

Hanging in Butterfield Chapel at Northwest College is a facsimile globe of the world. Its lights blink on and off during services in the chapel, signifying the Northwest College alumni ministering in many nations. Girdling that globe are these words: "Northwest College Alumni Serve Around the World." It's true! The sun never sets on Northwest College alumni who are serving God and building Christ's church. From college classrooms they have gone to the far reaches of the world armed with truth and letting light shine!

SUMMER HOME MISSIONS INTERNSHIPS

Personal involvement in home missions is an NC aim and recently, four students had an opportunity to put it into practice. Each of the four interned at a church during the summer interim, involving himself in a variety of activities and areas of ministry.

Lee Nyquist and Lenora Hancuff worked with the Lockwood

Chapel of Hope in Montana. Lee's wife also helped out in the Sunday School department. A wide variety of tasks kept them busy and left no time for boredom. As pastoral interns, they led worship and song services, prepared the church bulletin, and completed a number of lay tasks as well.



Pastor Becker was "pleased with the overall performance" and the congregation was "saddened to see them go." Of the experience, Lee said, "It was an enjoyable time of learning and confirmed my chosen direction of ministry."

Another of the interns sent out this summer, Steve Ballweber, interned in Klamath Falls, Oregon. Steve not only helped Faith



Tabernacle, but as Dr. Dwayne Braddy put it, was a "circuit-riding individual" and kept busy between Baty Assembly of God, Bly Faith, Merrel Assembly of God, and Malin Assembly of God. He was exposed to everything from youth services to janitorial work.

Bruce Summerhill, youngest of the interns, worked under Pastor James Landis at Christian Center Assembly of God in La Pine, Oregon. Like the

others, Bruce's duties encompassed the entire scope of pastoral work. In effect, he became the associate pastor and staff as he shouldered numerous responsibilities in assisting Pastor Landis.

The purpose of such a program is to instill a vision and a recognition of the need for home missions while assisting in young churches. The burden to help grows as the intern gains first-hand experience.



This was the first year that Capital Ministries has been involved with the summer internship program. Jack Strom, along with Capital Ministries, financed a full scholarship for each of the students selected for the post. The Pastoral Department, in conjunction with Capital Ministries, will continue the internship program for at least another two years, and hopefully, longer. The program definitely has made an impact.







HERITAGE WEEK COMMEMORATES 50TH YEAR




"Hitherto hath the Lord helped us . . ." With these well known words from the prophet Samuel, quoted by President D. V. Hurst, Northwest College inaugurated the first in a series of commemorative events to celebrate its fiftieth year of history. The special chapel series during Thanksgiving week was known as "Heritage Week" at the College.

The first speaker in the three-part series was a long-time associate with the College and Professor Emeritus, Dr. Donald H. Fee. Dr. Fee spoke on the pioneer days of the school's history, pointing out how the school came into being in the wake of a "mighty Pentecostal revival" that swept over the Pacific Northwest region under the ministry of the late Dr. Chas. S. Price. Dr. Price's ministry saw thousands of converts and hundreds of miraculous healing take place, out of which Pentecostal churches "sprang up everywhere." Many of the pastors of these churches were self-taught, and the need for a Bible training

school gave impetus to several efforts to start a school very early in the movement.

It was not until a young pastor, Henry H. Ness, came to Seattle from Fargo, North Dakota, to take the pastorate of then Hollywood Temple in Seattle that the vision and the initiative brought into being what is today Northwest College. Professor Fee recalled how Dr. Ness was surveying the facilities



of his new church when "God gave him the vision" to start a school to fully utilize its facilities "on the other six days of the week." He related how this vision came into being with the assent of the Northwest District and how in spite of financial deprivation of the "depression years" the school "rooted." It has since grown like a mighty oak tree until it



now has a campus and plant worth over sixteen million dollars, a student-body approaching nearly eight-hundred students, and a highly trained faculty and staff that is more than double the size of the student body during the school's first year of history fifty years ago.

Dr. Fee recalled the sacrifices of both faculty and students in those early years, noting that the faculty were mostly pastors, which included C. E. Butterfield, who was destined to become


the College's second president, in 1949. It was after this that he joined the faculty in 1953, acclaiming his thirty years of

faculty association with the school as the "richest years of his life."

In a moving conclusion to his message, Dr. Fee called to the pulpit President Hurst, already an eighteen year veteran in the presidency of the school, and offered thanks to God for the gifts of ministry and leadership in the school through the years, and invoking God's continued blessing upon the school in the days ahead. It was indeed, a graphic portrait of history that befit the words of Samuel spoken to Israel, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us"!

One of the highlights of the series came on the second day in a message by the Reverend R. J. Carlson, former District Superintendent of the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God, and long-time member of the College's Board of Directors. He also served on other important

commissions and committees of the college's transition years from its location in the "Old Hollywood Temple building" in the Green Lake district of Seattle to its new campus in Houghton. He recalled the obstacles that the school faced, and the corresponding miracles that came along to overand development of the



present campus — now valued at over \$16.5 million dollars

Speaking with the clarity of a Hebrew prophet, Dr. Carlson cautioned the students and faculty not to take the facilities and privileges they enjoy for granted, noting that if the school's pioneers "had not worked and sacrified they would not be sitting where they are today." Concerning the present, he noted the significance of the times saying, "The whole world is now mouthing terms that for years have been reserved for preachers of prophecy." He expressed renewed conviction, "This is a spiritual work. It is the work of God and must be unchanged in form from those principles by which it was brought into being." More timely words could hardly have been spoken as the school ob-

serves its 50th year of history and on-going work into the future.

On the third day of the Heritage Week series, the students picked up on the theme of the present and the future. Student Missions leader, Mike Flores found the school's history, mission, and message embodied in its school seal. ASB president, Jeff Wood spoke of the school's continuing mission, concluding with the words of the Great Commission, "Go into the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," and then responded, "Lord of the Harvest, I will go."
