

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

### FROM THE PRESIDENT

Josephine Kok: "Power of the Word"

In this issue I want to share with you the story of one of this year's graduates from Northwest College, Josephine Kok. While hers is a greatly unique story, in so many ways it represents the stories of scores of others all led by God to NC, trained to fulfill their calling, and finding themselves now ready to step into a life of ministry for Him. Dr. Amos Millard interviewed Josephine and tells her story:

Josephine Kok is a graduating senior at Northwest College this year. Behind her quiet and unassuming ways, graced with the cultural refinements of the Orient in which she was born and raised, there is a drama of faith and spiritual maturity that far transcends her age. She has learned the meaning through personal experience of the "power of the Word of God."

It was, in fact, her thirst for the Word of God that led her into a personal experience of salvation and personal commitment to Christ. Raised in a comfortable Roman Catholic home, Josephine has always had a respect for the Word, she recalls. "I read it, and studied it with diligence, and then I asked a friend, where can I learn more about it?" The friend's answer led her to a church she said she should never attend. It was one of the "twigs" of Christendom and not the trunk of the tree, she reasoned. And yet, it was in the "twigs" where she found the fruit that satisfied her longing.

Josephine came to know Jesus Christ in a personal way, and her thirst for the Word, she said, was intensified. She shared that just three days after her conversion, she was baptized in the Holy Spirit and in October applied for admission to the Bible Institute of Malaysia.

Three years sped by quickly, and the time came for Josephine's graduation. She served as music director in her home church she once considered "the twigs." Then, in 1980, Josephine left Petalingjaua to go 350 miles "up north" where she pioneered a church. If the western world conceives of the Orient as solely a "man's world," let it be noted that many young ladies pioneer and pastor churches in the Far East.

Josephine still felt the need of further training in the Word. Notwithstanding an offer from her parents to put her through nurses' training in London, England, where she had been accepted, she put in her application to a Bible College in the States. At a gathering where she met NC student, Randy Martin, Northwest College was brought to her attention. It was when she put in her application to Northwest that "things began to fall into place" for Josephine. A Malaysian banker pledged to cover her expenses while in school — even more spectacular to Josephine was a little incident whereby a local physician told her there was no charge for the medical report needed for her visa. A friend from London was impressed to send her 200 English pounds to cover her airfare to America.

And now that her training is completed at NC, another young lady from Malaysia wrote Josephine, "I have just received a 'windfall' of money. I feel impressed to pay your airfare home." Josephine related some personal confirmations that preceded some of these highlights of her life. What is she going to do when she returns home? "God is faithful," she said. Her faith in God Who called her is undaunted. "I love teaching, and we need teachers of the Word at home." Knowing the "God of the Word," and the "Word of God" has been a way of life for Josephine Kok. It still invokes the miracle-working power in behalf of a petite oriental young lady who thirsts and thrives on the Word.

# TWO NC PROFS COMPLETE DOCTORATES

Two Northwest College professors have received Ph.D. degrees this spring upon completion of their respective doctoral studies program in which they have been engaged over the last several years.



Dean of Students, Waymon P. Rutledge received the Ph.D. from California Graduate School of Theology. His dissertation was entitled, "The Ministry of Discipline in a Christian College." Dr. Rutledge joined the Northwest College faculty in 1977 following a long pastoral career in the Oregon District. He also served in the Oregon Department of Corrections. He holds a masters degree in sociology from Willamette University in Salem.



Receiving his Ph.D. from the University of Washington is Professor Calvin White. Dr. White's dissertation was entitled, "The Influence of Set Upon Melodic Expectancy." Dr. White joined the Northwest College faculty in 1975 and teaches in the field of music. He is also the director of one of the College's traveling choirs known as the "Maranatha Sounds." This brings to eleven the number of Northwest College faculty and administration who have earned doctors degrees.

#### CALIFORNIA PASTOR LAUDS GRADS

"They are tremendous. I found spiritual intensity among them, yet I found them relaxed and professional. Their dress was sharp. I can not speak highly enough of the whole group." These were the words of Livermore, California pastor, Elwood Irby, after eight hours of interviewing with seniors on the NC campus recently in his search for a youth minister.

Pastor Irby, himself a product of Northwest College, (1952) pastors a sizeable congregation in the Bay area of California. But today his visit on the campus was that of role-playing "Samuel" searching for the "Lord's annointed" to fill a position of ministry in the church. "They were sharp . . . without exception" he added in summary. Pastor Irby represents many pastors and church leaders who have been on campus this spring to talk with seniors and graduates concerning ministry opportunities.

The college has been working at placement, and receives calls from pastors, and leaders from New England to California to Alaska. NC considers placement of its grads as the ultimate step in the educational process.



## Larry Brosman: Missionary on the Campus By Dr. A. Millard

The popular image of the mission field is usually garnished with "third world" scenery of jungles, deserts, or rugged mountains inhabited by a primitive people. But to NC grad, Larry Brosman, the mission field turned out to be ivyclad campus inhabited by the world's most acknowledged intellegentsia. When he graduated from NC in 1982, Larry pondered and prayed concerning the field of service to which the Lord of the Harvest would direct him. Since he had some background training at Columbia University before coming to NC, he thought perhaps teaching in a Christian school might be his harvest field. But the door remained silently closed. Then he investigated a youth ministry opportunity.

It was when Larry read a notice in the College's Placement Bulletin about an opportunity for campus ministries on the east coast that the Lord began to speak to him about his field of calling. After several exchanges of correspondence, Montclair State College invited Larry to join their Chi Alpha outreach in Montclair, New Jersey.

It was clear from the start that this was to be Larry's "mission field." One door after another began to open to him.

What does Chi Alpha do? Its four-fold thrust tells the story of its work: Evangelism, worship, witness, and discipline. Larry said, "I have learned the meaning of all-night prayer meetings, and it's been really neat to see how God has honored our efforts as a result." The work of Chi Alpha extends beyond evangelism. Great emphasis is put on Bible study and discipline. "I teach a new beginner's class — a four to five week sequence," Larry said. He wrote the study series himself.

To Larry and his associates, this represents a door of opportunity that carries with it the same spirit of intensity as the Great Apostle must have felt in ancient Greece: "For a great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." (I Cor. 16:9). Let us pray for Larry and let us pray that God will raise up many more like him upon whom God will place His call and His mantle of power to reach and touch the university college campus for Christ.

Concern for the fatherless is a common example of pure religion in Scripture. Some Northwest College students are finding a practical way to put the principle into practice. Doug Clark, leader of the Community Service Ministry Interest Group, reports that some twenty or so boys who have lost their fathers are now being befriended by men students from NC in cooperation with Y.M.C.A. These "big brothers" help to supply the otherwise missing male influence upon these growing boys. Several hours a week are spent in visiting with the boys, answering their questions, treating them to a pizza, taking them fishing, and the like.

More than just a friendly service, the relationships built with the boys and their family provide good opportunities for Christian examples which often leads to testimony and getting the family into a church. And, of course, the NC men also grow in the process of ministry.

#### DALE AND RITA: LOOKING FOR "DAVID"

In a similar way, Dale and Rita Lidstrom have responded to an invitation to join Northwest College and serve in Ministry Development. What does this mean? It means they will travel throughout the Northwest Region seeking out young and older persons alike who feel God's

call upon their lives, and will work to help them find ways

to develop their ministries.

Since Northwest College exists explicitly for the purpose of training ministers, its interest in helping these persons to prepare for ministry is more than a passing

academic interest. It is an institutional calling.

Dale and Rita Lidstrom themselves are in the ministry because they felt the call of God on their lives and came to Northwest College and then went into the ministry. Originating in the Pacific Northwest, they met at Northwest College, where both graduated with the B.A. degree. Dale served in the U.S. Army from 1966-68 and from then on, it was service in the Lord's army.

An ordained minister in the Assemblies of God, Dale's ministry experience includes four years as a missionary-teacher in Okinawa; serving as a resident counselor at Northwest College; ministering in Gospel singing and preaching for four years; pioneering a Christian FM station in Carlinville, Illinois; and pastoring. Rita served as editor of the Illinois District A/G Advance magazine and as receptionist at the District headquarters. Their pastoral ministry has covered ten years when they ministered at First Assembly in Carlinville, Illinois; at the Pentecostal Church in Rotherham, England, and most recently at Fairview Assembly in St. Louis.

Their official title will be, "THE NORTHWEST-ERNERS," Dale and Rita Lidstrom, serving Northwest College in Ministry Development. They may be contacted through the College's Public Relations Office for ministry

They state that they anticipate a renewal of fellowship with friends of the past and new acquaintances with those whose paths the Lord will cause to cross theirs, in their new ministry of "searching" for David — symbolic of all whose hearts will incline to give and prepare themselves for ministry.

#### AND ... HE WILL CALL AGAIN

Whenever Washington Credit, Inc., of Redmond, has a part-time secretarial opening, Mr. Dan Hunter, President of the Company, informs the Northwest College Job Search Office first, because, as he expressed it: "The students at Northwest are preferred workers."

In a recent interview with Mrs. Bessie Guy McMullen, Job Search Director, Mr. Hunter stated: "I've been hiring NC students now since 1961, and of the dozens who have worked with our company, there hasn't been a 'dud' or a 'bummer' in the bunch."

In further elaborations of NC workers, he said the following: "We've hired not only part-time people, but, over the years, we've had quite a few wives of students who were with us on a full-time basis, helping their husbands through college." One classic case cited by Mr. Hunter was Charlotte Foster, wife of Rev. Randy Foster. "Actually, she was still a single gal," he commented, "when we first hired her. She later married Randy Foster, and continued her job at Washington Credit, working on her 'P.H.T.', as she called it ... meaning 'Putting Hubby Through.' Still later, a baby was born, and Charlotte worked right up to the point where some of us thought we might be the ones taking her to the hospital for delivery. However, Randy arrived just in time to get her there when necessary. Then again, Charlotte returned to us, and worked until Randy's graduation . . ." "In fact," added Mr. Hunter, "we still keep in touch with Charlotte and Randy, who are now in the ministry, and other former students who have worked with us.

Mr. Hunter made an interesting comment about NC students: "It's my observation, that the students I have met from that college are people with a purpose . . . who are not just going to college to fill an otherwise empty life, but they have a goal which carries over even in the way they work." Mr. Hunter called the College for help as recently as two weeks ago, and he said at that time: "Whenever I have a need for a new employee, I can always count on Job Search at Northwest College, so I contact them first."

#### Flying Seminar: 1984 Plans Announced

"Dan to Beersheba" is the theme of the College's 1984 Flying Seminar itinerary.

The seminar experience will involve much more than "just travel." It will start with a nine-week lecture series in early January during which time the seminar members will be given special studies augmented by slide presentations on the places to be visited in the tour.

The tour itself will depart from SeaTac International Airport on March 11th and will return on March 22nd. The itinerary will take the group to Vienna, Austria, for its first overnight stop. From there, it will continue on to Tel Aviv, Israel, and will concentrate in Israel. Because the Passover season next year comes at the time of the visit to Israel, the seminar party will go to Jerusalem first, where they will visit many significant sites including Calvary, the Mount of Olives, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Temple Mount, the City of David, the Via Dolorosa, the Upper Room, David's Tomb, and many other significant places connected with modern Israeli history in the city of Ierusalem.



This dome which frames the Mount of Olives in the background (looking east) has come in for attention by some Israeli archaeologists, who now believe that it could well mark the spot of the Holy of Holies in the ancient Hebrew Temple. It generally aligns with the Eastern (Golden) Gate and with the Mount of Olives.

The tour party will stay at a famous Guesthouse Kibbutz, Nof Ginnorsar on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, not far from the ancient city of Capernaum. A visit to Caesarea-Philippi at the base of Mt. Hermon will be a special feature as well as a night spent at the Dead Sea—famous for its water density and for the beauty of the golden pathway of the Passover moon at night time. The Negev, including the Beersheba, will be on the travel schedule as the group makes its way up through the green fertile plains of the Sea, once the habitat of the ancient Philistines. The city of Tel Aviv will provide a touch of modernity, not found in any other city in the Middle East. From here the group will "wing" its way for an overnight stop in Copenhagen and then "over the pole" back to the Pacific Northwest and to Seattle.
