Devotional Corner

One of the best ways to describe the fellowship which the Christian enjoys is with this word: "Feasting." It implies an intimacy not found in ordinary fellowship. In Rev. 3:20 Jesus promises and indicates a desire to have this degree of fellowship with us. If He wants it, surely we should also desire it. However, we find that there is opposition to feasting on the presence of the Lord.

In John 7 Jesus desired to observe the feast of Tabernacles. But He encounters opposition, in fact, the Jews want to kill Him. Have you ever determined to fellowship with the Lord more, only to find that you are busier than ever before? Satan will oppose your desire to feast. Every time we seek to know Him better, to feast upon His presence, to fellowship Him more, Satan rears his head in outright beligerence to snuff out our spiritual life.

In the most beautiful picture of de-


votion, worship, fellowship, and feasting on the Lord is to be found in the New Testament. When Mary anointed the head of Jesus we find Satan's opposition again in evidence. A Rare Moment of Relaxation

"We're anxious to get back—back to Limbe in Southern Nyassaland." This is what the Udds expressed as we visited together, and I knew they meant it. I thought of the crude African dwelling to which they will return, and realized then that God's call burns in their hearts.

For Magnus, the real start came when he was saved at the age of five and filled with the Holy Spirit eight years later. High school graduation was followed by three years at NBC. He graduated with the Torchbearers, Class of 1940.

With several successive co-workers, Magnus busied himself the next six years conducting tent services and established churches at Randle, Ilwaco, Chinook, and his home town, South Bend, Wash. God's blessing was upon him and many souls were brought to Christ.

Having lost several co-workers to the cause of matrimony, Magnus became convinced of his need for a real companion! In June, 1942, two weeks after her graduation from NBC, Hazel Haugland and Magnus were married. Hazel, saved at the age of fourteen, was filled with the Spirit and called into God's service while a senior in high school.

The missionary call of NBC days was renewed while pastoring at Yelm. With their two little boys, Darrell and Duane, they left Seattle for Africa in February, 1947.

The first year was spent in South Africa at the Bible Training Institute teaching and outstation work. Rev. Fred Burke was training them for their future work of setting up a similar school. In April, 1948, the Udds moved to Nyassaland where God has enabled them to establish a Bible school among an indiginous group.

Much of the first term was spent breaking ground, renovating buildings, supervising brick making, and establishing a fine Bible school! For five months each year the pastors and evangelists gather for instruction.

The remaining seven months are busy ones for the Udds. There are conferences, compound meetings, and a host of other activities. God's work is going on. There are those who care.

Hazel is recovering from illness and surgery and will appreciate our prayers as they prepare to return to Africa this spring. The Udds like home and America, but, "We're anxious to get back—back to Limbe in Southern Nyassaland."

We would like to introduce you to the NBC student council.

This is a group of young people who are learning responsibility while receiving insight into procedures of administration and problems dealing with human nature. The council is composed of the officers of the student body, the officers of each class and the president of the missionary society with Miss Williams as the faculty advisor. To qualify for Council membership students are required to meet certain academic and spirit-

ual standards.

The Council's purpose is to guide student activities and promote worthy projects financed by student offerings. This year these projects have included financing the practical works department, providing personal property insurance for the student body and the disbursement of more than three hundred dollars through the student aid fund. Several hundred dollars have also been contributed for building improvements and a tape recorder.
