid programs, students must complete the **Financial Aid Form** and submit it to College Scholarship Service. An institutional application for aid is also submitted to the College. We also offer several scholarships and tuition discounts. The Freshman Academic Scholarships are geared towards incoming freshman students with a high school cumulative grade point average of 3.5 or above. Tuition discounts are offered to ministers, missionaries, their dependents, and student spouses. You may apply directly to the College for these types of aid assistance.

## Northwest College Extension Assemblies of God Graduate School Summer Session – June 27 - July 1, 1983

### HOM 531 Biblical Preaching

An emphasis on the nature, method, variety and importance of preaching from the Bible. Emphasis will be placed on the practical implementation of theory by requiring full development of a series of sermons.



INSTRUCTOR: Dr. Dwaine Braddy, B.A., Central Bible College; M.A. Concordia Seminary; D Min., Drew University. Dr. Braddy serves as professor of Pastoral Ministries at Northwest College.

### BIB 536 Theological Research Methods

A course designed to acquaint the graduate student with research methodology and key bibliography in the major areas of theology and Biblical studies. Includes sample readings in key literature and the preparation of an extensive bibliography on a selected topic. Specialists will be utilized as appropriate to deal with the various theological disciplines.

INSTRUCTOR: Professor Larry L. Haight, B.A., Central Bible College; M.A., AGGS; M.A., University of Missouri. Reverend Haight serves as instructor in Biblical Languages and librarian at AGGS.

Note: This course is one of five core requirements.

## PECOTAS HONORED FOR TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF SERVICE

Dr. Daniel B. Pecota, NC's popular and gifted professor of Greek and theology, was cited recently for his completion of twenty-five years of faithful and distinguished service to Northwest College. "Doctor Dan," as his students affectionately call him, joined the NC faculty in 1958, and has since served as teacher, librarian, and Dean of Students. His wife, Esther, also serves the college — as manager of the bookstore.

It was during the Faculty-Board Dinner on February 3 that Dr. Pecota was honored. A surprise program of songs and testimonials by his faculty colleagues was his first indication that he was the guest of honor. Then Rev. R. L. Brandt, chairman of the Board of Directors, cited Dr. Pecota for his long tenure and quality of service before presenting him with a monetary gift in behalf of the college. A plaque commemorating his service was later awarded.

The Pecotas are much a part of NC, as thousands of former students who still think of them as friends will attest. Such faculty members make Northwest proud!

## LIBRARY REACHES 60,000 VOLUMES

The NC library has reached another important level in providing for the needs of the students. On April 1, the book, **The Basic Encyclopedia For Youth Ministry**, was cataloged in the D. V. Hurst Library bringing the total amount of books up to 60,000.

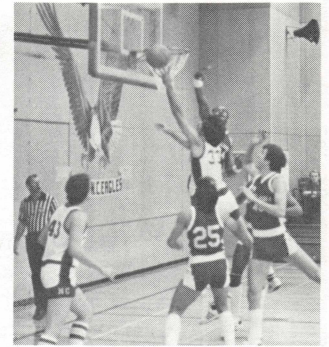
It is most interesting that this book, which signifies this milestone, deals directly with a particular course of studies which makes Northwest College unique. That specific discipline is the youth ministries program. The author, Dennis C. Brown, has included subjects such as: how to start, what to use, where to find, how to cope, who to turn to, and how to keep going. It's a smorgasbord of ideas and inspiration to guide a youth director through all areas of youth ministry.

Through the years of expansion, the library has been housed in various buildings. Not until 1976 when the D. V. Hurst Library was built was there a permanent, singular building to provide for student library needs. This beautiful three-story brick building has ample room for the increasing volumes and private study areas for the students.

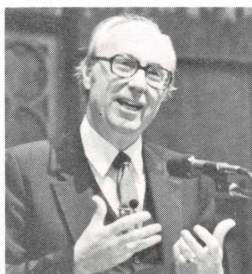

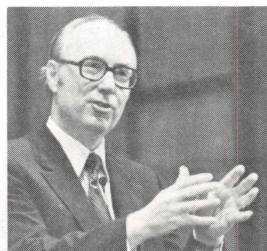
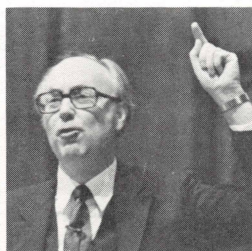

## 1984 FLYING SEMINAR

### DATES ANNOUNCED

Flying seminar dates for next year will be: March 9-20, 1984. The tour will depart from and return to Sea-Tac International Airport in Seattle. The "focus" of the tour will be "Israel in Depth," and will literally cover the ancient biblical boundaries of "Dan to Beersheba."

The instructional program to prepare for the tour will be intensive and will offer the possibility of receiving college credit for the tour for those who desire it.

Viewing the land in its modern Israeli setting while visiting its ancient historical sites will be one of the unique educational objectives of the tour. Israel's regathering in the land of its ancient historical roots is finding new meaning for students of the Bible; and the focus of the College's tour to the Land of Israel will be addressed in terms of what the Bible teaches about the past, present, and future of a land which pre-occupies the world's attention so much in our time.

Preliminary plans call for spending one day in the Negev desert; two days in Galilee and upper Galilee; four days in Jerusalem; and one day on the Mediterranean coast of Israel before returning to Seattle by way of Copenhagen.

## Dr. Millard Teaches at FEAST

In early December the Tauchung Valley in west central Taiwan became the classroom setting for one of NC's faculty members, Dr. Amos D. Millard, who was guest instructor there under the sponsorship of the Far East Advanced School of Theology at its Taiwan extension.

Dr. Millard reports that he did forty hours of lectures in Biblical Archaeology and spoke in chapel eight times during the two-week seminar there. "It was physically taxing, but spiritually rewarding," he added. He characterized his Chinese students as "the finest to be found anywhere" — intellectually sharp and spiritually responsive. Two-thirds of the students were pastors of churches ranging literally "up and down" the island from Taipei to Taiwan and some came from the "mountain churches" to the east.

Heading the Assemblies of God School of Theology is a young, yet veteran, Assemblies of God missionary, the Reverend David A. Plymire.

Notwithstanding a "super-busy schedule in the classroom," Dr. Millard reports that he was able to visit "4-wheel drive" mountain country of the island as well as visit the Assemblies of God Center in Taipei, where veteran NW District missionary, Mildred Tangen is "doing the work of three persons." "I have always believed in missions but this teaching mission in Taiwan has left such an imprint on my life that I will never be the same," he summarized.

Heading the Far East Advanced School of Theology operations is NC grad, the Reverend Everett McKinney, president of the School which is headquartered in Manila with extension centers throughout the Far East.

## Forty-Seventh Baccalaureate and Commencement Speakers Announced

The Reverend Darrell Redfearn, Alaska District Superintendent, has been selected to speak at the 1983 Baccalaureate. Rev. Redfearn has served the Alaska District as superintendent since 1980 and previously pastored three churches in Alaska: Anderson, Barrow, and Anchorage First Assembly of God.



Rev. Redfearn is a member of the Board of Directors of NC and is the father of this year's A.S.B. president, Kent Redfearn, who is a member of the class of '83. The service will be held in Butterfield Chapel, May 28, 7:30 p.m. All friends of NC are cordially invited to share in this service.

The Reverend G. Raymond Carlson, Assistant General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, is scheduled to be the speaker at the Forty-seventh commencement exercises, Sunday, May 29, 3:00 p.m. in the Northwest Pavilion.

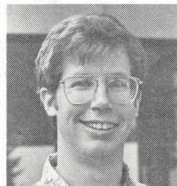


Rev. Carlson was ordained in 1941 and three years later elected as district presbyter and district Sunday school director. In 1948, he was elected district superintendent, a position he held until 1961 when he became president of North Central Bible College in Minneapolis. Since 1969, he has served as an elected official of the General Council of the Assemblies of God. Rev. Carlson has authored several books including **Preparing to Teach God's Word**, **The Life Worth Living**, and **Prayer and the Christian's Devotional Life**.

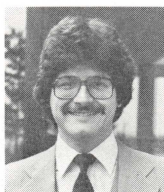
