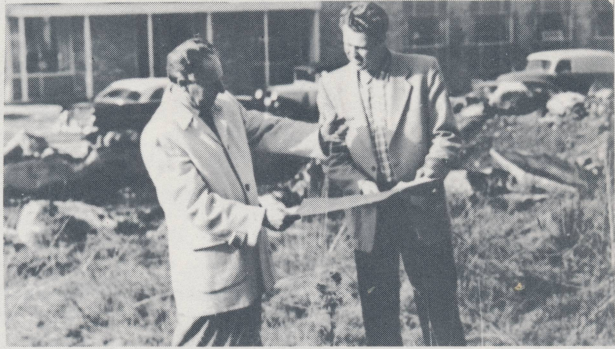

This will be used to purchase a trophy to present to the Grand Champion. (2) Contestants will be matched first according to their free periods. The eventual winners of each period will then be

matched against each other for the semi-finals. These winners will be matched for the Grand Champion of N.B.C.

### SMC Banquet To Be March 3

A special missionary banquet with a Latin-American theme will be held Friday, March 3, at 7 p.m. in the S.U.E. recreation room. A Spanish menu is being featured and a missionary film will also be shown.

Tickets are \$1.25 and will be on sale February 23 to March 1. Those interested are invited to contact Dave Hale for tickets.

The court would be located on the property immediately in front of the girls' dormitory and extending 300 yards toward the student union building. Plans call for a regulation-size court of 60x100 feet with backstops on each end. Cost of the project has been estimated at \$2,500.

The project was proposed by the 1959-60 council basing initial financing on sale of the student body station wagon. The car was sold for \$1,000, leaving approximately \$1,300 yet to be raised.

Tuttle stated that "seeing the project completed may not be an easy task but we encourage the student body to pray with us about it. We know that the court will be a definite recreational asset to our campus."

Star Sketches:**Rev. John Pope Has History Of Extensive Education and Travel**

Our subject for this month's sketch is Reverend John Pope.

Rev. Pope was born in Warren, Ohio. He was graduated from Central Bible Institute in 1945; from Wheaton College in 1948 with a Bachelor of Arts; and from Fuller Seminary in 1951 with a Bachelor of Divinity Degree. Upon ordination in August of 1951, Mr. Pope entered the chaplaincy. He received his appointment in 1952 and was assigned to Sampson Air Force Base, New York City, and spent half of his five and one half years of service there before being sent to Munich, Germany. Serving two years there he followed this with one year at Drux Air Base in France. At this time the opportunity was presented to pursue further studies under the provision of the G.I. Bill, so he entered the University of St. Andrews in Scotland where he put in two academic years of study and one year at the University in Geneva, Switzerland, towards his Ph. D. degree in Church History. Questioned as to how many

countries he had visited, Pope replied, "Let me see now, Germany, France, Switzerland, Scotland, England, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Austria, Italy, Spain, Greece, Cyprus, Israel and Jordan." As to the languages he can speak, Romanian is his specialty, followed by German, Greek, Hebrew, French and Latin.

**THRILLING EXPERIENCE**

One of his most thrilling experiences, he says, was that of seeing his commander attend one of his services and make a commitment to Christ. He had the opportunity, while stationed at Sampson Air Base, to counsel many men each day, some of whom were destined for the Korean War. This, he states, was also a thrilling experience.

The series of events which brought Rev. Pope to N.B.C. bears mentioning. Mr. Pope decided to visit some friends at the Bible College in Germany. Unbeknownst to him, President C.E. Butterfield also was visiting the Bible College on the same day. The following day they both left the college, to go their separate ways. However, their ways were destined to join together a few months later on the campus of N.B.C. where Rev. Pope's services were enlisted as a professor in French and History.

Commenting to the faculty on his meeting with Rev. Pope, President Butterfield is reported to have said, "I did not succeed in getting an audience with Pope John but I did manage to see John Pope."

Currently, in addition to his teaching duties, he is writing a thesis for his doctorate in Church History.

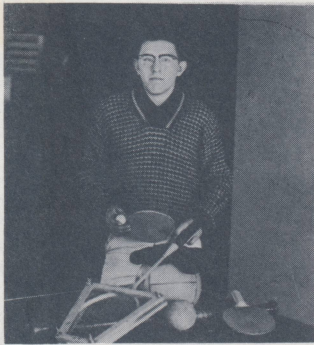
**Missionary Council Announces Projects**
