NORTHWEST COLLEGE IS MISSIONS

One-hundred ninety-eight years of mission stood on the platform at NC. And who knows how many more future years were in the audience at the same time?!

It was the missions parade, closing event as a part of the annual NC missions emphasis week. Alumni missionaries living in the area and on furlough joined the students, many of them eagerly looking forward to missionary careers themselves in this meaningful service.

It was impressive . . . and moving. The students applauded as the parade progressed. Some had tears in their eyes. This was the mission of the church . . . yes, of NC right before them.

Veteran alumni missionaries in the parade included: Lillian Bach, forty-two years of service from Nigeria, West Africa; Robert and Ruth Frivold, thirty years each in Japan; Dan and Betty Masser, twenty-eight years each in the Canary Islands.

Others, veterans, but with many years of service still ahead of them included Dwayne and Gayle Turner, nine years each from the Philippines; John LaCossec, ten years among the gypsies of Europe. New "recruits" included Jim and Sally Conn, with

three years of service in Tonga and other islands; Dave Kinney, four years of volunteer service and headed for the Far East.

Brand new recruits were represented by Darren and Sheri Beebee, headed for the Solomon Islands.



Now that's what NC is all about, taking His message around the world . . . and even fulfilling the word - the islands shall hear His law!

Yes, Northwest College is missions! Those who have invested their missionary dollars in the past in NC with vision are reaping a harvest now! Training a mission-

The end of 1983 marked the retirement of Woodrow J. Fletcher from the Northwest College administration. "Woody" had served as Stewardship Consultant since September 1976 — in which position he had traveled untold miles throughout the Northwest region, giving advice and information to Christians concerning their financial planning and promoting Northwest College to supporters and potential students.

"Woody" will be remembered around the NC campus for his interest in students, his frank but goodhumored comments in committee meetings, his broad Irish grin and merry chuckle. Included were churches in Federal Way, Seattle, and Mercer Island – all prior to his joining the NC family. He had also been an investment broker and counselor.

No one expects the armchair to capture "Woody," but they hope he will find more time for the pleasant things he has missed while on-the-road. Time for his wife and family will be a high priority. He and his wife just recently celebrated their fortieth wedding anniversary at a reception for faculty and friends held at Dr. and Mrs. Robert Swaffield's house. May his wishes come true.

ALUMNI FEATURE REV. HARRY AYERS



Harry Avers began his status as a student of Northwest College in 1942. There, he met and married Claretta, and continued his schooling until 1944, when he joined the Navy. After the war, he and his small family returned to Northwest College and during Harry's senior year, he resided as the counselor of the men's dorm. Upon graduating in

The last 11 years of a 35 year ministry have been spent at Missoula Life Center in Montana, where the Ayers have been "blessed with a warm, loving congregation and a wonderful, loyal staff.'

In all of their pastorates, the Ayers have enjoyed NC students as part of their congregation.

Last September, Harry and Claretta celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary. They have three married daughters and eight grandchildren. Harry has actively involved himself in the ministry as a presbyter for a number of years. This involvement increased when he was elected secretary of his Montana District last March. He also serves on the board of Northwest College.

As a board member, Pastor Ayers is appreciative of the beautiful NC facilities and the growth he sees on the campus. He commented on this growth: "I thank God for the young people that are going out with the call of God on their lives and those that are serving in the business world . . . I thank God for the influence, past and present, of Northwest College."

As I walked by a table in a restaurant one Saturday morning, a young lady looked up and smiled. I observed her during the breakfast hour as she was eating and reading. On the way out I stopped by her table . . . "excuse me for interrupting you, but I assume that you are a student in college?"

"Yes."

"Where do you attend?"

"Northwest College."

I sat down and began to chat with her. Kim Lydy is from Madras, Oregon. Though she had been a Christian for many years, her church background was in an organization which was less than sympathetic with the Penetocstal experience and all of her life had heard negative teaching in this regard. But God still leads His people and knows how to meet the need of hungry hearts. Kim accepted an assignment with her youth group to Mexico and it was in this setting that she came in contact with some Pentecostal believers and as a result, received the baptism of the Holy Spirit. She was startled and almost questioned what God had done for her.

Back home (though she did not attend an A/G church) a Pentecostal Evangel magazine fell into her hands. It was the issue that carried an ad regarding Northwest College. She had no previous knowledge of NC but the Spirit quickened her heart that this was the place where she should pursue her education. In prompt and trusting obedience she sent her application for admission and was accepted even before she had received the catalog as to the offerings of Northwest College.

She is excited at the leading of the Lord thus far and anticipates the fulfillment of God's will in her life in the future.



Sights and Sounds of Dr. Wes and June Hurst Winter Spiritual Emphasis



"In forgiveness we can determine the hurts in our memory will not control our relationship today... There's no way to understand what's in a man's heart until you understand his mother tongue — as a missionary learn the language ... For me to live is Christ ... Thailand — freeland was never occupied by a foreign power. They love freedom and will fight for it ... The man I talk about is a Thai and he pays his tithes ... Myo Chit, pastor in Rangoon, is a direct descendent of the fourth convert of Adonirum Judson. Talk about seed and harvest. Talk about casting your bread upon the waters! ... The lines of witness invariably followed the lines of the baptism in the Holy Spirit in Burma during the hard days ... The Holy Ghost doesn't need a passport or a visa. The church is sealed off but not sealed out ... In Burma I was the privileged of God's people. I was the first one to preach to





them, those who had everything stripped away but their faith and a song... God wants young people who will hang in there and wait, plant seed, be committed, get a hold and hang onto God, until you get to doing what God wants you to do... I know that God is taking some right hand turns in hearts in this room right now... changes in attitude and purpose... Lord, how are you going to make me what You want me to be starting with what I am right now?... Indigenous church? As soon as you see a little sign of muscle, test it. If it's strong enough to bear the

weight let it carry it!... The leper... the untouchable, was touchable to Jesus Christ. He reached out, touched him and healed him. That's the picture of missions, causing the untouchables of the world to know Jesus, through the missionary God reaches out to touch them... 'Oh to be His hand extended'... I can't find the true origins of the indigenous church principle in the Assemblies of God missions. Long after it happened around the world in our missions action we officially committed to it."

Accreditation Reaffirmed

Northwest College's accreditation by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges was reaffirmed on the basis of the College's interim report and subsequent visit by a NASC team November 1 and 2, 1983. This action was taken by the NASC Commission on Colleges in their annual meeting and reported to Northwest College President D. V. Hurst in a letter from the executive director, James F. Bemis, on December 12. Dr. Bemis indicated that the Commission had been well satisfied with NC's progress since the evaluation visit in 1978. Baring some crisis, the next full scale evaluation by the Northwest Association is expected in 1988.
