ENROLLMENT AT TEN YEAR HIGH



Enrollment is on the rise at Northwest College. The efforts of the Office of Enrollment Services coupled with the campus wide focus on service to NC students has resulted in increased enrollment of first time students, and re-enrollment and retention of the current student population.

"Service is the key to the success of any company or institution that deals with people," says Richard Rose, Vice President for College Advancement, "so Northwest is always looking for ways to improve our service to the student. It's not just a means to success; we do it because it's the right thing to do."

Fall enrollment closed on September 10th at 757, a 10 % increase over 1992, and a 15 % increase over 1991. This year's total is the fifth highest in NORTHWEST's sixty year history, and the highest since 1983.

This fall's number includes 422 who returned from last semester and 335 new students. Among those who are new, 167 are first-time freshmen, 137 are transfers, and 31 are returning to NORTHWEST after having been away for a semester or more. All class levels are larger than last year, with the Sophomore class gaining the most new students — 42.

Seniors and high school graduates are invited to visit NORTHWEST on a "Northwest Friday" this fall. The remaining date is November 19th. "Campus Days '94" will be March 24th - 26th. For more information call 889-5210, or toll-free, 1-800-6NWEST1.

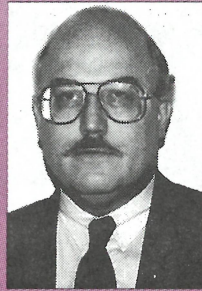

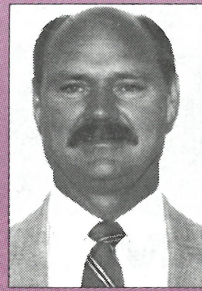

Dr. John McMillin, Professor of Business Administration and Dr. Bill Randolph, Associate Professor of Life Sciences took a team of students to a deaf/mute school in Mexico for the purpose of developing a self-sustaining food raising project as a ministry project to the resident young people. Dr. McMillin, a specialist in food production in second and third world settings, provided training to team members in bio-intensive agriculture during the 1993 Spring semester. In Mexico the team completed a hands-on project that started with crumbly sandstone and ended as five garden plots enriched with composting materials. A forty foot fish pond was also initiated. The team also spent time learning sign language and developing relationships with the resident young people. Reports from the school in July indicated that the gardens were producing more than could be consumed and the school was requesting further consultation on how to keep the project going.

Dr. Bill Randolph, Associate Professor of Life Sciences received a general studies grant and the Pope Memorial Grant for in-depth studies in creation/evolution research. His summer was spent reading and analyzing various books and media for background purposes. He also visited fossil excavations in Montana and Alberta, Canada. He and Phil Gustafson, Associate Professor of Science participated in a fossil dig on the Paluxy River near Glen Rose, Texas in conjunction with the Creation Evidence Museum. The team discovered two dinosaur bones that were part of the eighty bones of a skeleton being reconstructed. Two teeth twelve inches from and in the same strata as dinosaur prints were found. These were preliminarily verified by a dentist to be at least from a higher mammal or possibly of human origin. These significant finds are

undergoing detailed laboratory analysis at present with details to be released later.

Dr. Dwaine Braddy, Associate Professor of Pastoral Ministries and Bible participated in Decade of Harvest evangelism and teaching ministry in Fiji, June 27-July 11.

Dr. Darrell Hobson, taught Old Testament Literature during the early summer at Asia Center for Theology, Evangelism, and Missions in Singapore.

New Faculty Appointments 1993 - 1994 Academic Year

Mrs. Peggy Kellogg, Assistant Professor, Teacher Education, joins the faculty of Northwest College on a half-time basis for the 1993-1994 academic year. Mrs. Kellogg began her professional education experience as a teacher in Kenya while serving as a missionary. Following eight years on the field, she returned to Christian School Education in the Seattle area, serving most recently at North Seattle Christian School.

Mrs. Kellogg, has also provided adjunct faculty service to Seattle Pacific University. Her relationship with Northwest College commenced in 1991 as a member of the Professional Education Advisory Board for the Teacher Education Major.

Rev. Dale McClellan, joins the faculty as the Missionary-In-Residence appointee for the 1993-1994 academic year. Rev. McClellan has served as a missionary, pastor, and educator in Belgium. He has completed two terms under Assemblies of God missionary appointment. His instructional assignment will include the development of opportunity for missionary strategy to European countries.

Ms. Lynette Sorenson, joins the faculty as Reference Librarian on a half-time basis. Ms. Sorenson recently completed her Masters in Library Science from the University of Washington. Her undergraduate education includes a degree in Bible and Theology, as well as Teacher Education. She brings excellent preparation with sound Biblical integration to this important librarianship.

David and Teresa Stoops, have joined the college faculty on a full-time basis. David Stoops will serve as Instructor of Business Management and Administration. He becomes the second full-time faculty member in this new and popular major on the Northwest College campus. Prior to commencing his faculty role, David served a regional company as Vice President of Operations.

Teresa Stoops, will serve as Assistant Professor of Teacher Education with primary responsibility for the start-up of the Secondary Education major. Mrs. Stoops comes to Northwest College after completing a twelve-year tenure as a Language Arts Specialist in Strasburg High School just outside of Denver, Colorado. She recently completed her principal certification and is a candidate for the Ph.D. degree.

ALUMNI KEEP COMING BACK TO NC

The sun shone on the campus and love for the Son showed in the faces of alumni as they came back to the campus to celebrate events of the 1993 Alumni Weekend.

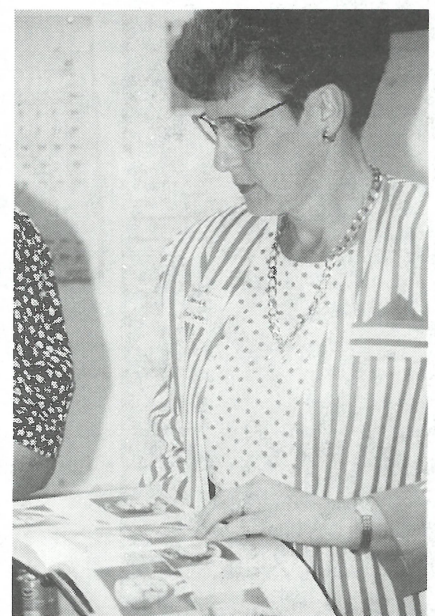
The day began with an "out of the past" chapel service where there was good attendance of alumni; close to 80. Students went back to the rules of the early Northwest Bible Institute days in chapel with the men sitting on one side and the women on the other. Paul Petersen, grandson of the college's first president, Henry Ness, spoke to the chapel from a message given to the student body in 1948 by Brother Ness. The troubled uncertain future of that time is relevant today and the message stated "Never in its history has the world been in such great need of consecrated leadership to direct its affairs. Spirit-filled men and women are needed to stand in the gap and use their influence for righteousness and truth. The Lord has promised that He will never leave you nor forsake you. He will be with you even to the end of the age."

Dr. Dan Pecota led a session in the afternoon with several professors. Reports were

given about Northwest College's relationship with the Pacific Rim Nations, the International Pedagogical University at Magadan, Russia, teaching English as a second language, and also teaching countries to utilize their environment to produce resources needed for their survival.

A beautiful banquet was held in the Northwest Pavilion, followed by an Alumni Assembly at the chapel. The reunion choir, led by Dr. Bob Swaffield, joined alumni and Festival Chorale students together in singing the great anthem "Battle Hymn of The Republic". Nine classes were recognized for their attendance and the celebration of their class reunions. Rev. Glen Cole, pastor of Capital Christian Center in Sacramento, California spoke to the alumni from II Timothy 3:14 "Continue in what you have learned and have become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it."

Receptions followed at 9:15 PM for nine classes all over the campus, hosted by professors and staff. Such a weekend; full of many events on both Friday and Saturday. However



the alumni left Northwest challenged and refreshed. Comments received were "we had such a good time", "it was good to meet our classmates and to reflect on the faithfulness and goodness of the Lord to each of us."

NC HOSTS STRATEGIC COURSES IN AGTS EXTENSION SESSION

The 1993 Fall **AGTS** (Assemblies of God Theological Seminary) Extension Session has been a strategic opportunity for pastors and church leaders to receive advanced training in coursework directly applicable to their ministry setting.

Pastor Glen Cole of Capital Christian Center, Sacramento, CA., and Executive Presbyter of the Assemblies of God; and Dr. J. Melvyn Ming, Director of Christian Education for the Northwest District Council; have teamed together to present a study of *The Dynamics of Church Growth*. Special attention was given to the role of the pastor in the leadership and administration of a growing church. Twenty-six AGTS students participated in the five-day, eighteen-hour class sessions with Drs. Ming and Cole.

The Pastor and the Preaching Task was a second session offered during the Fall AGTS Extension week. Dr. Warren Bullock, Assistant Superintendent of the Northwest District Council, was the instructor. The topic focused on the role of preaching in the pastorate with emphasis placed on planning, preparation, and the delivery of messages that meet contemporary needs. Thirteen participants benefitted from Dr. Bullock's challenges for effective pulpit ministry.

For Northwest College, the AGTS Extension is more than a classroom experience. The participants join a larger community of church leaders and faculty who are serious about strategic ministry in today's challenging socio-cultural environment.

The next AGTS offerings are scheduled for **January 24 - January 28, 1994**. Dr. Anthony Palma, noted author and Assemblies of God educator, will be presenting a special session on *Pauline Theology*. Northwest College faculty member, Dr. Darrell Hobson will cover the subject of *Biblical Introduction*. David Gable, Pastor and District leader, will provide a stimulating course presentation on *The Pastor and Congregational Life*.

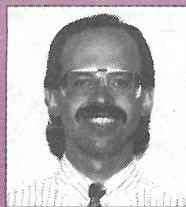

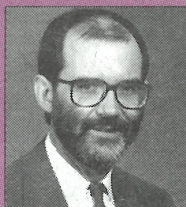

Glenn hopes to utilize his college degree on the mission field (maybe in South America), possibly teaching English as a second language. He is excited about this recent discovery.

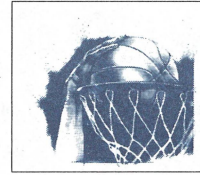

AFTER ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON VOLLEYBALL TEAM RECEIVES NEW COACH - ROSS JOHNSON -

The Northwest College volleyball team returns seven players from last year's squad. Veteran players include three seniors: Karri Fairfield from Auburn, Joanne (Faagau) Portmann from Bremerton, and Devanee Peterson from Tete Jaune, B.C. Melinda Allerdings (Spokane), Jessie Newell (McCall, ID), Stephanie Baller (Bellingham), and Marlo Hutchison (Post Falls, ID) complete the list of returners. In their first year of Eagle volleyball are sophomore Janea Powell (Meridian, ID) and freshmen Julie Hagen (Tacoma) and Kim Springer (Hamilton, MT). The highlight of the season thus far was an October 2, five-game victory over NAA rival Western Baptist College. The Eagles came from two games down to win the match 1-15, 14-16, 15-8, 15-13, 15-6.

This is a transition year for NC volleyball as Kristi Brodin relinquishes the head coaching position to Ross Johnson (NC alumnus and son of history professor, Dr. LeRoy Johnson). Johnson has been an assistant with the program for three years. Coach Brodin, who has coached the team from its inception, says, "Ross will bring a fresh perspective and new ideas to the program. I am confident of his ability as a coach and his interest in furthering the Christian commitment of the athletes. I anticipate a great future for Eagle volleyball under his leadership. That's why I recommended him for the position."

Coach Johnson is looking forward to building on the program's previous successes which include two trips to the NCCAA II National Tournament, and a third place finish in the 1989 tournament. Of this year's team, Johnson says, "We have the right combination of seasoned veterans and promising freshmen to be a contender for this year's National Championship." The Eagles will be representing the Northwest Region at the NCCAA II National Tournament at Toccoa Falls College in Georgia on November 4-6. GO EAGLES!

NEW FORENSICS SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED

The Northwest College Forensics Scholarship is the newest to be offered at NC this year. It is offering new opportunities to members of the Northwest College Speech and Debate Team.

Speech team coach and NC professor Gary Gillespie believes strongly in the value of debate. "Intercollegiate forensics gives students the opportunity to enhance their communication skills in a competitive environment. They are critiqued by speech professors from other schools, so their skills are developed." He also describes speech team members. "The student has to have a lot of individual initiative to work hard and learn the topic; and, as a result, they learn how to research, how to think critically, and to be persuasive."

This year's debate topic deals with media bias and how the media skews public opinion concerning political issues. Some students also enter individual speaking events, which involve various speeches and readings.

The NC Speech and Debate Team participates in four to five tournaments each semester, competing against about thirty other schools in the Northwest region. Northwest College and Northwest Nazarene are the only two Christian schools competing in this league, so there is a lot of opportunity to witness. Professor Gillespie said that students from other schools watch NC debaters to see how they are living up to what they say they are. Part of NC's mission is to help fulfill the Great Commission. Professor Gillespie says, "The qualities that people learn from this experience are really what we're trying to promote at Northwest College. We're trying to help people communicate the Gospel, and this is a perfect opportunity for them to learn the skills that they need to do that." NC debaters are out there not only to compete, but also to reach out to those who will be our future leaders.

Professor Gary Gillespie stressed the many congressmen and many of our college and local church leaders who credit debate with their main preparation for their current ventures. He says of debate, "It's just one of those things that's so valuable, that you can hardly put a price tag on it. They go away really changed from when they started."

Troy Baxter is excited about his scholarship. "The Forensics scholarship has afforded me the opportunity to pursue my interest in debate. The skills I have acquired from participating in debate are invaluable tools I will use in my career."

On this year's Speech and Debate Team are seven debaters and three students participating in individual events.

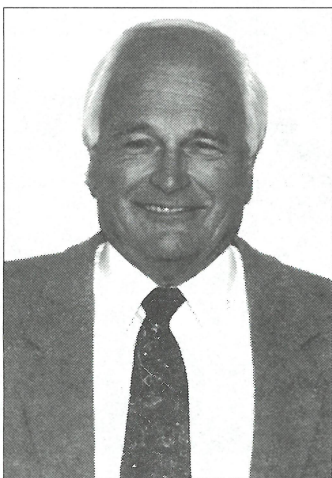


WHAT A DAY TO BE ALIVE AND SERVING JESUS!!

Enrollment is up (a ten year high)...all the beds are full in the residence halls...many classes are at maximum number of students...faculty are having more student contact hours...BUT, things are moving along very smoothly and orderly.

I never get weary talking about the wonderful students who are here. Someone reminded me recently that now all of the students here have en-

Dr. McMillin Teaches NC students to grow fish in the desert!

Williams Hall at Northwest College has a new addition--an aquaculture center. The project is the brain-child of Dr. John McMillin, NC professor, head of the Business Management and Administration Department, and president of Land and Water Resources, International. Land and Water Resources is a non-profit organization formed to assist developing nations in using new methods to grow food. "We are trying to find clever ways to relate and transfer high technology to a very low tech world," said Dr. McMillin. Dr. Bill Randolph, NC professor and head of the Science Department,

is working closely with Dr. McMillin on this project.

Dr. McMillin feels strongly about this teaching tool. "One of the primary reasons I came to NC is deeply imbedded in the fact that this is the best delivery vehicle for service to a very hungry world. And therefore the aquaculture center will be a device that can deliver strategies for hunger abatement."

The aquaculture center's primary goal is to train students. This will be at three different levels.

The first is to orient missions students that strategies are available to prevent famine and to restore food supply in the communities they go out and serve. This level provides orientation and content.

The second level is a course in Biointensive Agriculture. Students here will learn how to grow agricultural crops abundantly with no outside purchase of expensive fertilizers and pesticides and in environments that are essentially deserts.

Orientation of mission executives is the third level of training. These are people who have responsibility for the planning and execution of mission functions overseas. The training here will help inform these executives what kind of people to look at as missionary candidates. Some denominations today are appointing mis-

sionaries who will work frequently in technical capacities in the countries they are serving more than just in evangelistic capacities. Many are also feeling called to help in the economies of poverty and in food production.

The aquaculture center will be used to raise fish and some hydroponic plants. It will function at subtropical heat levels, mimicking the weather of most underdeveloped nations.

The program will provide training in the skills and technologies to provide new sources of income for poor people in mission stations. Dr. McMillin said that income generation is a huge problem in the third world. "During the forty years I've been in the field, I've watched [and seen] that very hungry people drop out of the church."

During the interview with Dr. McMillin for this article, he said that... that day, 30,000 children would die and another 120,000 would be seriously weakened by diseases caused only by the lack of simple food. He feels that there is no need for this. He feels famine is only the result of poor planning and of people not acquiring the right education to be self-sufficient.

The aquaculture center will make great strides toward ending hunger around the world by equipping NC students with skills needed in the next century of desperate hunger.

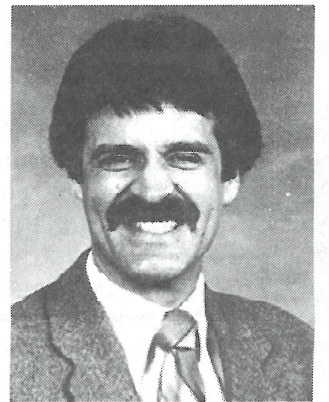

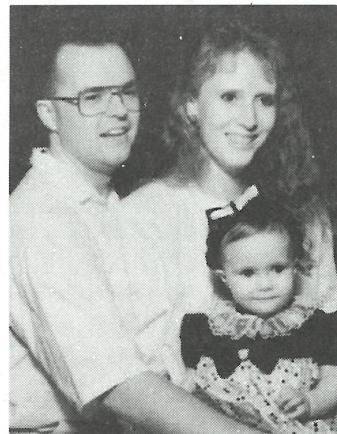
