# Year of New Beginnings

This is the 51st year of NC's "life" and ministry. Last year, the 50th anniversary year was a great one. So many good things happened that year. The concluding banquet with almost 1000 in attendance was a grand success.

As the 51st year began and the faculty retreat convened, I looked back to the biblical "new beginning" of Isreal following its year of Jubilee. In my message to faculty, I talked of values ... principles ... old paths ... of the primacy of Divine principles as over against shifting human values and harkened back to Leviticus 25 where God laid before Isreal the principles of renewing relationships to the land and each other every 50 years.

I then looked at N.C. and the principles that emerged in its early years of service to guide it through its first half century. After talking to patriarchs like Dr. Donald Fee, Dr. Maxine Williams, and Dr. Amos Millard, these guiding principles emerged. These are the "old paths" so in evidence in N.C.'s development:

1. Principle of Reliance: The principle of spiritual life-relying on, drawing close to, and drawing life from God. "Except the Lord build . . ." Isreal learned the great lesson "God provides"

and N.C. did, too.

2. Principle of Lordship: The principle of stewardship was the case with Isreal. The land belonged to God and Isreal was given stewardship. So it is with N.C. The work is His! And all the beautiful students are His. The entire ministry of N.C. exists as His servant.

3. Principle of Faith: This centers in a faith that He who calls and starts His work performs (perfects) His work. And when He finishes, He places His workmanship in position for service to Him.

The true success of any college is measured by its graduates. This year we will release almost 100 Bachelor of Art graduates into ministry. These student's majors will include the following:

for a total of over 3400. These graduates are penetrating our 98033world with the claims of Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit. Lives are being transformed because of the training received by students at N.C. The spiritual formation process at N.C. is more than classes, or chapels, or dorm life. It is a total environment designed to shape students into the image of Jesus Christ.

4. Principle of Reliability: The key requirement of any steward's faithfulness is reliability, it is the most important of all liabilities - faithfulness to one's Lord, one's task, one's

5. Principle of Mission: It starts in worship and continues in edification (building and training), but it expresses itself ultimately in going — in mission. As is stated in Acts 1:8 it is important to "be", but the purpose of being is to "go" and to "do." The Holy Spirit generates the "go." And this has been a distinctive principle of N.C. from its beginning.

So, we harkened back to the "old paths" of principle as we

started this year.

# Year of Spiritual Formation

Throughout the faculty retreat, the theme of spiritual formation was developed. Our task — the spiritual formation of the students. Implicit was the requisite hand of God in all we do. Spiritual formation has to be the work of the Spirit with the Word as brought into position by the servant. The teacher is strategic to the working of the Spirit and the Word. Therefore, the privilege of being a faculty member in a Bible college is among the highest of privileges in His Kingdom work.

N.C.'s faculty continues to excell in academic achievement, averaging 7.88 years of post-secondary education with twelve holding earned doctorates. This places our faculty among the highest of colleges accredited by the American Assocation of

Bible Colleges.

Not only have the faculty achieved the highest academic excellence, but they are vitally involved in ministry to the northwest region and the world. These ministries include: preaching, ministry at camps and retreats, ministry as a chaplain, ministry in a church bookstore, ministry in music, overseas ministry, revival preaching, leading seminars, street witnessing, Sunday School teaching, preaching conventions, and writing for Christian publications.

But most importantly, N.C. faculty care about every student who enters this campus. Whether it be in a classroom, the chapel, an office, or just in the hall between class, N.C.'s

# Year of Development

N.C. has developed this year. The Elementary Education program is "off and running." Twice as many students signed into the program as was anticipated for the first year. I predict it will be one of N.C.'s strongest academic programs in the years ahead. Its graduates will bless the churches and the communities wherein they serve. I believe because of their heritage, they will be among the very vest teachers.

This year N.C. will graduate the first elementary education major. Her name is Cheri Schoenrock. Let Cheri tell you in her own words what N.C. has meant to her: "N.C. has given me the opportunity to grow in the understanding and expression of my faith in Jesus Christ . . . And the genuine commitment of my professors and friends has served as a great source of encouragement as I have worked toward the accomplishment of my goals. Above all, I am sincerely thankful for God's providence in leading me to N.C."

So many have said, "I wish you had that program when I attended." Well, we now have it.

Another new academic program authorized and being developed this year is the Behavioral Sciences program. Using curricula, we already have with but minimal additions, we have tooled out a program in this field which will serve as basis for immediate service after graduation or for graduate studies in several areas — pastoral care, counseling, social services, institutional chaplains, etc.

Although, they may take either one of these programs, or any one of the other ministry training programs (pastor, missionary, music, Christian Ed. or youth minister, etc.) all four year students take a Bible major, too. Thus, the Bible college like N.C. is unique. All graduates have a double major. They are well prepared for life and service. That's why I say, for example, N.C.'s elementary teacher grads will be among the best.

So this is a year of new beginnings. But it is one of harkening back to "old paths" of principle. It is a year of spiritual formation, a year of spirit, and a year of new academic programs.

### Year of Goodness

Before the year began, I read Ps. 65:11 — "Thou crownest the year with goodness." The Psalmist no doubt spoke of the year of seasons the earth experiences as it revolves, but I claimed that line as expressive of what God could do for N.C. this school year, too — "Crown the year with blessing." Already, we have seen just that happen. I am claiming the line for the rest of the year.

Will you join me in that prayer?

# **Enrollment** 1984 - 1985



The enrollment climbed in the winter quarter this year reversing a normal trend. Last year the drop from fall to winter was thirty (780 to 750). This year the disappointing fall quarter enrollment was felt to be due largely to the economic factor, wherein many areas from which N.C. draws students, suffered unemployment rates of as high as 27%. Surveys of "no shows" — students who did not return or who planned to enroll for the first time but did not — attributed their non-enrollment to the economic factor about three to one. Jobs are available around campus. The message needs to get out. Between the financial aids and jobs available, young people can make their way through.

eastern part of Idaho for seven years.




Pres. D. V. Hurst 19 years at NC





## Northwest College Income Dollar




The income "dollar" shows the imbalance of reliance on student generated revenues that exists at N.C. Most private institutions show a balance of 60% from students and 40% from endowment and other sources. The need to increase dramatically the support base of N.C. from its church and friends is most evident.

# Northwest College Expense Dollar



The expense dollar shows a greater ratio should be spent on instructional and library and a smaller ratio on debt service. This could and must occur as gift and endowment income rises. The buildings should be provided by other than student revenues. N.C. had no alternative in its growth period but to provide the facilities needed and service the debt from revenues available. Current debt service and any future plant development must be assumed by other revenue sources in order for the instructional program to be enriched. Over the years, the ratio of administration expense has fallen steadily from 31% in 1970 to 13% in 1984.

# Gift Income Per Student In Assemblies of God Colleges



For 1984 N.C. rated only third in giving per student from all sources to all Assemblies of God accredited four year schools. Contributions to N.C. per student came to \$467 while the average for all A.G. colleges was \$749 and reached as high as \$1418. Were N.C. to reach the average this year, it could balance its books. Clearly the vision for supporting N.C. by its region needs to be shared. Of interest is the fact that one of our sister colleges supported by the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada received \$1777 per student in gift income.

### We Heard You

Northwest College has long had a policy of listening to those actively involved in ministry. This helps us plan a practical curriculum to prepare men and women for ministry. This process has resulted in our four newest majors: Pastoral Ministries, Youth Ministries, Elementary Education and now Behavioral Science.
